Mr. Webb expressed his appreciation to members of the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department, stating that they went far beyond their call of duty in helping get the fire out and then watching and checking to make sure that it didn't re-start.

He also expressed his appreciation to the people of Eastland for their concern in his loss, and stated that he would begin rebuilding within two weeks.

The most disastrous fire to strike Eastland in the last two years, according to Fire Chief Wayne Jackson, des troyed the business, which has been in Eastland about 10 years

Jackson said that it took the fire department only about 20 minutes to bring it under control, but that the contents and building were a total loss.

Webb said an insurance ustor in Eastland Tuesday afernoon estimated the total oss at \$30,000, including \$14,-000 in stock, \$9,000 in equipment and \$7,000 on the build.


Eastland High School head coach Shirley Frazier will teach history and government during the second summer semester at Ranger Junior College.


