## Lone Cedar Tournament Opens With Pro-Am Friday

### On Leon Shores

Lone Cedar Country Club's Annual Invitational Golf Tournament gets underway Friday with a Pro-Am and qualifying for flights. The medalist Friday will receive a pair of Foot Joy Golf Shoes.

A record number of entries from throughout this area are expected.

The barbecue, which is open to the public, will be served to all contestants and guests beginning about 7:30 p. m. Guest's tickets will be available in the Pro-Shop on Thursday and Friday; \$1.50 for adults and \$1.00 for children.

Roy Pearson of Ranger will be on hand to defend his title against championship flight

challengers in medal play Saturday and Sunday. All other contestants will play an 18-hole match on Saturday and finish Sunday with the 18-hole medal.

Prizes to be awarded are \$200.00 and \$100.00 merchandise certificates to winners and runner-ups of each flight and golf bags for winners of the consolation flights.

Roy Pearson of Ranger prevented Bobby Adair of Marshall from being a third-time champion of the Breckenridge Invitational Golf Tournament held last weekend.

It was a head-to-head duel on Sunday between Saturday's co-leaders, however, Adair met his "Waterloo" on the 18th hole, needing four to get down from the left side for a double bogey six. Thus, Pearson emerged with the championship with a 75-73-148.

Pearson will be defending champion of the Lone Cedar Invitational Tournament to be held this weekend.

Another Ranger golfer, Tommy Warford, was fifth in the championship flight in Breckenridge on Sunday with a 77-80-157.

## LONE STAR MARKS 60th ANNIVERSARY

Sixty years ago this week, history was made at a meeting in a small room in the Oriental Hotel in Dallas, Texas.

There the company was formed and the groundwork laid that one day would help boost the states of Texas and Oklahoma out of a wood and coal age into an industrial revolution.

The founders named the new company Lone Star Gas Company after the single star in the flag of the state in which the company was chartered on June 4, 1909, the state in which they soon would construct the southwest's first long-distance, large-diameter natural gas transmission pipeline.

In the six decades since the company's formation, Lone Star has grown as dramatically as the area it serves.

"We've come a long way from that first 130-mile pipeline. We've had to," said L. T. Potter, chairman. "Today Lone Star is four companies related by a common bond of product and customer service. Lone Star Gas is the parent firm and Lone Star Producing Company, Nipak, Inc., and Lone Star Gathering Company are subsidiaries."

While Lone Star Gas Company provides most of the direct gas services, Nipak, Inc., a petrochemical subsidiary, has been serving the chemical fertilizer needs of farmers and ranchers since its organization in 1964. Nipak has been shipping fertilizers to the international market and recently announced plans to manufacture polyethylene pipe for natural gas distribution use.

The producing subsidiary and divisions of the parent firm work together to insure ample gas reserves for all

customer requirements. Lone Star Gathering Company, though not directly linked with the transmission and distribution systems of the parent firm, gathers Texas gas for ultimate distribution within the state.

"The company is in the best position ever to serve its customers and its shareholders," Potter said. "Our seventh decade will present fresh challenge, and we will meet it with fresh impetus."

Supporting local gas distribution is a 25,800-mile interconnected transmission and distribution pipeline system poised to handle the greatest natural gas reserves in the company's history. In many cases local supply capabilities have been bolstered through strategically placed underground gas storage reservoirs. New gas reserves have been purchased inland exploration expanded and offshore exploration begun.

"One thing is certain," Potter said. "In this dynamic area we'll never lack opportunities to grow by serving and we'll never pass up those opportunities."

## 1c Tax Vote Is Thursday

Eastland residents will decide June 5 whether they want a one per cent city sales and use tax.

City Commissioners ordered the special election in a called meeting Monday afternoon. The ordinance for the election was introduced at a called meeting last Friday.

The election will be held on Thursday, June 5, at the City Hall. Commissioners appointed Milton Underwood presiding judge with Hoover Pittman as alternate. Absentee voting will be at the City Hall from May 16 to 30.

