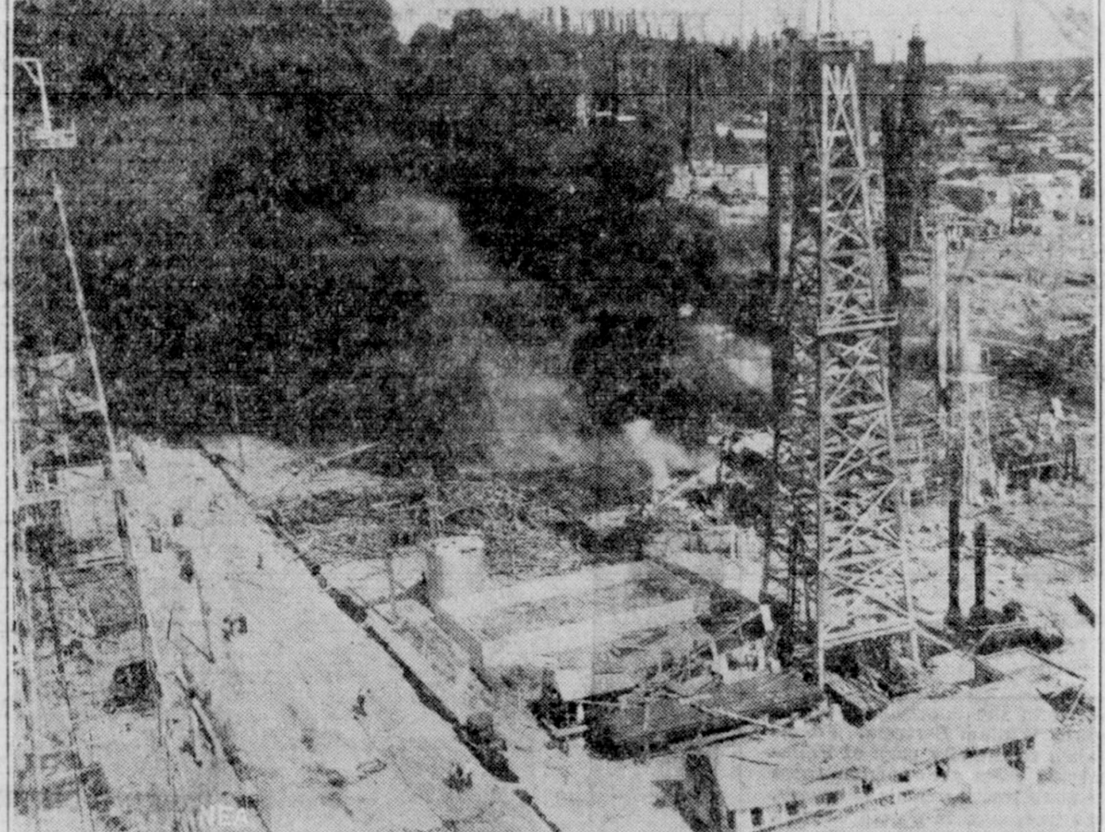
GAS BLAST ROCKS SIGNAL HILL

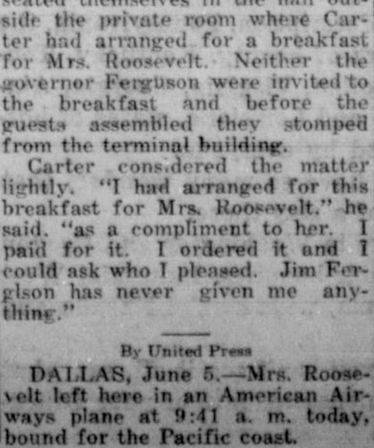

THE NEW DEAL TO ALSO BE A CLEAN DEAL

If newspaper reports are true, it is up to President Roosevelt to decide whether or not William H. Woodin remains in the cabinet as secretary of the treasury. Due to disclosures made by the Senate committee concerning the secretary's connection with J. P. Morgan & Co. he has expressed a readiness to resign, if the President considers his usefulness destroyed.

There is no intimation at this time as to how the President feels towards Woodin and other officials who were listed as preferred customers of Morgan and his organization, although he has expressed a desire for a complete investigation of this banking institution. Some writers, who are in close touch with the situation, claim that Roosevelt has been reaching for the banker's scalp ever since he went into office and give him credit for the instigation of the investigation. It is said that as early as March he told Chairman Fletcher of the banking committee to drop what he was doing and go after big fish.

