file of labor information yearly, keeping it up-to-date and timely.

Each group is to submit the suggestions to its own board of directors for final approval, and definite action is expected to be taken within the next few months. The survey will be a direct-mail approach with the questionnaires being returned to a central location for compilation of data. This data then would be distributed for chamber use in dealing with employers. (However the individual questionnaires will be considered confidential and not made public or used in distribution in any way. Only the compiled, finished material would be public property.)

(As an example, from such a survey, a chamber official might be able to tell a potential employer that "there are X number of men, aged 17 to 21 years of age, who have finished high school, and have such and such skill available for employment.")

This then would be a vital link in the chain of providing jobs for young people, and helping those others who need work find it here in this county, without having to move to some other area in order to work. This would strengthen the population and the economic index of every community in the county and benefit everyone, it was agreed.

STATE REP. Wayne Gibbens had a busy span of 10 days during the recent session of the Texas Legislature.

Here, in brief, from an Austin newsman is comment relating to Rep. Gibbens accomplishments:

"As was the case with chairmen of other demanding committees, Rep. Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge had little time to his own bills. Most of the his time was taken with some 100 insurance bills, most highly technical and several, highly controversial.

"But some significant legislation carries Gibbens' name, Pooling bill which he co-authored; one to create a Water Resources Board; one authorizing five days' paid sick leave annually for teachers, and one requiring credit insurance companies to pay \$500 annual fees to the State Insurance Board.

"Gibbens' bill, which failed to pass included those authorizing joint stockmutual insurance companies; one relating to re-insurance provisions in health insurance policies; a proposal to create a Water Resources Research Institute, and one to create a Juvenile Board in Eastland County."

BILL OF RIGHTS: ARTICLE V: "Trials for crimes; just compensation for private property taken for public use. — "No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation."

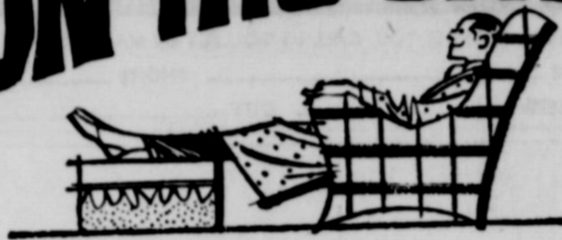

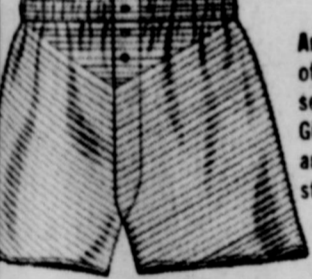

COUNTY SCREW WORM FOUND EXCEEDS ASSIGNED QUOTA

Eastland County raised its share of the voluntary phase of the screw worm eradication program with contributions in excess of askings, according to Oscar Schaefer, county chairman of the program.

A tabulation released by Glyn Gilliam, Ranger banker and secretary of the program in the county, showed total contributions of \$3,041.50. The county had been asked to contribute \$3,000.00 to keep the program under way until the governments of the United States and Mexico take over the eradication work in July.

Gorman led in contributions with \$744.70; Rising Star contributed \$701.51 and Cisco \$606.87. Ranger contributions totaled \$592.83 and Eastland \$395.65, according to the tabulation. Community totals are not significant, however, Mr. Schaefer pointed out, since some of the smaller communities had much larger cattle raising areas from which to secure contributions. "We are very proud of the record which our county has

made in supporting the screw worm eradication with cash contributions," said Mr. Schaefer. "as Secretary Orville Freeman said in a meeting with Mexican Secretary Juan Gil Preciado at the eradication center at Mission the other day, it is one of the best investments ever made in agricultural research and the biggest single breakthrough in controlling pests through the peaceful use of atomic power."

He added that the banks of the county would continue to accept contributions.

The Mexican and American agricultural secretaries met at the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation center at Mission to initiate plans for a take-over of the eradication program jointly by their governments.

Over the Southwest at large, contributions to the final phase of the voluntary program were more than double the \$300,000 asked, Mr. Schaefer said.

In the four years that the program for control of the screw worm has resulted in

Corpman Russell Aboard Carrier

Chief Hospital Corpman Whit H. Russell, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Whit O. Russell of Gorman is serving aboard the destroyer USS Blandy, an alternate recovery ship for 4 orbital mission. His ship was a unit of Navy Task Force 140, the primary recovery organization for the manned four-day, 1.7 million mile space mission.

