Importance of Area-Wide Labor, Skills Survey Studied, Considered

Need for an up-to-date, accurate manpower survey of Eastland County was vividly illustrated this past week during a regular meeting of Eastland chamber of commerce board of directors.

The Eastland directors indicated that they are ready to begin such a survey and are negotiating with chambers in Cisco and Ranger relative, to a joint effort, from which all can benefit.

It is generally assumed by most in the country that a surplus of available labor exists, but prospective industries cannot accept "assump-

It was the feeling of directors that a joint, county-wide survey would be most beneficial, with all towns participating and sharing the benefit of the compiled information. Details of such a survey would be worked out, but generally it would be a direct-mail approach, with confidential questionnaires being

mailed to the some 7,000 families in the county, asking of members' availability for employment, education and skill backgrounds, and other pertinent information needed by potential employers.

C-C President Don Viergiver, local manager of Hollywood-Vassarette, largest local employer, presided. Maddox has directed survey in Sweetwater, San Angelo, Midland, Odessa and other towns. Such a survey is a tool, a vital one, he said, in inducing industry. "It isn't a guarantee of any kind, but it certainly gives your people specifics with which they can negotiate."

Progress Reported By Historical Survey Group

Members of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee met last Monday in Rising Star with Mrs. Lee White, representative. Five guests interested in the accomplishments of the committee, were present to hear representatives from different towns give reports on cemetery workings of their area, according to County Chairman Mike Collins.

At this meeting, it was learned that the Commissioners Court has maintained space in the Court House for an office, in which the Historical Survey Committee may store records and hold meetings.

It is hoped that by next summer the Central Cemetery, located half-way between Eastland and Cisco, will be restored and cleaned (which committee-men are in the process of doing now) and a road from Highway 80 to the cemetery will be constructed. (Continued on page 2)

Then, it will be a model of what the committee hopes other people will try to accomplish in their own county.

By September, members will begin compiling cemetery information, which after completed, will be given to Cisco and Ranger Junior Colleges journalism classes; and in turn they will prepare the information and submit it to a printing company for the brochure printing. There are approximately 75 cemeteries and burial grounds in Eastland County.

A county map, showing cemeteries and roads to reach them, is being made, according to Collins, and within the next few months will be displayed in the lobby of the court house.

Graves in Eastland County of confederate soldiers are still being hunted by the Survey Committee. Anyone having information concerning graves (or any other cemetery information) is asked to contact a local representative so that the graves may be checked out and the information put on record.

The next meeting is scheduled to be in Carbon on June 28; however there is a possibility that the plans may change since the dedication of Fort Blair in Desdemona will be held in the near future.

ducted at the First Methodist Church. The Rev. J. Morris Bailey, pastor, read the 23rd Psalm and Romans 8:31-39, and Mrs. Gloria Graham Stroud, a cousin of the deceased airman, played "Ave Maria" as a violin solo without accompaniment.

The Rev. Elwin Skiles, Abilene Baptist minister and an old friend of the family, gave a biographical sketch of Major Bell and brought a message of comfort. Lloyd London of Cisco sang the Navy hymn, "Eternal Father Strong to Save." He was accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Wm. E. Austin, also of Cisco.

An honor guard of four airmen stood beside the casket at the church and, at the conclusion of the service there, they folded one of two flags that draped the casket and presented it to the major's mother, Mrs. Ida Lee Edwards.

At the cemetery, Major Eugene F. Williams, chaplain at Dyess AF Base, was in charge of the military service, which included a brief eulogy and prayer by Major Williams, a 15-volley gun salute by a Dyess firing squad, and the playing of "Taps" by Jerral Finch of the U S Naval Reserve Center at Brownwood.

The casket flag was folded and presented by Major Williams to Mrs. Robert G. Bell, the widow.

As the casket started into the grave, an aerial tribute was presented by the famous Air Force Thunderbirds, precision flying team with whom Major Bell formerly flew.