Whether or not the President knew how many and the kind of fish that would be caught, when the net was cast, is doubtful. Evidently the first drag revealed some that he did not expect to find in the pool and at the same time places upon him the duty of ridding the administration of some men in important posts. It is claimed that the work of Norman Davis at Geneva is just about done, that soon he will drift home and nothing else will be found for him to do. It is also claimed by those in close touch with affairs that this same ease out policy will be observed with regard to Secretary Woodin, unless there is public clamor for immediate removal. From this distance it looks as if the new deal would also be a clean deal.

CONTINUE RELIEF WORK PLANS

The relief work in Eastland is closed down for a few days awaiting funds, but this does not mean that nothing can be done during this time. Arrangements for projects on which work can be done must be made. These arrangements can be made just as well, or better, while work is not in progress.

Alex Clark, who is in charge of this work, is always looking ahead for something to do. He has time now to investigate any possible project to determine whether or not it has sufficient merit to warrant the expenditure of relief funds. Why not call him, or see him, while he is not busy directing work, and determine whether or not that street in front of your home can be listed among those to be surfaced.

Possibly you have in mind some other project for the improvement of Eastland that might be worked out with R. F. C. funds. If so, get in touch with some of the relief officials and see if something can be done about it. A movement is under way for a better Eastland. Lend your aid in any way you can.

