N., of Rising Star has assumed duties as instructor of nursing at the college, replacing Mrs. Venita Mitchell, who resigned recen ly to move to Arlington where her husband, Robert, has accepted employ-ment. Mrs. Mitchell had intructed the program since its beginning five years ago, Mr.
