Interment was held in the Eastland City Cemetery.

Mrs. Robinson was born in San Benito, Tex., but was reared at Olden, where she attended the public schools. She was a member of the Baptist Church. Arizona had been her home since January, 1950. She was a department head at Nobbs Market, Phoenix. A skilled aviatrix, she held both private and commercial licenses and during World War II ferried planes from Texas to California.

Farm ponds were staked recently for Claude White, 2 miles northwest of Ranger; Albert Hansen, 4 miles northwest of Cisco; J. S. Hatton, 5 miles northwest of Ranger; and D. D. Sandlin, one mile south of Carbon, the Soil Conservation Service announced today.

Farm ponds were completed and final checks made for Mrs. Carrah Norton, 4 miles east of Ranger; F. R. King, 4 miles northwest of Ranger; Claude White, 2 miles northwest of Ranger; J. G. Harlow, 6 miles west of Eastland, and A. E. Howton, Jr., 8 miles north of Desdemona.

Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District worked with the land owners and contractors in the location and layout and final check on these farm ponds.

Farm ponds properly located in a pasture will give a dependable water supply and encourage more even use of grass land by livestock, they pointed out.

Diversion terraces were run and final checks made on F. R. King's farm, 4 miles northwest of Ranger, and J. G. Harlow's farm, 6 miles west of Eastland. Diversion terraces are used to divert excessive water away from cropland fields and in many cases to divert needed water into farm ponds to insure proper drainage to fill the farm pond.

One and one half miles of terraces were run on the J. R. Jennings farm, 5 miles northwest of Ranger. Mr. Jennings turned a small field back to Johnson grass and Bermuda grass to provide stable grass outlets on which to empty his terraces.

The supervisors of the Upper Leon Soil Conservation District encourage terracing on sloping cropland to prevent gulley erosion and to help hold needed rainfall on the land.

Ex-Resident of Eastland Dies At Age of 78

Mrs. Laura Payne, 78, who, with her family lived in Eastland many years, died at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene after being hospitalized for three days.

Mrs. Payne was taken to the hospital Saturday from her home in Merkel, and suffered a heart attack Tuesday. She had lived in Merkel six years, having moved there from Baird.

She was born Laura Pennington on May 2, 1877, near Gatesville in Coryell County. She was first married to J. D. Rhoads, and in 1905 married W. E. Payne of Dublin.

She was a member of the Baptist church, and had been a Baptist for 65 years.

Funeral will be held at the First Baptist Church in Baird at 2:30 p.m. Thursday with the Rev. Sam Tullock, pastor of the Merkel Baptist Church, officiating.

Burial will be in Ross Cemetery in Baird.

Throng Is Expected At Event

Information about the big Lake Leon opening in September was brought up today for the Eastland Chamber of Commerce gave the club's Tuesday program, at the Methodist Church.

H. J. Tanner, C of C manager, gave the background of the lake project; Chamber President Virgil Seaberry Jr. described the current arrangements for the Sept. 3-4 celebration.

Declaring that completion of the project became the realization of a fond dream, Mr. Tanner then went on to trace the history of the project, explaining that the territory had realized that it was imperative — in view of conditions of prolonged droughts — to provide a long-lasting water supply.

"The citizenry almost unanimously went into the water project," he said, "because, in the first place, you can't prosper without water. So, now, we have 21,000 acre feet of water — and are well supplied for many years — if it doesn't rain another drop."

Mr. Tanner stated that a colorful and outstanding celebration has been arranged by the Eastland and Ranger C of C's and that he committee is hopeful that between 20,000 and 25,000 people will attend.

"We may well bend our knees to Almighty God and thank him for blessing us with that precious asset — water," said Mr. Tanner.

As Mr. Seaberry launched into his address, he remarked: "There has been some complaint about water rates but most people know that you can't get something for nothing. We should be ready to go ahead and pay for it and not pass the buck to somebody else."

Then, as to the gala opening, he said: "We are planning to have a really big celebration, which will draw a great crowd and, thus, result in a lot of favorable publicity for this area. We want to let people know our lake is great for recreation; and let the business world know that it's great for industry."

"The features will include an address by Congressman Omar Burleson and professional boat races, the first day; a fishing rodeo, a beauty review, and special music, the second day. We hope to have 2 or 3 bands with us for the occasion. He said Texas Review will film it for TV; that the Southwestern Bell program may use it and that numerous metropolitan newspapers will have correspondents here for coverage.

"The National Guard will handle the parking problem."

He also said: "The park board will be invited as there is possibility of a park at a Leon site; also people connected with water will be invited."

Asked about fishing prospects, he replied: "We believe fishing will be excellent. The water board, which makes up the fishing and boating regulations, will issue fishing licenses."