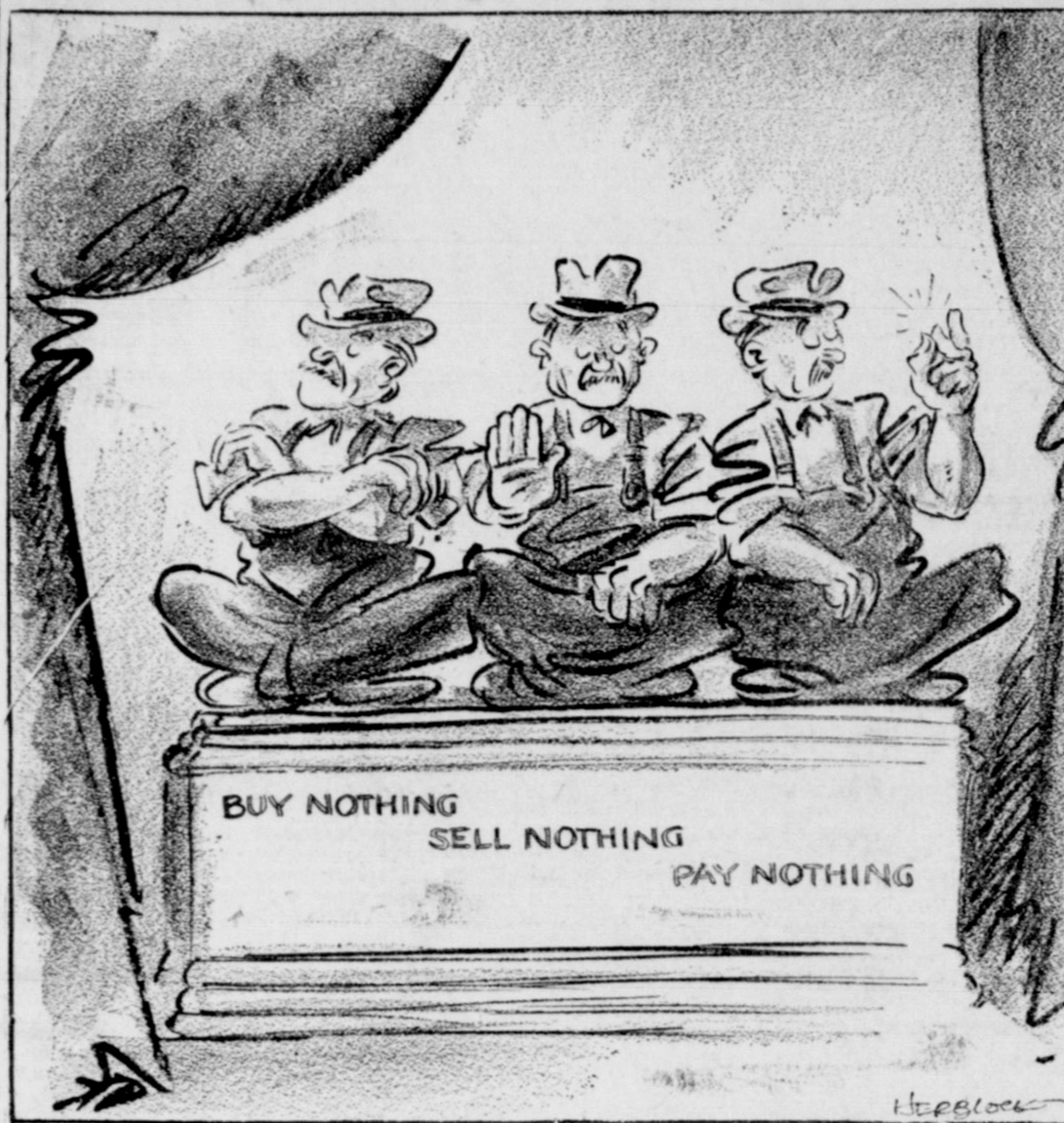

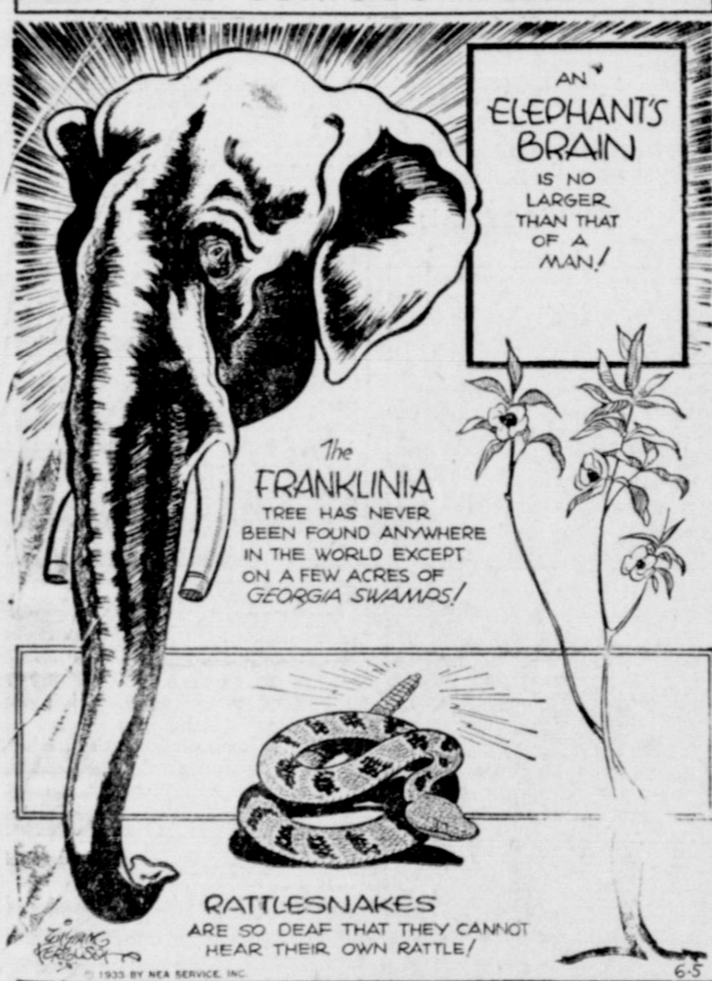

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—The demand for publicity for salaries of officials of large corporations, especially those under some form of government regulation, has been intensified by recent revelations.

Huge salaries are being paid to heads of corporations which borrow from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, which have led in the movement for wage reductions and whose officers frequently have been able to avoid taxes on hundreds of thousands of dollars of income by claiming deductions for stock market losses.

The Senate has just approved the resolution of Senator Edward P. Costigan of Colorado which would make these big incomes a matter of public record. Costigan is a member of the committee which investigated the National City bank and the Morgan firm and will soon investigate the Chase National bank.

His resolution would require the Federal Reserve Board to report the salary schedule of officers and directors of Reserve System banks, the R. F. C. to report salaries of officials of other banks to which it has lent money, the Interstate Commerce Commission on the salaries of railroad officials, the Fed-

eral Power Commission the salaries of public utilities officials and the Federal Trade Commission on salaries of corporations engaged in interstate commerce and having capital or assets of more than \$1,000,000, whose securities are listed on the New York exchanges.

There is also a better chance now for passage of the measure limiting to \$17,500 the salaries of officials of banks, railroads and other corporations borrowing from the R. F. C. The Senate passed that one and the House has it.

