J. R.  All local managers and store personnel in the three stores will be retained, according to J. R. Beadel, who was in Eastland County last week to complete details of the transaction.
 "We plan to make no personnel changes in any of the stores in the immediate future," Mr. Beadel said, "as we are very proud of the fine group of employees we find in the stores. We plan only to increase the stores' efficiency and service to the food buying public, in keeping with the policy and reputation of our stores in other places."
 JRB Supermarkets operate in Brownwood, Bangs, Cross Plains, Coleman, Abilene, and Lampasas.
 "Our policy of stocking our stores with complete stocks of nationally advertised foods, including Shurfine and Always Fresh lines, has made the JRB Supermarkets the leading stores in their localities, and we plan to continue this policy," Mr. Beadel said. "Our high quality meat markets, in which we carry only the best quality graded meats, and our produce departments in which we offer only the finest fruits and vegetables, have contributed considerably to our success in the supermarket field. In addition, as an added bonus, we give S&H Green Stamps, the nation's leading redemption stamp."
 J. R. Beadel and Company is owned by J. R. Beadel and Allen Beadel, both of Brownwood. The Beadel brothers have been in the retail grocery business for twenty years and previous to that time were engaged for many years in the wholesale grocery business. Eastland's Future Depends on 'IF'

In poem, song and oratory, the little word "if" has been extolled as a mighty barrier—"So many things can be done, if."
 In Eastland's case however, it's a lot more definite. "IF" stands for something here and it certainly does mean something.
 "IF" in Eastland means Industrial Foundation, and with all modesty, Eastland's I.F. can boast "Every day, in every way, I'm getting better."
 IF President Tom Wilson reports support of the foundation's work (attracting industry) is growing each day as more Eastland business and professional people and individuals give of their time and money to help the town grow.
 The Eastland I.F., a non-profit corporation, was formed last year, and its creed is that Eastland will grow, will succeed, if everybody works together. Since the formation of IF, a large wing at a cost of some \$54,000, has been added to Eastland's Hollywood-Vasarette building — and that's pretty definite for a common, ordinary-type "if" — it took a definite "I.F." to do that.

City Soaked Tree Dedicated To Memory of Jim Horton

Eastland just nearly had a half a foot of rain this week. Total for the week is 5.96 inches, according to Official Weather Observer James Smith.
 Termed "just right" by nearly everyone, the rains came providing beneficial moisture to farmer and ranchers, filling stock tanks and putting water in the ground in preparation for spring plantings.
 A series of severe thunderclouds accompanied the rain with heavy thunder and lightning, but very little, if any, damage reported. Cisco had eight inches and a great deal of damage.

 The Eastland Hospital Grounds Committee with Mrs. Samuel Butler, chairman, Mrs. Milton Fuller, and Mrs. Clyde Grissom met at 10 a. m. Friday morning on the west grounds of the hospital and dedicated a pin oak tree to the memory of the late Jim Horton.
 This pin oak tree is a native of East Texas and was planted by Mrs. Butler and Mrs. Horton five years ago. Mrs. Jack Frost donated the tree.
 In dedicating the tree Mrs. Butler said, "It is significant that this transplanted tree is dedicated to Mr. Horton. He, too, was transplanted to Texas. In 1919 he located in Eastland from Kansas. He grew in stature through the years and became a most valuable citizen of the community.
 When Eastland was without a hospital and decided to build one with volunteer workers, a drive for equipment and material was started by the citizens. Jim Horton was among the largest donors and the first individual donor after the Civic League's initial gift. His wife served long and well on the Civic League Hospital Committee. The Civic League was the first to sponsor the building of the hospital. Their son, Horace Horton, and a crew from his ceramic plant were nightly volunteers during the construction of the hospital. A few years after the construction of the hospital, Horace Horton served as president of the Hospital Board of Directors.
 "Jim Horton was taken suddenly ill at 10 p. m. May 9, and was rushed to the Eastland Memorial Hospital where he later died at 2:30 a. m. May 10, 1965.
 "If it is true we can only take with us what we have given away in this life, Jim Horton gave so much to our community," Mrs. Butler said.
 "This tree is dedicated to the memory of Jim Horton and again I say, 'to live in the hearts we leave behind is the service we conclude with a prayer by Rev. Lester Davenport of the First Methodist Church, the Horton pastor.
 He quoted from the First Psalm: "And he shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water that bringeth forth his fruit in his season. His leaf also shall not wither and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper."

