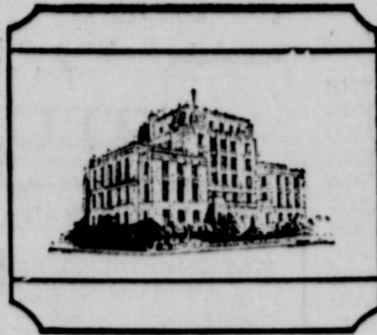

Rigid Ordinance on Sanitation Is Okayed By City

city health and sanitation ordinance with "teeth in it" passed on first reading at the Eastland City Commission Monday evening.

Violation of the ordinance after a ten-day warning period would result in a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of from \$10 to \$200 it is reported with each repeated day being a separate violation.

The ordinance spells out violations including littering of streets, general nuisances, unclean premises, trash in public places, nauseous structures, and cites order for abatement of unwholesome structures and provides for inspection practices.

It would also give the commission the right to be the determinant of what constitutes "nuisance."

Definition of nuisance is listed by the ordinance as:

"It shall be unlawful for any person to establish, or, where already established, to conduct or carry on any trade, business, vocation or calling which is dangerous or injurious to persons or property in the vicinity, or which occasions annoyance to the public or the inhabitants of the neighborhood, and the same is hereby declared to be a nuisance."

The ordinance was approved unanimously by the commissioners, who have been plagued for the past several months by complaints from citizens relative to certain conditions that exist in the city.

Hit-and-Run Held in Doubt

A 60-year-old Olden man was treated and released from Eastland Memorial Hospital Tuesday after having been the victim of a hit-and-run or a falling mailbox incident.

Investigating authorities aren't sure which, but reportedly are inclined to favor the "falling mailbox" explanation, according to Sheriff L. E. Sublett.

The man apparently was standing alongside U. S. Highway 80 awaiting a ride to Ranger when he was struck by a rural mail box which had either been hit by a speeding auto, or which fell over onto the man for other causes.

The incident happened about 8:15 a.m. and when the man was discovered by a neighbor, he was laying on the ground with the mailbox and its accompanying post across his body.

He received minor cuts on his hands and a slight bruise on his hand and a slight bruise on his chest.

There were no witnesses and no clues as to the identity of the driver of the auto, if one existed.

He was taken to the hospital by an Arrington Hamner Funeral Home ambulance.

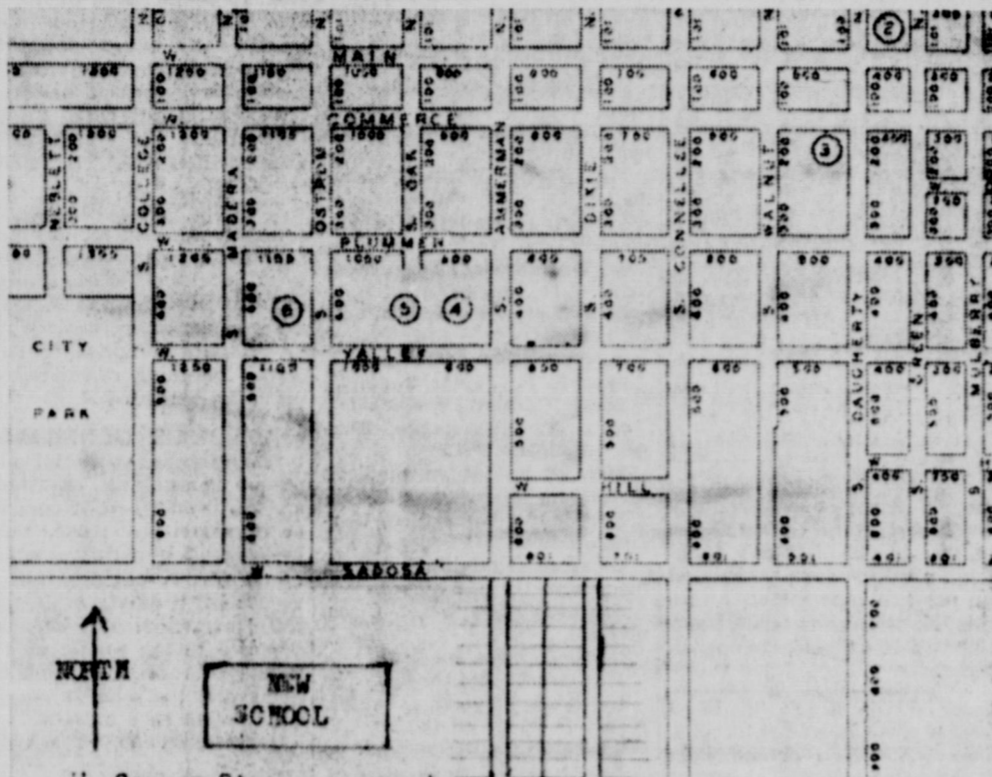
Teague Woman Killed Monday In Gorman Crash

