



held out as an administration man-has asked house and senate members about their attitude on reshaping the anti-trust law.

He announced out of Houston that 67 members of the house have declared themselves in favor of the change, 17 doubtful and none on record against it. Of the 31 senators, 14 told him they will support the modification, one declared against it, and eight were doubtful or said they would wait and see the form of the bill.

The most typical answer given Senator Woodul was, Many Subjects Are "I favor suspending any laws in conflict with the President's program."

Lieut. Gov. Edgar Witt has predicted the legislature will approve every measure needed to facilitate the national industrial recovery program. Answers of the members to the Houston senator's inquiry suggest as much.
