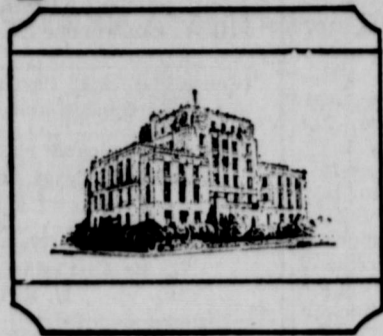
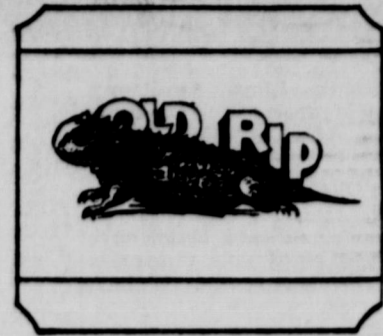

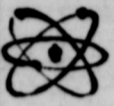

6-Month Rainfall Hits 15.60 Inches

Eastland County peanut crops, virtually all planted, and many already up, have a head start of an inch and three-quarters above average this year, as the first six months rolls by and the growing season gets underway.

Rainfall totals 15.60 inches through June, and average for the period is 13.85 inches. This year's total is considerably above last year's 9.26 inches for the first six months.

Three days of rain in June amounted to 1.22 of moisture, Official Weather Observer James Smith reports. Rain fell on the fifth, (.90); the 12th, (.18); and on the 22nd, (.14).

Highest temperature for June was 95, recorded on several days, including the last day, Wednesday. Low was 56 on the sixth.

May remains the high rain month for the year to date with 8.48 inches officially recorded. A parched .54 of an inch fell in March, and January and February duplicated with 2.10 inches each. In April, there was 1.16 inches. July isn't noted for its moisture, with .69 of an inch average, although five inches plus fell back in '60 and '61. August, however, carries a heavy average with 5.83 par, but you'd have to go clear back to '14 when 7.83 was measured, to find a really wet August.

FB Insurance Assets Surpass \$10 Million

The Texas Farm Bureau Mutual Insurance Co. has recently surpassed asset strength of more than \$10 million for the first time in the company's history according to B. C. Jones, executive vice president.

Mr. Jones also said that this attainment gives the company an increase in assets from \$3,511,164 to \$10,202,247 from December 31, 1960 to June 1965.

This makes a 190 per cent growth in the past 4½ years. The new plateau of financial strength and size will enable the company to be of even more service to Texas Farm Bureau members in the future.

The Tankersleys have three children, Steve age 11, Teresa age six and Bruce age three, the older two receiving schooling furnished by Mobil Oil Company, taught by American teachers.

In the desert some 400 miles from Tripoli, where everything is sand (no grass), is where Mr. Tankersley's job takes him, in case any of his Eastland friends wish to "drop around" sometime.

Once every three weeks Tankersley and his fellow-workers board a plane and fly home (Tripoli).

Although there are many Americans in Tripoli, the

population which is about 150,000, is comprised mostly of Arabians, some of whom still live as in the old days, in the desert with camels and goats.

One evening, the Tankersleys accepted an invitation to have dinner with an Arab family.

Sitting on pillows in the floor and eating food known as "push cus" in Libia, they were treated as royalty; and although the Arabian family could speak no English, the Tankersleys reported that "it was a real experience."

When visiting natives of that country, it is customary to take a gift when welcomed into the home. Mr. and Mrs. Tankersley took sugar, which is very expensive and which most families cannot afford to buy there.

Teresa was given a baracan (what women there use to wrap around themselves, serving as a dress) from an Arab man who visited in their home. Most all clothes in Libia are Italian (and expensive), they report.

A custom in that country, somewhat odd, is that the men there are allowed to have four wives; and quite different from the United States, where women are seen wearing short - shorts (and what-have-you), women there wear clothes which completely cover them except their feet and one eye.

If a man sees an eye or pair of feet he likes, he talks to the lady's father about marriage. If the father consents, and if the interested fellow has enough pounds (money) he may buy the woman. In American money, a pound is \$2.80.

Streets in Tripoli are narrow and the only transportation is by Fiat (an Italian car), bicycle or carts pulled by people.

Leaving on July 7 to return to Libia, Mr. and Mrs. Tankersley will live there six months longer, then move back to the states permanently.

Enroute to the states, they stopped in Denmark, Holland and London. On the way back, they will stop in Spain. "It's really been a wonderful experience, but it isn't home," the Tankersleys say.