Valley View Estates, 45-Lot Sub-Division, Get Commission OK

A new housing sub-division to be located in southwest Eastland and to be known as the Valley View Estates was given tentative approval by the Eastland City Commission Monday evening, with "gratitude and regards."

The subdivision will open 45 new home building sites on property owned by Mrs. Bertie Reid near the New Eastland Elementary School. The 15-acre tract is located immediately south of Sadosa St. and extends southward to Conner St. It is bisected by Ammerman and Dixie Streets, which will be extended into the development.

Developer of the site is J. R. Jones, Brownwood contractor who reportedly already has commitments for several homes in the division, and plans extensive development including curbing and guttering, paving and installation of utilities including sewerage.

Mayor Frank Deaton expressed the commission's appreciation to Mrs. Reid for her participation in this project to help Eastland grow. He was especially grateful, he said, that arrangements had been made for the developer to handle the basic site improvements.

The site is located generally behind where Dr. Ferhman Lund's new home on Sadosa St., and is due east of the new school. Considerable leveling and grade work will be necessary, it is reported.

Surveyor Tommy Magness appeared before the Commission with the preliminary plat of the division, asking approval of the name "Valley View" and tentative approval of the site. He will return, he said, later with complete plans and field notes. Minimum lot size

will be 70 by 150 feet with an average of approximately 10,000 square feet, Magness said.

The site is bounded on three sides by other developable land.

Dr. Lund appeared with Magness asking the commission's feeling on the expansion of Sadosa St. to a 40-foot street. It is presently a 30-foot street and is heavily traveled now, due to the new school.

The Commission agreed to a general plan of widening the street, and gave preliminary thought to the construction of a side walk along one side to provide safe passage for school youngsters.

Dr. Lund said that he will build his own curb and gutter back an additional five feet and Magness indicated that his future plans with the development would provide this extra space for the wider street and walkway.

Valley View estates will be designed to G.I. and FHA specifications, Magness said.

County Arrested in Abduction

A 28-year-old Eastland police character was arrested in Eastland Monday evening and is a prime suspect in the weekend abduction of a 12-year-old Dallas girl.

The girl was taken from Dallas and abandoned near Anson in Jones County Saturday after having been raped and attacked and left in a critical condition. She is in an Anson hospital where she is being treated for severe injuries.

She reportedly gave Jones County Sheriff Dave Reeves the name of the Eastland County man, and he in turn notified County Sheriff L. E. Sublett, who made the arrest here. Sheriff Reeves took the local man to Anson Monday night and his 1961 Pontiac convertible was taken back to Dallas.

He faces assault with intent to murder charges. The girl first gave her age as 20, but later changed it after her mother arrived in Anson.

The 28-year-old man, who avowed his innocence, claims that he has witnesses who will swear that he was in this county all weekend. He is a native of Carbon.

