Smith Boatman Estate No. 1, three and one-half miles south of Rising Star, was being watched with considerable interest this week. The well was drilling at somewhat deeper than 2,400 feet and preparations were being made to core. Contract depth is 3,000 feet in a test of the Marble Falls formation in an area where both gas and oil were found in earlier operations.