The Blandy was stationed in the Atlantic along the path of the Gemini spacecraft. A total of 10,300 Navy personnel, 22 Navy ships, and 41 Navy aircraft in both the Atlantic and Pacific were joined by units of the Army, Air Force, Marine Corps and Coast Guard to provide a worldwide location and recovery capability at sea.

Normally operating as part of an Atlantic operational fleet organization, his ship was earmarked for Task Force 140 several weeks in advance of the mission. Since its assignment, her crew trained extensively in recovery technique and communications procedure necessary for smooth task force coordination.

a reduction of cases of infestation from 6,306 in Texas in 1962 to 45 in the first five months of 1965. Mr. Schaefer pointed out. There have been no reports of infestation in this county this year, the nearest case being at Menard.

However, the number of infestations reported in May increased 120 per cent over the number recorded in May of 1964, an indication of the necessity of prosecuting the control program vigorously, said the county chairman.

The pest is controlled by the release of sterile male flies which mate ineffectually with the female fly. Irradiation with an atomic product accomplishes the sterility.

1 Killed, 5 Hurt In May Traffic

During the month of May, the Texas Department of Public Safety reported one fatal accident in Eastland County, five personal injury accidents, and five accidents resulting in property damage, making a total of 11 accidents. There was one death, ten persons injured and a property damage total of \$16,770.

The following was reported by the Dept. in comparing traffic accidents in the Eastland area for the first five months of 1965 with the same period in 1964.

In 1965 there were two fatal accidents, in 1964, three; personal injury accidents in 1965, 20—in '64, 25; and property damage accidents, 47 in 1965 and 54 in '64, which brought the total to 69 in 1965 and 32 in '64. There were three deaths in 1965 and three in '64; injured persons, 33 in 1965 and 36 in '64; and property damage, in 1965—\$48,550 and in '64—\$41,444.

A REPORT ON WEATHER CONDITIONS AFFECTING TV RECEPTION IN EASTLAND COUNTY BY B. B. HONEYCUTT, CHIEF ENGINEER

Your recent correspondence indicates that you are having trouble receiving KRLD-TV, Channel 4, Dallas, Texas. Most seriously affected are viewers who are 50 to 60 miles or further in distance from our Channel 4 transmitting plant at Cedar Hill, Texas.

We should like to point out that the interference you are experiencing is primarily caused by Mother Nature and is not the fault of Channel 4 transmitting station, and in nearly every case, is also not the fault of your TV receiver.

Along about this time each Spring or Summer there are disturbances in the upper atmosphere caused by natural phenomena, which usually affect normal television reception to some extent. Occasionally, however, these natural disturbances become much more aggravated and pronounced than usual — and this year is just such a year.

These turbulences of nature cause bad picture disturbances and at times cause TV stations from quite some distances to be received by your TV set, blotting out partially or completely your regular favorite TV channels.

In this case, such unwanted signals can take the form of mixing with your Channel 4 picture or sound and further causing fadeouts, buzzing venetian blind effects and other weird occurrences. Also it is possible for adjacent channel TV stations to spill over into the Channel 4 picture and mix with the Channel 4 sound uninvited.

We would recommend that you have a competent TV service technician look over your set if you suspect definite set trouble. However, these aggravated natural conditions will subside after a few days, or at most a few weeks, and your reception should return to normal.

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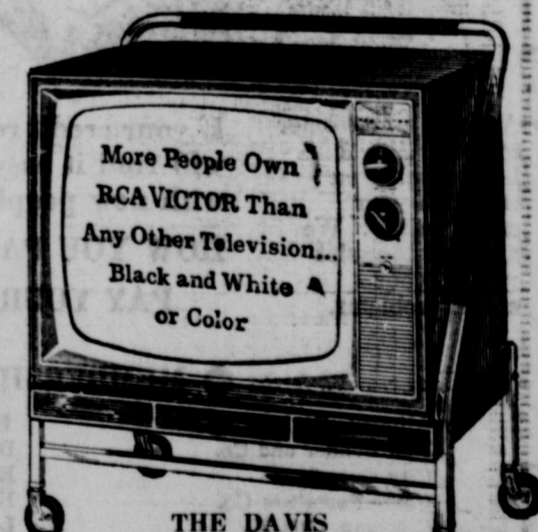
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
