## Here Are Vital Statistics On George Sauer, Banquet Guest

When the Quarterback Club program committee selects George Sauer, athletic director of Baylor University as speaker for the banquet to be held on the night of January 26, they picked a man who has been prominent in athletic circles all over this nation since his playing days as All-American fullback for Nebraska in 1933.

At the close of the football season last fall, Sauer won six years as head coach at Baylor University and during that time he lost fewer games than any other

school in the Southwest Conference, except Texas, and he was tied with Texas. Each school lost only 19 games over the six seasons.

At the same time, Sauer won more SWC games than any other school except Texas, and again they tied at 19-14-3 over the six years. Sauer's six-year record counting all games was 38-19-3. His bowl record was 0-2.

He sent Baylor teams into 62 games, including bowls, and scored in 60 of the 62. During this time he had a run of 59 games in which Baylor scored. His teams

averaged 20 points per game over the six years.

Before going to Baylor, Sauer had been a head coach for 15 seasons, coaching at New Hampshire, Navy and Kansas. At Kansas, he was the last man to break Oklahoma's Big Seven title monopoly.

Following his selection as All-American in 1933, Sauer scored all the points in the 1934 Shrine East-West game in a 12-0 West victory. He was co-captain with Moose Krause of Notre Dame of the 1934 College All-Stars. He later returned as a coach in both the East-West and College All-Star games.

Sauer was named to the American Football Foundation's Hall of Fame and received an emblematic plaque of that honor just before the Baylor-Arkansas game this past fall.

Eastlandites are fortunate in having an opportunity to hear a man of Sauer's experience make a speech. It has also been officially learned that Sauer will show a film of the Baylor-Arkansas game at the banquet.

Ticket sales are now under way and the Quarterback Club urges everyone to buy at least one ticket or more, because it is going to be a banquet that will long be remembered.

## Who Should File?

## Those Subject To Income Tax Told by Nichols

Nearly every citizen or resident of the U. S. A. who had an income during 1955 should file a tax return, according to Howard O. Nichols of the Internal Revenue Service office at Abilene.

He explained that if you are less than 65 years of age and had a gross income of \$600 or more, you must file a tax return.

Those 65 and over, however, must file a return when their gross income is \$1200 or more.

"Self-employed individuals with net earnings of \$400 or more must also file an annual return," Mr. Nichols said.

"A person with income of less than \$600—or \$1200 for those 65 or over—should file a return to get a refund of the tax that was withheld each payday," he added.

"Every taxpayer should read the 1955 tax instruction pamphlet so he will not pay more or less tax than he owes," he urged.

for normal years.

"We have received 7.72 inches less than normal of 46.31 inches for the six year period," he said.

"Through good management practices, including cover crops, the soil holds 80 per cent or 12.88 inches of an average year's rain. Where there are no cover crops, only 20 per cent of the rain remains — only 3.23 of the average 16.11 inches of the dry years.

"Tests last spring showed some significant figures. After a 5-inch rain, the soil was wet down five to seven inches where there was bare ground. On land where cover crops had been planted, the soil was wet down 32 to 48 inches."

Mr. McAlister suggested that soil improvement and good management should be the business of all the people — business men as well as land owners. Land should be used according to its composition and needs as determined by tests, he said.

Every landowner would profit by determining the capability, type, depth, texture, permeability, slope and erosion characteristics of his land, Mr. McAlister believed. He noted that the soil conservation service was ready at all times to offer technical assistance to the farm and ranch owners.

The speaker was introduced by Manager Paul Brashear of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

Dr. Thompson, who defeated tuberculosis and became an international expert on the disease, wrote more than 25 books and articles on tuberculosis and developed many new techniques, which still are used in treating the disease.

After he was stricken in 1911 Dr. Thompson went to the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Carlsbad, near San Angelo, for treatment. He then went to Kerrville in 1917 and established a sanatorium, which now is the Kerrville State Home. He sold the facilities to the state in 1937 when his health began to fail.