If the tax is voted in, the 1 per cent will be in addition to the three per cent state tax already in effect. City manager Lewis Tiner said certification of the election and a map of the area must be sent to the state comptroller before June 30 for the city to be eligible to collect the tax for the last quarter of this year.

The election was ordered after a special study committee recommended the tax as the most favorable method of increasing city revenue. Need for additional income was listed because several city employees are on the payroll below the minimum wage rate plus the rising cost of materials and the need for another policeman position.

## 4 Bible Schools Planning Closing Events; 400 Attend

Vacation Bible Schools began Monday at four local churches with over 400 in attendance. All four schools began Monday and last through Friday.

Classes at the United Methodist Church last from 9 to 11. There are about 50 youngsters, ages 4 to 11, and Len Layne and Mrs. Milton Day are conducting the school. The theme is "Bible Lands and Times."

Opening assembly at the First Baptist Church was held at 8:30 and classes lasted until 11:30. There are 35 workers and about 150 children ages three through Junior High. Rev. Harold Brewer and Educational Director Everett Kirk are in charge of the school emphasizing World Missions and Evangelism. A commencement exercise will be held Sunday night at 7:30. After the exercise, parents and friends are invited to a display of handiwork in Fellowship Hall.

Church of Christ services are held nightly from 7:30 to 9:30. The school is for all members, regardless of age. Rev. F. R. Yeakley reports that attendance has been about 130 each night. Elder Otto Thompson heads the school; the theme is "Jesus Loves Me." There are two out of town teachers—Rev. Norman Westergard of Ranger and Rev. Marvin Rowland of Event.

The Bethel Baptist Church is conducting both a Bible School and a Teen College. The Bible School is held each morning from 8:30 to 11:30 and the Teen College is held from 7 to 9:30 at night. The Teen College is held for Junior High, High School, and College students; the Bible School is for all younger children. There have been an average of 75 children and 18 workers at each Bible School session. A Bible School commencement exercise will be held Sunday night at 7:30 with a display after.

No indictments were reported at adjournment time at 5 p. m. Tuesday, but the jury-men were due back in for a long day of deliberation on Wednesday.

## Mangum, Seabourn, Baird Back in Jail After Captures

Jail-escapists Leroy Mangum and Kyndell Seabourn were due back in Eastland County late Wednesday evening—after their 11 days of running freedom came to an end in Arkansas.

The two were captured in Lonoke, Ark., (20 miles north of Little Rock) Tuesday afternoon, at the end of a dash that had begun in Carbon Monday night when they took Baptist Pastor Bruce McNair's 1966 Buick, at gunpoint. They were taken in the small Arkansas town, reportedly trying to "pick up some girls."

Field Deputy Sheriff Loy Williams, Eastland Policeman John Morren, Rev. McNair and Truman Bryant of Carbon left Tuesday to retrieve the preacher's car and the escapees. Mangum and Seabourn busted through the roof of the county jail on Sunday, May 24.

They were arrested in Arkansas by the state highway patrol there, and they were still in the McNair automobile. They were armed at the time, but there was no gunfight, it was reported.

The two are back in county jail facing their original armed robbery charges, and additional charges including felony jail break.

Seabourn is 18 and Mangum will be 19 on June 16.

Webb and Richardson, the last two remaining escapees, are still at large.

A brazen armed robbery at the home of a Carbon minister Monday night was believed to have been the most recent episode in the continuing series resulting from the week of jail breaks from Eastland County Jail.

The Rev. T. B. (Bruce) McNair, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Carbon, was summoned by a knock at the front door at his parsonage home about 10:45 p. m., and greeted by a young man who identified himself as "Johnny Williams". The caller said he wanted to talk to him.

About that time, a second man appeared at the door with a rifle (guessed by the minister to be either a .22 rifle or 4.10 shotgun) and demanded an automobile.

The Rev. McNair said the two men came into the house and tied him to a bedpost and Mrs. McNair to a sofa. Getting the keys to the pastor's 1966 Electra Buick, the pair looted Mrs. McNair's purse, getting about \$3 and oil company credit cards.

