Then the curtain rang down.



## Chamberlain-Hull **Clash Anticipated**

LONDON .- A fight to a finish between deflationists and refla tionists is in prospect at the World Economic Conference. Cold, reserved Chancellor of the Exchequer Neville Chamberlain,

head of the British delegation, will lead the deflationary forces Secretary of State Cordell Hull as President Roosevelt's chief representative, is marked for lead-ership of the reflationists.

Little of Great Britain's official policy for the conference has been revealed, but Chancellor Cham berlain's recent speeches, coupled with the knowledge that his word on financial and economic matters practically is law in the British cabnet, make it certain that Chamberlain will advocate deflationary remedies for the world's distress, in opposition to President osevelt's reflationary policies. Despite the recent week-end conversations between President Roosevelt and Prime Minister MacDonald, the United States and British delegations are likely ind themselves holding widely

differing viewponts. One of the conference's chief aims is to restore the equilibrium between costs of production and Washington favors prices. creasing prices.