Two Probated Sentences Given In District Court

Conner-Area Group Promised Relief From Smokey, Smelly City Dump

"The city dump will be improved or moved," a dozen disgruntled citizens were told at the action-packed city commission meeting Monday evening, during which commissioners also okayed a new housing development plan and passed on first reading a rigid sanitation ordinance.

The commission also agreed to install a new four-inch water line for the Church of God camp grounds west of town, if the church organization furnishes the pipe.

The delegation of citizens, most of whom live in the East Conner and Pershing St. area, were complaining about the smoke from the city dump grounds, east of town. The odor is horrible, their spokesman, Jack Petree, said, and in the summer when air conditions are turned on, the smoke is just pulled into the homes.

Bob Perkins, a member of the group and a former city commissioner, was asked by City Manager Lewis Tiner what action had been taken in the past when similar complaints were made. Perkins reported that prior commissions had investigated other sites including just north of the airport.

Tiner said, "The rifle range is there now," referring to the Gun Club's range at the airport. (One of the visitors said, "They could shoot live rats if you move the dump grounds out there"). Another visitor showed commissioners pictures of dead cows at the dump.

It was explained that a sanitary-fill process was tried but that the city's track loader can't keep up with filling.

Mayor Frank Deaton told the group that some action would be taken — either to stop burning at the dump or to move the site, possibly to a location between Eastland Lake and Ringling Lake.

Marlin Jackson represented the Church of God group, requesting assistance from the city in the installation of a new water line to the camp grounds. He said that the camp is presently served by an inadequate two-inch, assisted by a reservoir and pump arrangement. Development of the camp, including the construction of cabins and shower units necessitates the need for more water pressure, he said.

About 1,700 feet of line will be needed, it was pointed out, and Jackson reported that members of the church will furnish the pipe. The Commission told Jackson that the city will dig the ditch, and lay the line and complimented him and the church for the development of the camp which attracts hundreds to the town annually.

(The city is expecting some 10 additional employees early in June from its participation in the work-study program in connection with the county colleges.)

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When Will 6 Go to Walnut?

Routing of Highway 6 through Eastland along Walnut St. as planned, isn't presently programmed by the local highway department office, but is expected to be early next year, according to reports at the City Commission meeting Monday evening.

During a discussion about construction of a sidewalk from Madera, near the new elementary school, eastward, it was pointed out that it might not be necessary to plan it further east than Walnut due to the proposed routing of the highway over that street.

City Manager Lewis Tiner said that it was his understanding that the city is pledged for from \$12,000 to \$20,000 for right-of-way, etc. for the Walnut St. routing.

Highway Department Employee Tommy Magness reported that the re-routing is not programmed but is expected early next year.

"Money is already available for the job," he said, "and I guess we'll get on it when we get caught up with Interstate 20 projects." Int. 20 projects hinge on availability of money, he said, and if the department should find itself between Int. 20 projects, it could switch over and go to work on the Highway 6 re-routing.

Magness reported that it would require about 2,400 feet of sidewalk from Madera St. to Daugherty St.

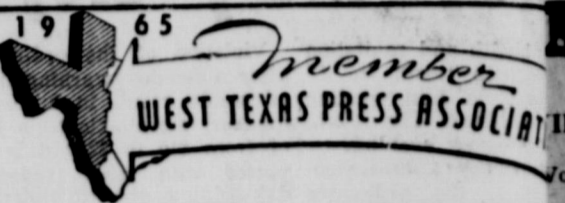

SEPARABILITY OF PROVISIONS It is the intention of the city council that each separate provision of this ordinance shall be deemed independent of all other provisions herein, and it is further the intention of the City Council that if any provision of this ordinance shall be declared invalid, all other provisions hereof shall remain valid and in full force.