For 12 years, Dr. Thompson was a delegate to the American Medical Association and was chairman of its board. He was past president of the State Medical Association and was a member of many other national medical groups.

Survivors include his wife and two stepsons.

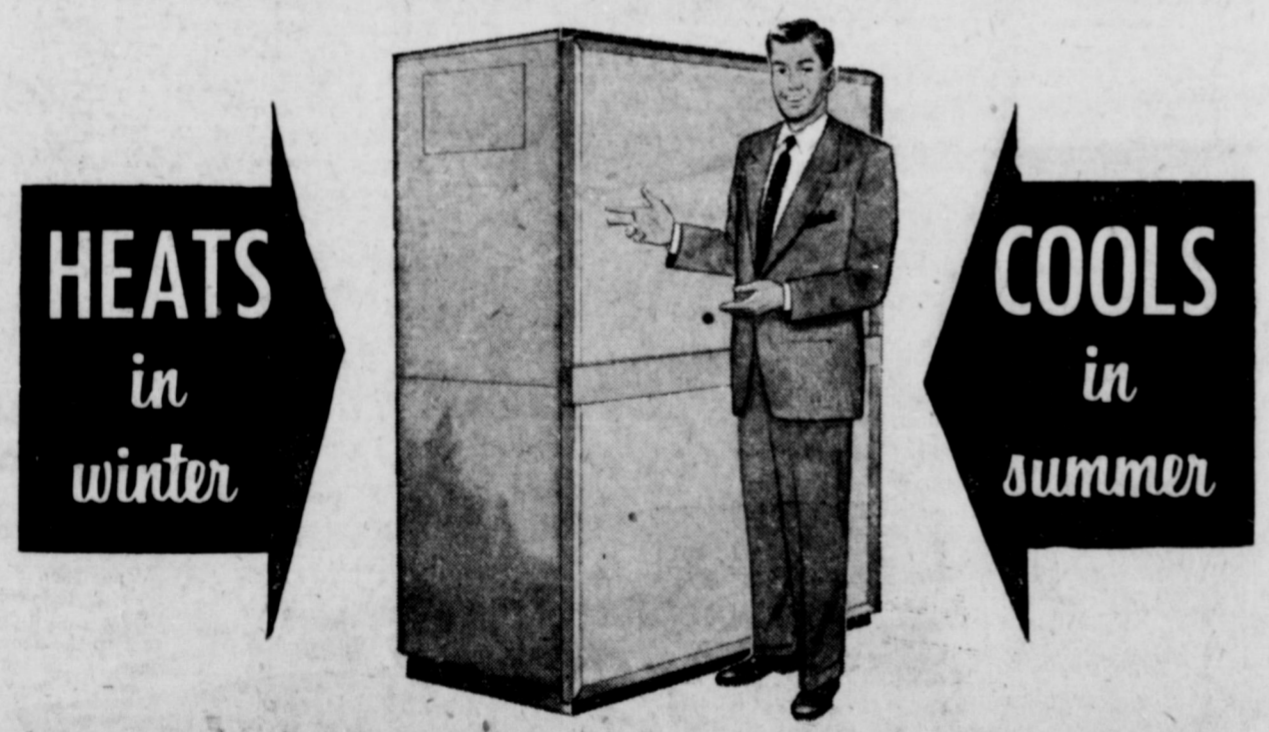

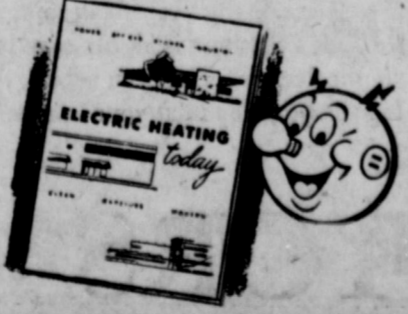

### College Head Gets Five Year Contract

Dr. Price R. Ashton, president of Ranger Junior College, was given a five-year extension to his contract as college president at a recent meeting of the Board of Regents, it was announced here today by Chairman of the Board, Morris Newnam.