Commenting on the lake, Lion Everett Plowman said: "A man from Brownwood told me that we should greatly appreciate the scenic setting in which Lake Leon is located."

The meeting was presided over by President H. D. Reese. Jim Parks of Graham was a guest of Travis West. General Program Chairman Clyde Young introduced James Wright, program chairman for the occasion, who introduced the speakers.

Heart Attack Fatal To Ranger Man

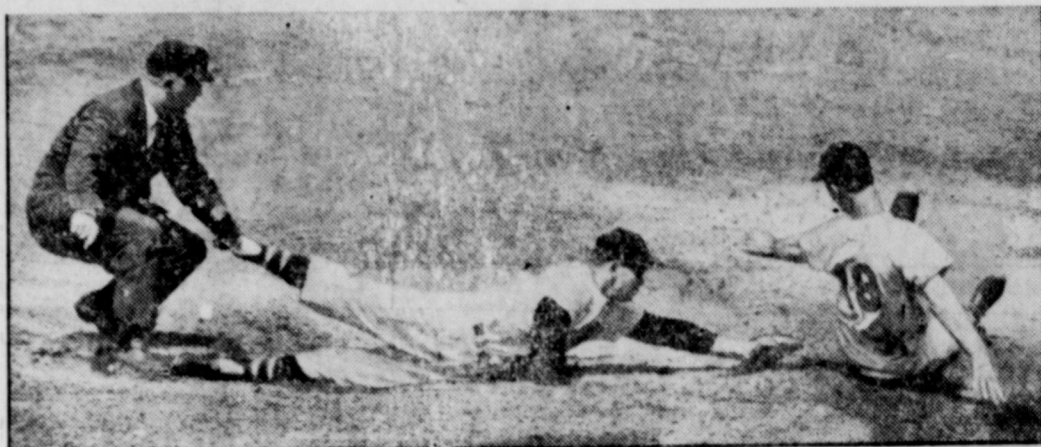
Mr. Gray was discovered by a neighbor, Bud Cook. Justice of the Peace W. T. Fincher of Breckenridge said that Mr. Gray had been dead approximately five hours when he was discovered, placing the time of death around 9 a.m. Mr. Gray had been plowing early Tuesday and when he did not return home for lunch his wife sent Mr. Cook to search for him. When the body was discovered the motor of the tractor was still running.

Mr. Gray was born in Leno County January 16, 1887, and came to Stephens County at the age of ten. In 1935 he moved to Aledo and then returned to this county in 1948. At the time of death he was employed on the Veale Ranch.

another 100 men during the 12 months following. Twenty-one men are stationed in the district now.

The 13-county area includes Eastland, Taylor, Callahan, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Nolan, Shackelford, Scurry, Stephens, Mitchell, Throckmorton and Stonewall counties.

The men have headquarters in Abilene and the patrol has substations at Snyder, Colorado City, Stamford, Breckenridge, Eastland and Baird.

Examinations for a position with the Texas Highway Patrol are tentatively set for early in August with the training school to begin in October at the Department of Public Safety headquarters at Austin.

Applications for the positions must be filed by July 25. Application blanks may be secured at the patrol headquarters at 2064 Butternut St. or by writing directly to W. J. Elliott, Chief, Texas Highway Patrol, Austin.

Applicants must be between 21 and 35 years of age and have a high school education or equivalent formal training. They must be not less than 5 feet, 8 inches in height and weigh not less than 2 pounds nor more than 3 1/2 pounds per inch of height. They must have been residents of Texas for at least one year prior to application.

Patrol trainees will receive 2 1/2 months of the schooling at \$275 per month. They will receive \$306 per month for six months during probation service and \$315 per month thereafter. For every five years service patrolmen will receive a \$10 per month raise in pay, and all uniforms are furnished.

A patrolman can retire after 20 years service under the state employee retirement system.

And you'll discover that this short-boil method retains not only the fresh cherry flavor but provides a greater yield too, for practically none of the fruit juice is boiled away.

Cherry Jam

(Using sour cherries)

Yield: about 11 medium glasses (5-1/2 lbs. jam)
4 cups prepared fruit (about 3 lbs. ripe sour cherries) 1 bottle Certo fruit pectin
First, prepare the fruit. Stem and pit about 3 pounds fully ripe sour cherries. Chop fine. Measure 4 cups into a very large saucepan. Then make the jam. Add sugar to fruit in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil, and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and at once stir in Certo. Skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Cover jam at once with 1/8 inch hot paraffin.

Note: For a stronger cherry flavor, add a few crushed cherry pits during simmering, or add 1/4 teaspoon almond extract before ladling jam.