First, a six-plane formation in F-100s flew in from the north at 400 miles per hour and at about 300 feet. They were in a "Cross" formation for the north-to-south fly-over. Two of the planes dropped out of the final south-to-north fly-over, which was in a standard diamond formation. The rear and top plane, known as the "slot man," pulled up and away as the planes crossed the cemetery. If the skies had not been covered with fairly low clouds, the slot man would have gone almost straight up for several thousand feet. The pull-up signified the loss of a formation member.

The Thunderbirds, whose busy schedule takes them throughout the world, flew here Friday morning from Nellis AFB, Nevada, their home base. The Cisco fly-over was the first of three missions they had for Friday before returning to their base.

More than 50 military men were present in uniform for the service. They included Col. E. O. Martin commanding officer of Dyess AFB, and aviators from both coasts, Washington, D. C., and elsewhere — friends of the young career Air Force officer. Lt. Comdr. Clyde Welch of Naval Air Station, San Diego, was present in Navy uniform.

Major Jack Tullett, official Air Force Escort officer who had been with Major Bell's body since shortly after his death in Viet Nam, described the tribute as "something that his family and friends will long remember and appreciate."

Major Bell was born in Cisco May 23, 1930. He attended the public schools at Houston and spent three years at Peacock Military Academy in San Antonio, graduating with honors in 1948. He entered the Naval Academy and was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Air Force when he finished in 1952.

An active military pilot for some 12 years, Major Bell had flown throughout the Pacific and at several bases in the United States. He spent two years as a member of the Thunderbird team before beginning his final assignment. He was stationed aboard a Navy Aircraft Carrier, the name and mission of which remain classified. His decorations included the Air Medal.

Mrs. Robert Bell and children, Wesley, 11, and Cheri, 9, were expected to rest here until Sunday when they were expected to fly back to their home in San Diego, Calif. After the children's school year ends, they were expected to return to Texas to make their home. Mrs. Bell is the former Jacquelyn Rogers of Houston.

Major Tullett expected to return to his assignment at Homestead AF Base, Florida, after the weekend.

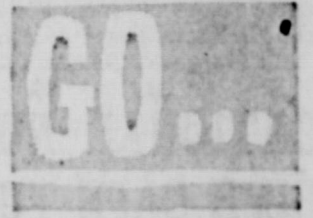

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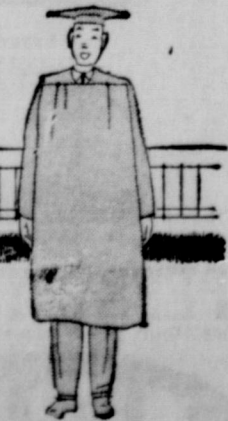

In addition to calling on feed manufacturers, Mr. Kincaid calls on veterinarians in an area bounded by Fort Worth, San Angelo, and Austin.