Dr. Ashton is serving his third year as president of the rapidly growing school. In 1953, Ranger Junior College had 215 students, eight full-time instructors and seven part-time teachers. At the present time the college staff consists of 25 full-time and 12 part-time instructors and an enrollment of 556.

The number of state-approved courses has doubled since 1953. The college head is listed among Who's Who in America, Who's Who in American Education, Who's Who in the Southwest, and his most recent honor was the election to the American Institute of Sound Management.

As the Board of Regents reviewed the progress of Ranger Junior College, it was noted that state support has changed from the individual student basis to a straight apportionment to the college. This amount has grown from \$28,000 in 1952 to \$112,000 in 1955 and 1956.

One new boy's dormitory and a new girl's dormitory were completed in 1954 and in the same year a dormitory formerly occupied by girls was converted into a boys dormitory. At present the col-

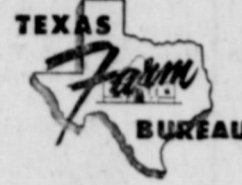

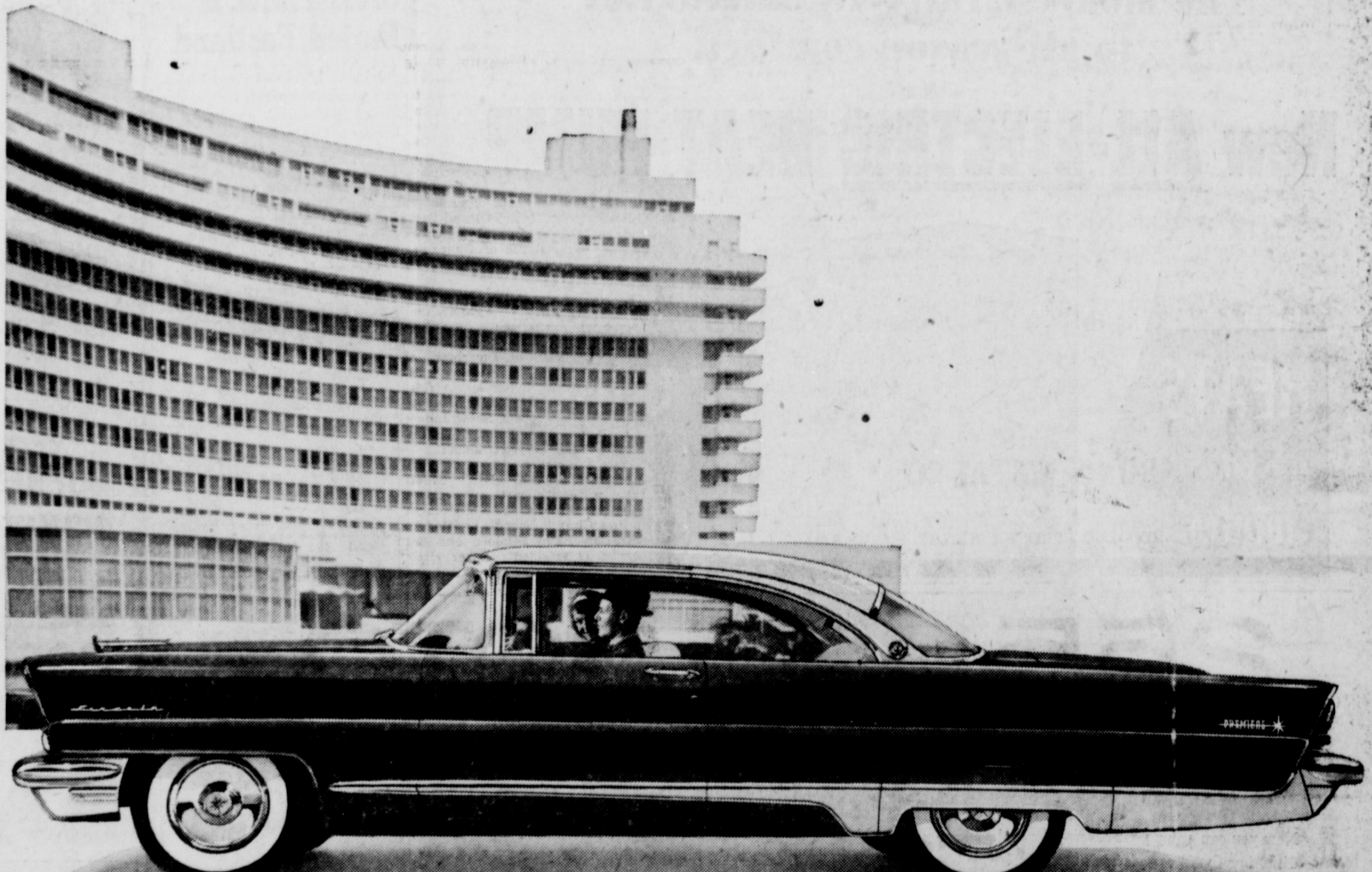

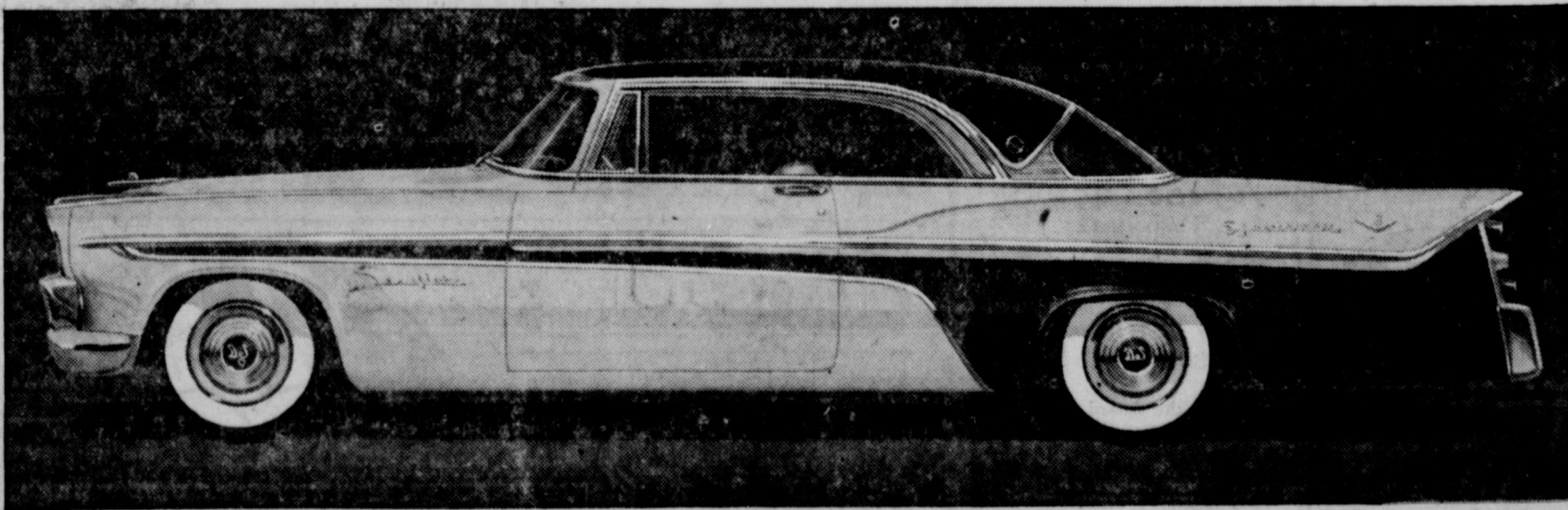

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Always Good Eating—Spanish Omelet



Eggs, always so popular, are at their delicious best in a fluffy omelet, and for tops in good eating add a piquant Spanish Sauce. Light and puffy omelets stay up for serving when quick-cooking tapioca is one of the ingredients. Try this recipe and see for yourself.

