Rep. Hatton W. Sumners of the Dallas district is chairman of the important house judiciary committee. He attended the Dallas conference of 1200 business leaders and trade organization executives. All the speakers warned increased prices were not the prime consideration. All agreed that the main purpose of the industrial act was to employ more persons at better wages. All agreed that the anti-trust laws of Texas presented a serious problem.

Rep. Sumners advised that practical thinking is necessary and that "unless the people keep their feet on the ground the industrial act plan will fail." Arthur L. Kramer of Dallas predicted that a special session of the legislature would be called soon after Aug. 26th and that "Attorney General James V. Allred will promise not to interfere with the industrial recovery act because of the critica condition which faces the state."