Evidence introduced in the Congressional Record recently showed that executives of some of the larger insurance companies has received increases in salary between 1929 and 1932. The president of the Equitable Life was receiving \$100,000 last year as against \$75,000 in 1929, the Metropolitan Life president \$209,000 instead of \$175,000, the Mutual Life president \$125,000 instead of \$100,000, and the New York Life president \$125,000 instead of \$100,000. Some of these salaries have been reduced this year.

Farmer Cultivates Worms for Anglers

ALHAMBRA, Calif.—R. B. Bilkosky has the most unique farm in the world. He raises millions upon millions of worms for anglers on his five and one-half acres here. Bilkosky supplies the entire country and Canada with his bait by parcel post. He started eight years ago with half a million worms. Now he can't count them, but sends out tens of millions each year.

Red water worm is the best for bait, Bilkosky says. He changes their diet seven times during the year with each change of the weather. But Bilkosky, unlike the farmer, can't fall back on his own produce if he can't sell enough to eat.

Germans Speeding Up Plane Lines

BERLIN.—The German Lufthansa has added a series of important improvements to its summer service. The most important is the shortening of flying time between European capitals as well as within Germany, and the establishment of night flying lines.

The fastest planes of the Lufthansa have been placed on a new Berlin-London line (over Rotterdam and Amsterdam) for the summer. They fly it in five hours.

Another new line is Frankfurt-am-Main to Munich, connecting with the Spanish line to Geneva-Marseilles-Barcelona. This, with a reduction of the Berlin-Stockholm time, makes one-day service now possible between the Catalonian and Swedish capitals.

Similarly, connections to Rome and Vienna have been speeded up. In mapping out the summer schedule, special consideration was given to the increasing of the air by tourists and starting times were set back to a convenient forenoon hour.

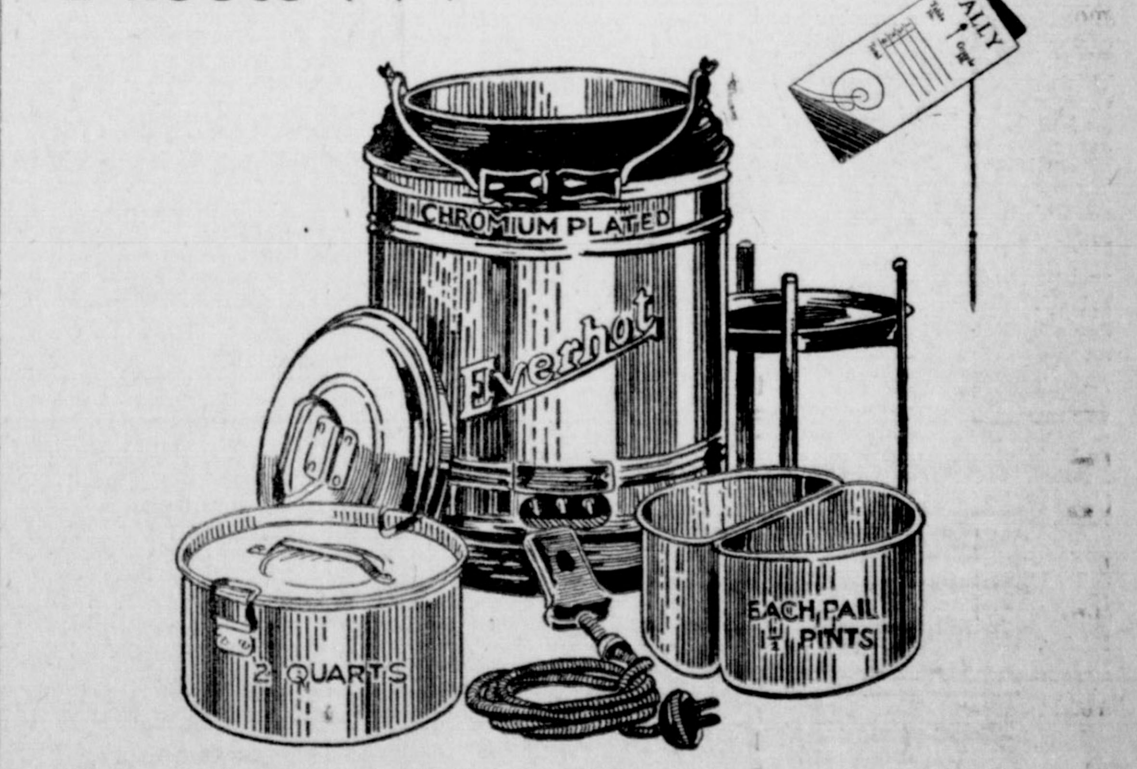