Spanish Omelet

- 2 tablespoons quick-cooking tapioca
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper
- 3/4 cup milk
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 4 egg whites
- 4 egg yolks
- Spanish Sauce\*

Combine tapioca, salt, pepper, and milk in saucepan. Place over medium heat and cook until mixture comes to a boil, stirring constantly. Add butter. Remove from heat and allow to cool slightly while beating eggs.

Beat egg white until stiff. Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Add tapioca mixture to egg yolks and mix well. Fold into egg whites.

Turn into hot buttered 10-inch skillet. Cook over low heat 3 minutes. Then bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 15 minutes. Omelet is sufficiently cooked when a knife inserted comes out clean. Cut across at right angles to handle of pan, being careful not to cut all the way through. Fold carefully from handle to opposite side and turn out on hot platter. Serve Spanish Sauce between folded layers and around omelet. Serve at once. Makes 4 servings.

\*Spanish Sauce: Melt 6 tablespoons butter or other fat in saucepan. Add 1/4 cup each chopped onion and chopped green pepper and saute until onions are golden brown. Add 1 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons sugar, dash of cayenne, 1 cup canned sliced mushrooms and 2 cups canned tomatoes. Cook over low heat 15 minutes, or until vegetables are tender.

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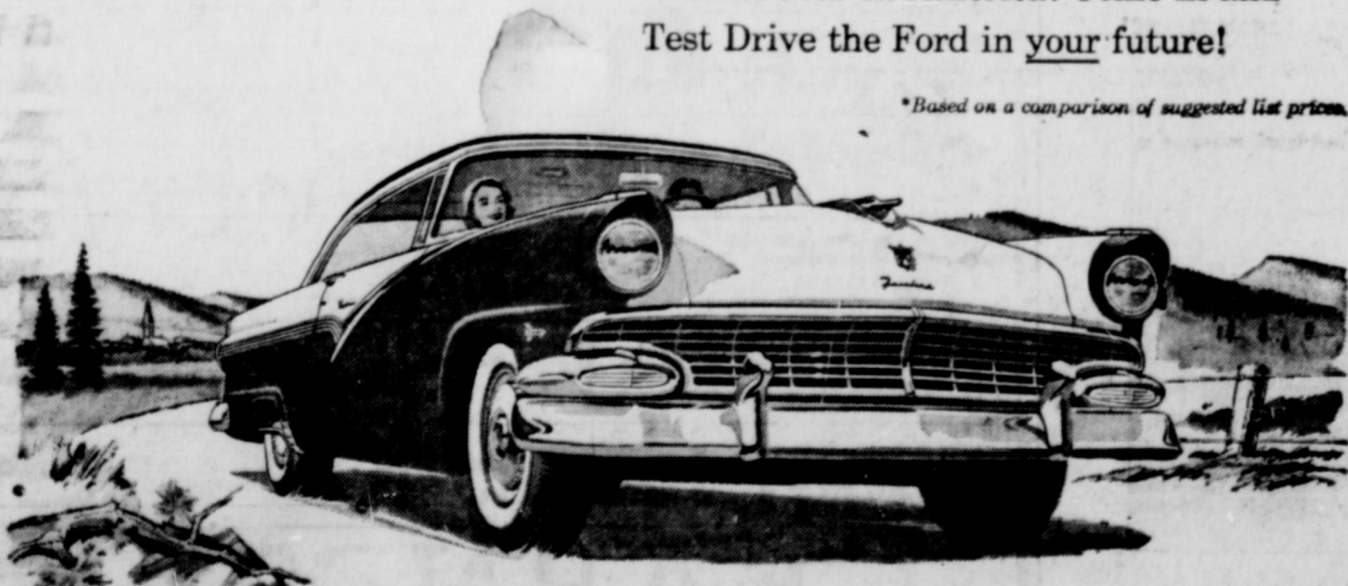