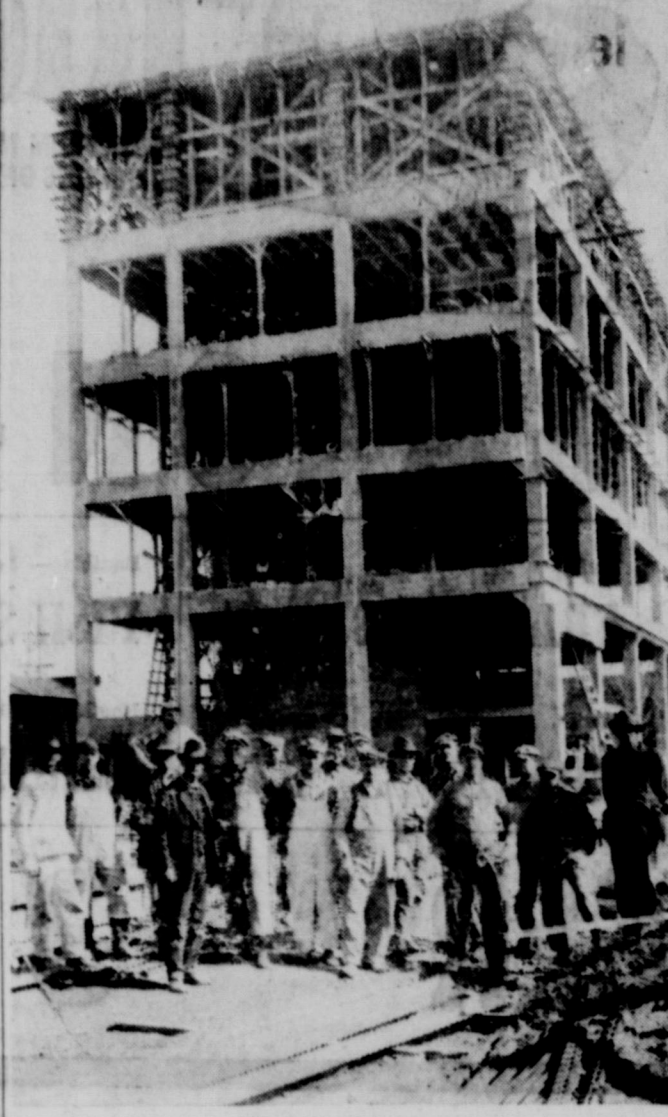

County Pecan Field Day Is Set May 17th

Plans are complete for the annual Eastland County Pecan Field Day program to begin at 10 a.m. Monday, May 17, at the First National Bank conference room in Cisco, according to an announcement by President Oscar Schaefer of the county growers association.

The new systemic insecticide — Di System — for the prevention of aphids and honey dew on trees is on the program agenda for the meeting.

It was pointed out that demonstrations on trees in two widely separated pecan orchards in the county last year proved that the material was very effective. It was also explained that although the material has been approved for use in New Mexico it has yet to be approved in this state.

Other items on the morning program include fertilizers, shuckworm, and pecan weevil research results and other topics.

After a Dutch Treat lunch at noon the afternoon part of the program will be spent at the Jim Jennings orchard, a mile east of Scranton. Here the group will check the stage in the life cycle of the pecan nut case bearer, most destructive of small pecans of all bugs, to determine time to spray.

Tom Denman, Sthenville Agricultural Experiment Station, and B. G. Hancock, Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M, two of the top horticulturists of the state, will appear on the program.

Out of the county pecan growers were invited to attend, according to Mr. Schaefer, who said that women would be as welcome as men at the annual affair.

Ben McKinnis of Eastland is secretary of the association. County Agent J. M. Cooper has been in charge of arrangements and the program.

Dr. Treadwell Is Speaker For Rotary Meeting

"Be afraid enough of cancer to see a doctor about any symptoms and do something about it." That was the advice of Dr. M. A. Treadwell, Eastland physician and surgeon, in a talk Thursday at the weekly luncheon of the Cisco Rotary Club.

The program was arranged by Rotarian Sam Kimmell, and the speaker was introduced by Mrs. Austin Flint of the county cancer society chapter.

Cancer is the nation's second leading cause of death, Dr. Treadwell said. Much research and experiment work are going on throughout the world to find a cure for cancer and Dr. Treadwell predicted that it would come in the not too distant future.

Dr. Treadwell told of the various types of cancer and suggested symptoms to watch for. These included:

Skin cancers, moles if they grow, headaches or dizziness for brain cancer, lung cancer, bleeding or unusual pains for stomach cancers, yellow skin for cancer of the liver, blood in urine for kidney and bladder cancer, prostate gland checkups, lymph node enlargements should be checked on, knots for thyroid gland cancer, bone cancer and breast cancer in women.

The percentage of people who are cured of cancer when it is detected early is going up every year, Dr. Treadwell said. He suggested semi-annual chest x-rays for smokers and annual checkups and x-rays for everyone.
