Congress Enacts the Wagner Labor Measure

Senator Robert Wagner of New York is the unofficial leader of organized labor in the United States. He came to this land of the free an immigrant boy. He sold newspapers in the streets of New York.

As a little lad he did everything possible to turn an honest penny to his own advantage or profit. He attended night school. He studied law and he paid his own way with his own earnings. He became a state lawmaker where he represented the wage workers of his district. He won the majority of leadership of his party in the legislature of New York. He was sent to the state senate and there he became a state leader instead of a local advisor. He was nominated to the state supreme court bench and won recognition as a jurist of the highest caliber. He was elected to the United States senate and re-elected. He backed the Wagner victory. His measure was sent from the senate to the house where it received a huge majority and restored to labor the right of collective bargaining that supreme court swept away in the NRA decision. In other words, congress did not delegate its power to the President to frame a new act. Administration democrats declared the bill as "a new declaration of the rights of man." There was no record vote.

Many republican representatives gave the Wagner measure their support. In making the right to collective bargaining the law of the land, the Wagner measure sets up an independent board of three members to arbitrate disputes between employer and employe. Inother words, the Wagner bill, in effect, is the new deal answer to the supreme court's duling in the famous chicken case which resulted in the complete smashup of the national recovery act and all its codes for the prevention of child labor in sweat shops and other protective acts or codes for the wage workers of the nation. Senator Wagner is sitting on the top of the world now but there is no telling where he will be after the campaign next year. As for organized labor and its sympathizers it backed the Wagner act to a successful finish and had the influence of the President ever behind the New York senator for his famous battling.

Dictator Mussolini May Defy All Nations

Dictator Mussolini, who speaks for all Italians in the homeland, at least, may tender his resignation to the League of Nations. He may attach himself to Japan and Germany "or lace the world alone." The pact between Great Britair and Germany infuriated the Italian dictator. He is making his plans to take over Abyssinia and he promises to go all the road with his army and navyand his air bombers. Italy has a vast surplus population. There are a few fertile spots left in Asia and Africa that haven't been taken over by the powerful nations of Europe and Mussodini has his eye on Abyssinia and ts vast natural mineral and timber wealth. Why not? His European neighbors have huge colonies in Asia and Africa and the islands of the sea. Why should Great Britain object to the Mussolini plan? Why should France or Belgium object? Why should Holland and lastly why should Soviet Russia? The race appears to be to the powerfu and for hundreds of years the great and grabbers of Europe have never hesitated to overawe weaker nations or people and strip them of their rights and territory.

Great Britain and **Germany as Future Partners**

Statesmen of Great Britain and Germany, speaking of two powerful nations represented by John Bull and Adolf Hitler, have signed a naval compact. A London cable carries the news that the statesmen of Great Britain "regard the program as being satisfactory to all parties concern-

When Brother Jonathan sits in on invitation at another world conference he should carry the farewell address of George Washington, the first liberator, who advised his people to avoid entangling alliances with foreign nations and attend to their own business through the coming years. George Washington was a very wise man, a great soldier, a patriotic leader "and ever first in the hearts of his countrymen."



MAGNIFICENT \$1,000,000 'HALL OF STATE' TO DOMINATE TEXAS CENTENNIAL EXPOSITION



This tentative sketch of the \$1,000,000 hall of state which will dominate the entire Centennial Central Exposition at Dallas suggests the magnificence of the proposed structure. To be built of Texas buff stone, designed in semi-classic style influenced by Latin-American trends, the structure, 450 feet long and 250 feet deep, will feature a semi-circular Colonnade of Independence. The semi-circle bounded by the colonnade will be known as the court of states. At the left, a hall will exhibit Texas of 1836; on the right will be presented Texas of 1936. An underground amphitheater will seat 1000 people. Lights of changing color are to play upon the building at night. A 700-foot reflecting pool will center the esplanade. Varied exhibits and the federal building will flank the approach to the state building,

Astor's Thrift In 1838 Shown

GREEN BAY, Wis .- Sale of the former Union Congregational church here recently recalled aid given by John Jacob Astor, and Washington Irving to house Wisconsin's first protestant organization, formered Jan. 9, 1836.

The congregation, continuing unbroken since that date, although its first edifice burned and it has moved from the second, participated in many stirring events recounted in its records. The belfry of the old church at least once, and perhaps on other unrecorded instances was a refuge for fugitive negro slaves. Mrs. Jeremiah Porter, wife of the pastor, tells in a letter, how a fleeing negro father and his three children were hidden

Astor Gave Cash and Land Astor, nationally famous as a fur trader, was reputed to be the wealthiest man in the United States at the time he donated land and \$300 for the church. Interest ing traits of the old trader are evident in his letters regarding

In a letter dated at Yorkville, Oct. 1, 1838, he grumbles to church committee that he did not anticipate being asked to donate : bell after giving land and money.

"Yet I have complied with your request," he adds, "and have purchased today from Mr. Force an excellent bell of 696 pounds cast by him the present year. It has a fine and full tone, and will effectually notice all who are disposed to give attention to their duties from its summons.'