ORDER TO ABATE UNWHOLESOME STRUCTURES: Whenever the Council shall deem any house, cesspool, pit or any other structure or accumulation to be unwholesome or nauseous and shall pass an order declaring the same to be a nuisance and order its destruction, removal, cleansing or abatement, the Health Officer or someone designated by the City Commission shall deliver to the owner, or person in control of the premises upon which the nuisance is situated, a notice in writing, signed by the Mayor, and attested by the City Secretary, commanding the destruction, removal, cleansing or abatement of the nuisance in accordance with the order. Any owner or person in control of the premises upon which such nuisance is situated who shall fail or neglect to destroy, remove, cleanse or abate the nuisance in accordance with such order within ten (10) days after the delivery to him of the notice, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

INSPECTIONS: It shall be the duty of the Health Officer to inspect regularly the premises of all persons residing, doing business or owning property within the Limits of the City; and should the Health Officer find any such premises kept or permitted to remain in a filthy or unclean manner, he shall notify such persons to purify their premises. Should any person so notified by the Health Officer fail to obey such notification, he shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor.

LEGAL NOTICE AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND ADOPTING A SANITATION AND HEALTH CODE PROVIDING FOR THE ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT THEREOF, MAKING VIOLATION A MISDEMEANOR, DECLARING CERTAIN CONDITIONS TO BE A NUISANCE, MAKING VIOLATION A MISDEMEANOR PUNISHABLE BY A FINE NOT EXCEEDING \$200.00.

WHEREAS, in the opinion of the City Commission there exists a public need or necessity for a Sanitation and Health ordinance to the City of Eastland, Eastland County, Texas, as described below; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND: LITTERING STREETS: It shall be unlawful for any person to produce, collect or deposit, or cause the same to be done, in any street, alley, sidewalk or elsewhere in the City, any impure or unhealthy substance or thing calculated to promote disease.

NUISANCES GENERALLY It shall be unlawful for any person to establish, or, where already established, to conduct or carry on any trade, business, vocation or calling which is dangerous or injurious to persons or property in the vicinity, or which occasions annoyance to the public or the inhabitants of the neighborhood, and the same is hereby declared to be a nuisance.

PREMISES TO BE KEPT CLEAN: It shall be the duty of every person within the City to keep the premises owned or controlled by him clean and free of filth or offensive matter, whether the same be solid or fluid, and to remove or destroy, as often as need be, all filth, garbage, offal, hoops, stones, straw, chips and everything calculated to endanger or promote disease, or to become offensive, from such premises and buildings, yards and enclosures thereon and from the sidewalks.

TRASH IN PUBLIC PLACES: It shall be unlawful for any person to throw or deposit in any City lot, Street, alley, sidewalk, gutter, ditch or drain any paper, filth, dung, garbage, broken glass, tins, chips, paring or bits of leather shavings, ashes or other trash.

NAUSEOUS STRUCTURES: It shall be unlawful for any person owning or in control of any premises to maintain or allow to remain upon his premises, any unwholesome or nauseous house, pit, or any unwholesome or nauseous structure or accumulation declared by the Council to be a nuisance.

ORDER TO ABATE UNWHOLESOME STRUCTURES: Whenever the Council shall deem any house, cesspool, pit or any other structure or accumulation to be unwholesome or nauseous and shall pass an order declaring the same to be a nuisance and order its destruction, removal, cleansing or abatement, the Health Officer or someone designated by the City Commission shall deliver to the owner, or person in control of the premises upon which the nuisance is situated, a notice in writing, signed by the Mayor, and attested by the City Secretary, commanding the destruction, removal, cleansing or abatement of the nuisance in accordance with the order.

Spray Time Near, Pecan Men Told At Field Day

Pecan orchard owners should spray for the first hatch of case bearers, worms that attack the tiny nuts, about May 25th, according to authorities in Cisco Monday for a field day of the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.

