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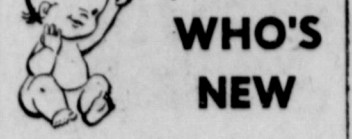

## Food Sense - Not Nonsense



### More Than A Pattern - Cut It To Size

From foods to furniture, patterns are available for everything now that it is the vogue to "do-it-yourself." Breakfasts, too, should be made from patterns. These patterns, however, should be adjustable with mother "cutting to size" breakfasts to suit nutritional needs of each family member.

On every hand is the reminder, "Eat a Good Big Breakfast." How big is big when it means breakfast? From one of the surveys of the breakfast habits of young people, comes a basic pattern for adequate breakfasts. Purdue University judged breakfasts of women students by the following yardstick: (1) fruit or fruit juices; (2) cereal with milk, or an egg; (3) milk or cocoa made with milk; and (4) whole grain or enriched bread with butter or margarine. Of the students, approximately one-third included three of these types of food and another third, only two types. Only a few had all four and the remainder ate only one food or did not breakfast at all.

These breakfast habits were developed at an early school age. They were found to be an indication of the student's total daily diet. If breakfast is eaten, though inadequate, the total diet will score higher than if breakfast were skipped.

Research workers at the University of Iowa found the calorie to be one of the gauges to determine the bigness of the breakfast. Young men and women whose balanced breakfasts supplied one-fourth of their daily calorie needs, were able to work more efficiently throughout the morning.

Physical activity tests revealed that a basic cereal breakfast consisting of fruit, cereal, milk and enriched bread and butter or a bacon-and-egg breakfast were equally efficient energy-wise, providing each supplied 25 percent of the daily caloric needs.

So measure and cut breakfasts to energy needs; up calories for youngsters and active adults. Be certain to include the protein and B vitamin contributing foods—enriched bread, cereals and milk.

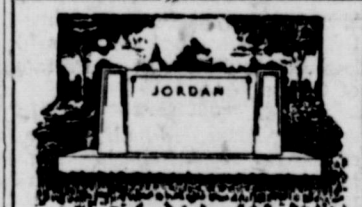

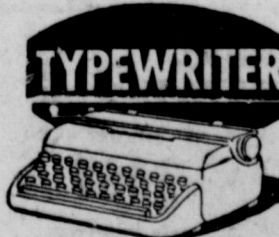

### Recipe For Strawberry Mallow Pie

4 cups Corn Flakes; 1-4 cup butter or margarine; 2 tablespoons sugar.

1-10-ounce package frozen strawberries; 1 tablespoon unflavored gelatin; 16 marshmallows, halved; 1 tablespoon lemon juice; 1 cup whipping cream. Crush Corn Flakes into fine crumbs. Blend butter and sugar. Stir in Corn Flakes crumbs; mix well. Press evenly and firmly around sides and bottom of 9-inch pie pan. Chill.

Defrost berries; drain, saving juice. Add enough water to juice to make 1-2 cup. Soften gelatin in 1-4 cup of the juice and water. over boiling water. Add marshmallows and cook, stirring constantly, until marshmallows are melted and mixture is smooth.

Add gelatin, stirring until dissolved. Chill until mixture begins to set. Stir in lemon juice. Whip cream until stiff. Fold into mallow mixture together with drained strawberries. Spread in chilled crust. Chill until firm. Garnish with strawberries. Yield: 19-inch pie.

So even if your name doesn't have that typical Irish lilt of a Colleen Murphy or a Patrick O'Toole, give your family this special treat on St. Patrick's Day, March 17th.

**A Stew Of Distinction**  
 1 1/2 pounds lamb for stew, cut in 1 1/2-inch cubes.  
 2 tablespoons lard or drippings

3 cups hot water  
 4 carrots, cut lengthwise  
 1 stalk celery, small, cut in 4-inch pieces  
 6 medium potatoes, halved  
 1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
 1/8 teaspoon pepper  
 2 tablespoons chopped parsley  
 Brown the lamb in lard or drippings. Add hot water, cover and simmer slowly for 1 1/2 hours. About 45 minutes before serving, add the carrots, celery, onions and potatoes, season. Serve the lamb in the center of a large chop plate surrounded by the vegetables, arranged neatly. Sprinkle the meat with the chopped parsley. Thicken the cooking liquid for gravy. Yield 4 to 6 servings.

Brady competing against a record-breaking 35 high school entry list easily took honors with 41 points over Winters, the second-place contender, who amassed only 21 points.

Coleman pulled in third with 11

points and Ballinger grabbed the fourth slot with 10 points.

Point surges in the college division were more closely divided. Tarleton accumulated 44 1/2 points, Cisco had 30, Howard County took third place with 29 and Ranger Junior College finished with 27 1/2 points.

Tommy Davis of Grandbury broke his old record set last year in the 440-yard run with a time of 52.5 seconds. He set the meet record last year at 53 seconds.

L. Fincher and Cooper of Diamond Hill also set meet records in the pole vault when they both cleared the bar at 11 feet and three inches.

Dave Ryerly of Coleman, set a new record in the mile run as he paced the distance in 4:45.7.

J. D. Hanson, who holds the meets 220-yard hurdle record at the Gorman meet in the high school division, picked up a first in the event for Ranger Junior College. He set the record in 1953 while a student at Eastland High School.

Ranger Junior College also picked up two other firsts with Don Mitchell jumping 20 feet and 11 inches in the pole vault contest and Phillip Stovall tied Brown of Howard County in the high jump at 11 feet for second place. Weldon Curbo placed second in the high jump.

Lenoi Crisp placed third in the shot put event and Hanson ran third in the 100-yard dash. The sprint relay team for Ranger Junior College also placed third with Ronald Darnell, Mitchell, Harold McCurry and Hanson running for the local cindermen.