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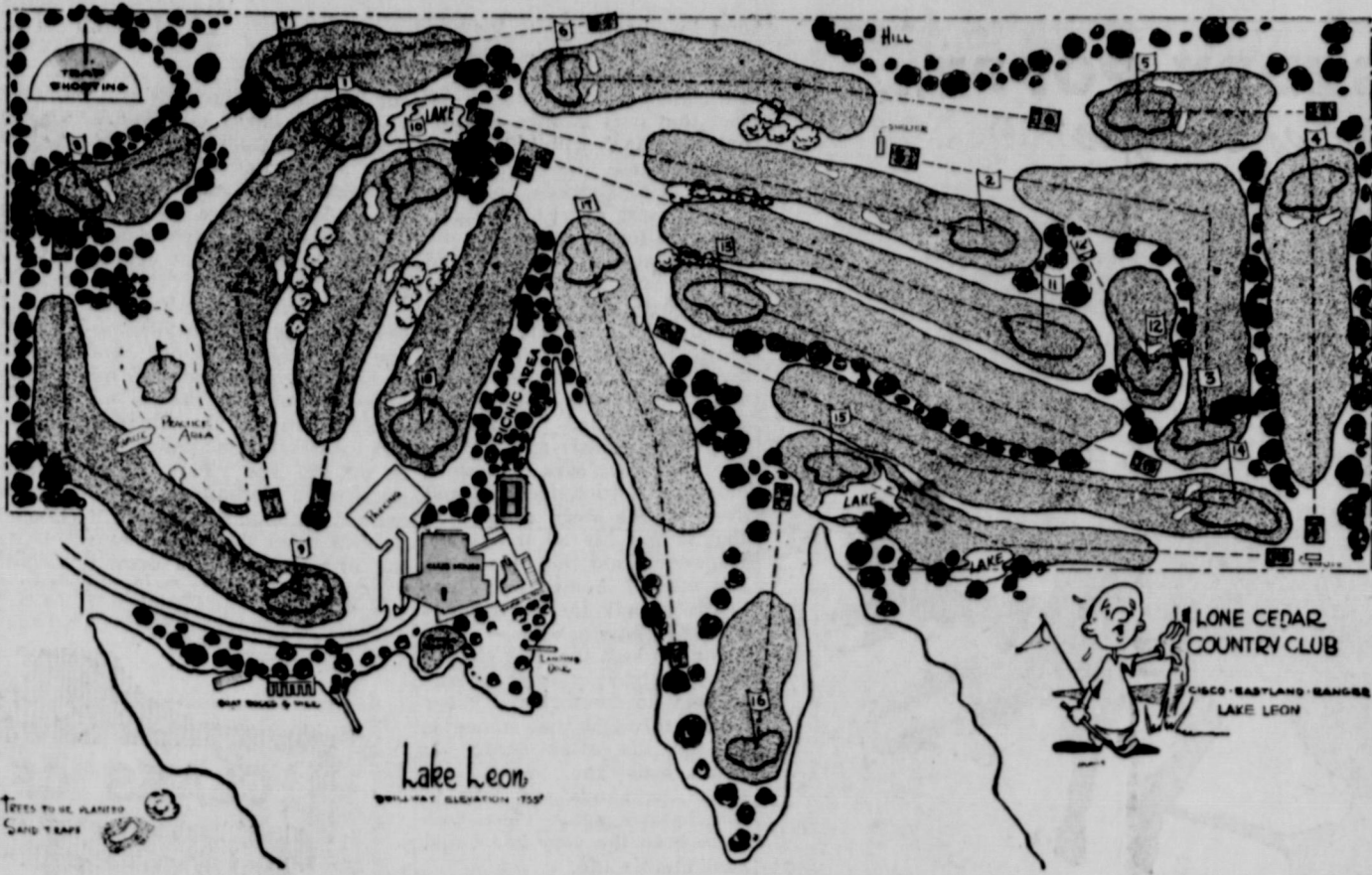

Photo Lithography Approved For CJC

Approval by the Texas Agency of a course in Photo Lithography at Cisco Junior College is the only junior college between Fort Worth and El Paso to date which has announced that it will offer the course next fall.

The first semester will include a survey of lithography, an introduction to the working of the principles of line photography, vari typer operation, headliner operation, offset preparatory processes, and introduction to offset presswork.

Cold type makeup, typographic and machine typesetting theory, platemaking science, offset press operation and problems will be included during the second semester. Third and fourth semesters will take up graphic arts techniques, color theory, bindery processes, English and arithmetic for printers, principles of job composition and heavy emphasis on production work.

Offset Photo Lithography includes training and experience in the latest methods and techniques for qualifying for employment in the Graphic Arts field. Jobs would be available in the printing industry, magazine, advertising firms, and many allied businesses, Mr. Hogue said. This is a fast growing field, commanding respectable wages, he stressed.

Tuition and fees will be comparable to those charged for academic courses and laboratory classes. A minimum additional charge is made for equipment usage, materials and supplies in these programs.