Some 100 persons from throughout this region took part in the field day, which was featured by a program concerning orchard insect control and fertilization. Oscar Schaefer of Cook, the association president, presided. Speakers suggested that a hydraulic spray with a new chemical, Sevin, was best for case bearers. They urged that the tiny nuts now on the trees be watched for pin-point size white eggs. Any time these eggs are present, it is time to spray.
Tom Denman, superintendent of the U. S. Pecan Experiment Station at Brownwood, discussed the new sys-

B. G. Hancock, Texas A&M University Extension Service specialist, discussed research underway to control pecan weevils and the hickory shuck worm.
The shuck worm has become a real pest instead of a nuisance insect, Mr. Hancock said. It causes more damage to pecans than either the case bearer or the weevil, he added.

The worm bores into the hull around the maturing nuts causing them to fall off trees. They are active for much of the growing season.

"The hickory shuck worm is now a full time entomologist project at A&M University," Mr. Hancock said. "This worm is the number one thing in our research program for the benefit of pecan orchards."

Browsing With Bev

Every season new fabrics appear on the market. Some of these new fabrics present sewing problems. One of the most popular newer fabrics has been the stretch fabrics.

An early dislike for "stretch" was developed by everyone, as those who were wearing the garments made from stretch fabric were wearing them "skin-tight." This fabric was not meant to be worn this way, but rather, the stretch in the fabric was intended to provide comfort and extra ease. Keep this in mind when buying stretch fabric or garments — buy your regular size garment or pattern.

There are three types of stretch fabric:
1. Crosswise stretch (sometimes called Filling Stretch)
2. Lengthwise stretch (sometimes called Warp Stretch) This is good for long pants; however they will need a stirrup under the foot.
3. Two-way stretch. This fabric stretches in both lengthwise and crosswise direction and is primarily used in undergarments and swimwear.
In buying stretch fabrics make sure the stretch is in the direction you want it (or

lay your pattern to where the stretch is in the direction you want it.) The fabric should be placed flat and smooth for about 24 hours before cutting, to allow the fabric to "relax."

While cutting the fabric do not allow the fabric to hang over the edge of the table or cutting surface, as this will stretch the fabric. Fold the excess, being careful not to stretch the fabric, so it is on the table.

A short stitch, approximately 14-15 stitches per inch, is best to use when sewing on stretch fabrics. Also use a synthetic thread — one that has give and will stretch with the fabric as the fabric stretches. This is most important if you don't want your seams "popping" out. Your sewing machine pressure should be medium to light and use a fine to medium needle.

If interfacing is necessary, use the same stretch fabric, as any regular interfacing would not stretch and thus your garment would not stretch at that point where the interfacing was used. In lining stretch use a stretch lining or knitted fabric that will stretch.

Stabilize the fabric around the buttonholes and the length of the zipper seam, so that these areas will not stretch and pucker as you sew.

Stretch fabrics which have a tendency to relax in dimension between launderings or dry-cleanings can be restored to taut dimension in an automatic dryer. Use heat stored in the dryer after use or set the emperaur dial according to the fabric. Tumble with a clean damp turkish towel or several clean damp sponges for 10-20 minutes as needed to

remove bulges or "knee pops." Allow to cool and dry thoroughly before wearing. Warp stretch (lengthwise) garments, especially those that are heavy in weight, may elongate if stored on a hanger. For this reason, many prefer to fold heavy warp stretch garments and store them on shelves or in drawers.

Horizontal stretch garments should be stored on hanger in the usual manner. If you read the hang-tag instructions and follow them, you should have no problems in caring for stretch fabrics and garments.

