## Dr. R. H. Garrett Family Sails for Africa July 7 To Serve As Missionaries

On a farm in Muleshoe, Texas, 12 years ago, a young farmer, 25, felt that God was calling him for service.

Now, after studying premed at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales, N. M., graduating from Baylor Medical School and taking internship and residency at Albuquerque, N. M. this man, Dr. Robert Henry Garrett is looking forward to sailing July 7 for Rodesia, Africa, where he will attend a language school for one year, then begin his work in a hospital at Sanyati Reserve.

Dr. Garrett, who has attended Southwestern Theological Seminary in Fort Worth for the past year, was appointed as a missionary for Rodesia in May of '64.

In Africa, he and his family will live 60 miles from the nearest town. Dr. Garrett and his wife, Eloise, have four children, Alita age 10; Bryce, who will be 9 on July 7 (sailing date); Cayla, who will be 8 in August; and Dusty, four years old.

He served with the U. S. Navy (Jan., 1950) and this past year, while in Seminary training, has assisted Dr. M. A. Treadwell Jr. at Eastland Medical and Surgical Clinic.

A call from God led Dr. Garrett from the town in which he grew up and for five years, into the medical field while preparing himself for service to God and others in a way he felt he was needed.

**COURSE IN SELLING, SERVING TOURISTS PLANNED BY**

A five-hour adult education course, "Selling and Serving Tourists," is designed to help those people who come in closest contact with tourists and the traveling public—personnel from hotels and motels, restaurants, service stations, retail stores, transportation firms, parks and recreational employees, banks and utility companies, and others.

Applications Being Taken for Some 70 DPS Vacancies

Roger Sosebee, in charge of the Eastland County Office, Department of Public Safety, announced today that there are 70 vacancies in the patrol services with annual salaries going into September 1 with an annual raise one year later. The vacancies exist in all parts of the State, and will be filled by competitive examination. Salaries will range from \$453 up to \$484 per month, depending on the length of service. Sosebee said that there is an opportunity for young men to be employed in a proud organization whose purpose is to serve and protect the people of Texas. "It is also an opportunity for men to further their education while in training," he said. Student patrolmen receive some 800 hours of study in 95 subjects, such as highway law, accident investigation, first aid, professional driving, care and use of firearms and many other courses. While in training at the DPS Law Enforcement Academy in Austin, trainees receive \$375 per month and after 16 weeks they become commissioned officers. Applications and other information can be obtained by contacting any DPS Patrolman or the Eastland County Courthouse DPS office. July 6 is the deadline for filing applications for the next examination on July 14 and 15 for the training school beginning August 31.

ST OF MEDICARE? HERE IT FOR INDIVIDUALS, FIRMS

Too much has been said in the moral and emotional and too little on the cost, in the drive to enact the program. Already it has passed the House. It now awaits in the Senate, and admittedly it appears pretty likely that it will pass there, too. The program would raise the total Social Security withholding in eight stages over the next 21 years. In 1966, the salary base would be increased from \$4,800 to \$5,600; the Social Security tax would go up to 4 per cent, and a new hospital insurance tax rate of .35 per cent would be added. This would cost the employer and employee each \$243.60 per year, as compared to the present \$174. The salary base, the Social Security tax rate and the hospital insurance tax rate would be stepped up by stages in the coming years, making the cost to the individual and the employer higher each time. The salary base would go up to \$10,000, to \$6,600 in 1971. The Social Security tax would go up to 4.4 per cent in 1969 and 4.8 per cent in 1973. The hospital insurance tax rate would go up to .50 of a per cent in 1967, .55 per cent in 1973, .60 per cent in 1979, .70 per cent in 1980 and .80 per cent in 1987. The total cost to the employer and employee, each, by 1987, would be \$396.60 a year. IF subsequent congresses don't pile more tax on top of that, and who will bet they won't? The \$369.60 a year means, for the employer, \$33.30 a month. For employers, that can be multiplied by the number of covered employees, and for even some medium sized Abilene firms, that can run into a lot of money, a tremendous boost in cost of doing business. This is taxation, exactly as direct as income taxes. Somewhere there is the point beyond which individuals and corporations, the national economy, cannot carry further tax burden. Where?—The Abilene Reporter-News.

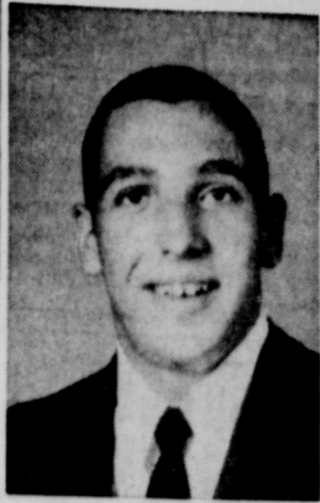

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF TEXAS: That Sections 2 and 3 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members.

Section 3. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory as equal in population, as far as possible.

Section 4. The Legislature enabling legislation in connection with this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

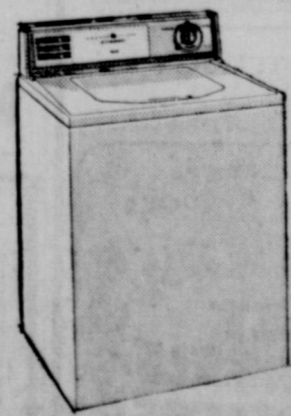

She stressed that self-control, the power of wise decisions, the power of observation, and reliability are important traits of a good nurse but can not be put on with a cap - they must be patiently acquired. The students were challenged to strive diligently to acquire those traits and to wear the school cap with pride and dignity.

The impressive candlelit ceremony was performed with each student nurse picking up a lamp and lighting the candle in it, after which her director of nurses placed the cap on her head. When all students were capped and had lamps burning, the stage lights were turned off and the song "My Task" was sung by Yvonna Glover.
