The accidents seemed to have reached a stand-still after the mishap which occurred at 5:45 p.m. east of Cisco on U.S. Highway 80 involving a car and truck. No injuries were reported.

The crash ripped the gas tank out of the Ables 1962 model Ford, spreading burning gasoline along the highway, according to a Fort Worth police report. The vehicles slammed into opposite roadside ditches. Mr. Ables was dead on arrival at Harris Hospital in Fort Worth. The truck driver escaped injury. His load of asphalt burned, the report said.

Mr. Ables was born October 10, 1918, in Carbon where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Verlon A. Ables, still reside. He was a graduate of Carbon High School, Cisco Junior College and Sam Houston State College. He attended Sul Ross College in Alpine briefly.

A veteran of the Korean Conflict, Mr. Ables was a member of the Carbon Methodist Church and of the Carbon Masonic Lodge.

Mr. Ables had been employed by Don Pierson, prominent Eastland business man, for a number of years. He managed the Fiesta Bowl after Pierson Enterprises built it

and later handled other assignments. He spent most of last year abroad for his employer.

Mr. Ables was married Oct. 19, 1952, to the former Barbara Anderson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. F. Anderson of Cisco.

Besides his parents and his wife, Mr. Ables is survived by one son, Robert Don, 10, one brother, Virgil D. Ables of Priddy; and two sisters, Mrs. Billy Joe Barrett of Castro Valley, Calif.; and Mrs. John Phillips of San Leandro, Calif.

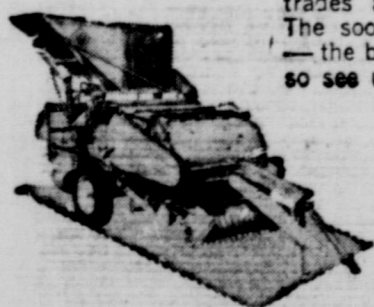

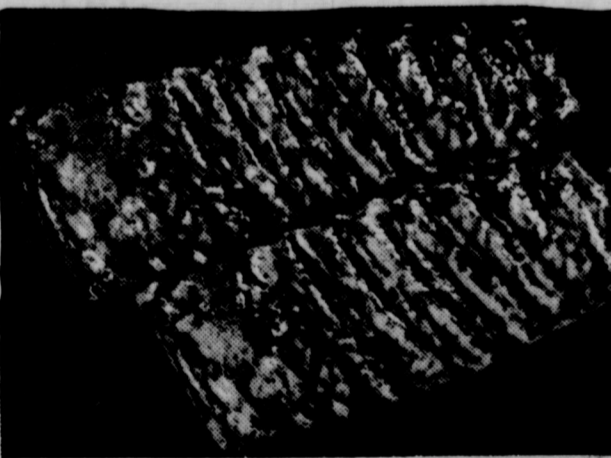

The golfing schoolteacher from Garland successfully defended his Lakeside Country Club tournament title with resounding victories in both his semifinal and final rounds Sunday.

He needed to go only 27 holes in disposing of Cisco's Tim Bennie, 6 and 5, in the morning round and Lubbock's Bill Wilson, 5 and 4, in the finals.

McBee rolled in eight birdies during his three trips around the nine-hole par 72 layout. He had only one bogey for the day, and almost sank eagle putts of 35 feet on the 9th hole and 14 on the 7th.

In the semifinals Smith best J. W. Paris, 2 and 1, and Skinner defeated Max Pierce,

6 and 9 while Bennie, a freshman-to-be at SMU, added to his own demise with a bogey at the No. 4.

The history of wills was traced by the speaker, and community property laws were explained as they apply in the event death claims a man or his wife. He noted that a will is not valid after the birth of a child unless provision is made for the child.

The proper will should be well and clearly prepared and properly witnessed if the wishes of the maker are to be carried out fully, Mr. Frost said. It may be prepared by an attorney or self-written, he added. He suggested simplicity in preparation.

Planning by a person prior to death with proper care to details, including a will, often prevents loss by estates through taxes and other costs, Mr. Frost said.

Pointing out that few wives were familiar with their husband's business, Mr. Frost suggested that it would be helpful in the event of death if the man left good records of his holdings with suggestions in their operations and management.

"A sizeable number of county people in our district who applied late last year found that they had lost some benefits by not applying earlier," he said. "We have found that the best way for a person to protect his social security benefit rights is to file his claim at 65 whether or not he intends to go on working. Even if no benefits are payable right away, there's an advantage in having your claim already approved when you actually retire, for all then needed is to say 'Start my checks.'"

1965 ASC Program Is Underway In County

The 1965 Agricultural Conservation Program is now well under way, according to E. E. Blackwell, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation, Eastland County Committee.

The chairman explained that the ACP for each county is formulated by local people to deal scientifically with local as well as national conservation problems. Needed conservation measures are recommended by local farm leaders and technicians of several agencies and organizations. Cost-sharing assistance under the program amount to about half the cost of the approved conservation practices.

Among 1965 ACP practices approved for application in Eastland County, Mr. Blackwell listed the following: The establishment or improvement of vegetative cover, to increase water penetration, lessen runoff, reduce erosion and siltation, and keep water clean.

Terracing and land leveling to increase water infiltration and reduce damaging and

wasteful runoff. Constructing water-storage reservoirs, to permit or encourage animal agriculture and the growth of protective vegetative cover, and to accumulate beneficial and widely dispersed water supplies on the land.

Requests for conservation assistance outstrip the available program funds, Mr. Blackwell pointed out, and priority is given to work that is needed most. Farmers were encouraged to discuss their conservation problems with the people at the ASCS County Office, for frequently a practice can be adapted to a particular need or a group of farmers may join their program and other resources in reaching a solution to a mutual problem.