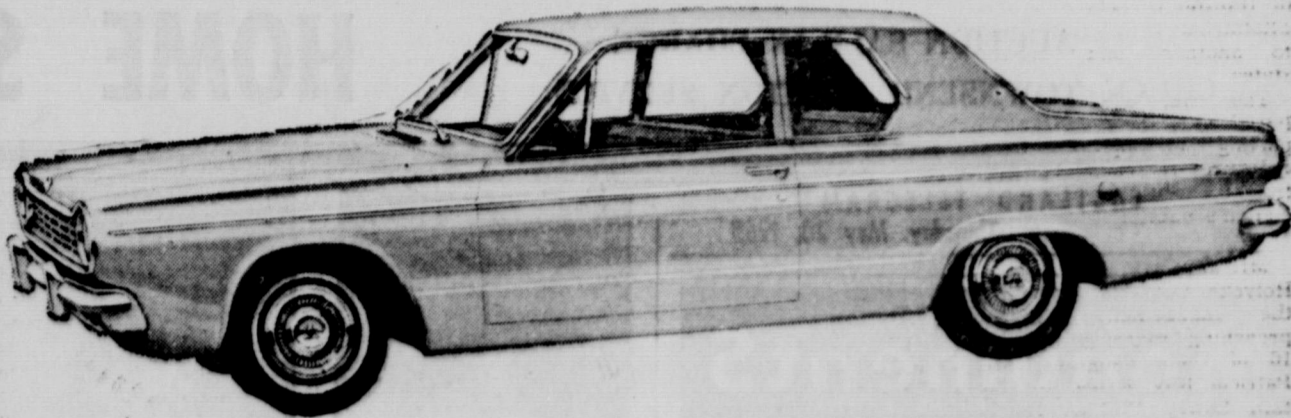

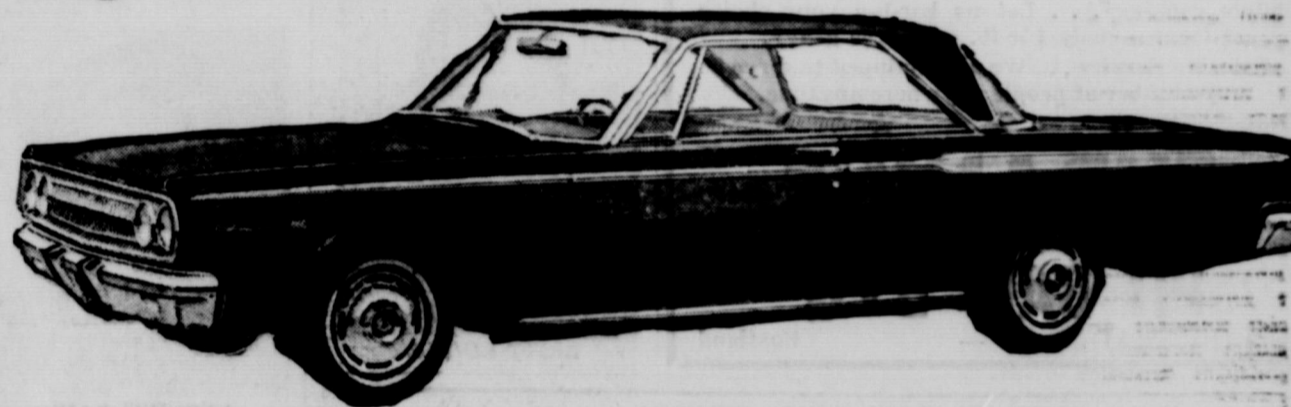

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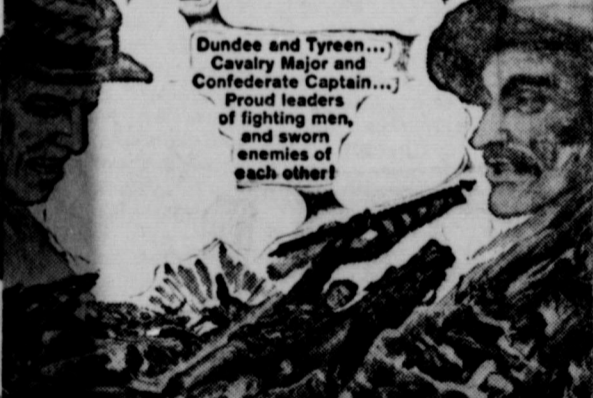