"They were pretty good to us," Rev. McNair said, but added that at one time, one of the men warned him: "If you don't shut up, I'm coming over there and hit you on the head."

Although the pastor had not seen pictures, he guessed that the armed robbers were Kendall Seabourn and Leroy Mangum, who broke out of the Eastland County Jail on Sunday, May 24. The pair were believed by authorities to have been hiding in the county since the break.

Two Carbon men found tracks at a farm home west of Carbon Monday afternoon which they believed to have been made by the escape pair.

No entry had been made at the farm home which is used by its owners on weekends.

An immediate search was called and lawmen, including sheriff Deputy Loy Williams, Highway Patrolmen and others began a search for the car after Rev. McNair called police in Eastland.

## JERRY BAIRD TAKEN AT PHANTOM HILL

Jerry Wayne Baird, 18, one of three men who escaped from the Eastland County jail Tuesday afternoon of last week, was returned to Eastland Tuesday after his recapture Sunday night at the home of his parents at Lake Fort Phantom Hill.

Baird was recaptured without incident after the house on the east side of the Lake was surrounded by lawmen from Jones and Taylor counties. He was unarmed when taken; and offered no resistance.

The 91st district grand jury was in session Tuesday and Baird was taken directly before the panel, County Attorney Emory Walton said.

"It wasn't very exciting," Texas Ranger Sid Merchant of Abilene, one of the arresting officers, said. "We were expecting trouble but it worked out smooth as silk." They surrounded the house about 7:15 p. m. and ordered Baird's parents to bring him out.

Taylor county officers said that Baird was rested, had on clean clothes and had eaten. They discounted his claim that he had been at his parents' home only two hours.

They were inclined to believe his statement, however, that he was in the Lake Cisco vicinity with his fellow escapees, Harvey Dale Webb, 21, of Shreveport, La., and Donald Eugene Richardson of Sweetwater, Thursday afternoon of last week when a giant manhunt failed to locate him.

Baird told them that they managed to elude the posse by hiding; running and hiding.

## Several Burglaries Solved With Arrest Of Dallas Negro

The arrest of a Dallas Negro Sunday is believed to have cleared a number of break-ins and burglaries in Eastland County.

Adel Williams, who listed his address as 3501 Cologne St., Dallas, is in Eastland County Jail, charged with burglary.

Eastland Policeman John Morren was instrumental in the arrest early Sunday morning after JRB Store Manager Gene Haynes reported that a window on the east side of his building had been broken. Some food stuffs were believed taken. Morren began tracking some large footprints, similar, he said to those found earlier during a series of burglaries here.

The tracks took the policeman first to a Negro hotel, and lead on to the vacant Little Flock Baptist Church on

North Bassett St., where Williams was discovered. Morren was assisted in the 8:30 a. m. arrest by Sheriff Deputy Loy Williams and Patrolman Truitt Grice.

Found on Williams or near him in the church were a pair of binoculars, two ladies wrist watches, all taken in the God-year Service Store burglary on May 25. A tire tool, taken from Pullman's Supply in April, was recovered, as were three watches taken from a pawn shop in Cisco. Also found was a Post Office fountain pen. (The Eastland office was broken into in April). The items were identified by persons from these locations.

Other burglaries during April included a break-in at Pipkin Motor Co. in Eastland in which some \$90 was taken, and the First National Bank in Cisco was entered and some cancelled, unnegotiable checks were later found in an abandoned church in Cisco.

It was established that Williams arrived in Eastland on an 11 p. m. Saturday bus from Dallas.

I notice that there has been a mild controversy to arise over the proposed City sales tax. His is to be expected when the taking of a person's money is involved.

Personally, I am in favor of the City sales tax . . . providing the money derived therefrom goes for a good, legitimate purpose. In the case of Eastland, the additional money is needed to give an across the board pay increase to City employees, whose pay scale is way below that of our neighboring towns, consequently, according to the \$700 per month City manager . . . it is hard to find qualified employees.

This is probably correct. However, I know of one incident where a "qualified" individual recently applied to the City for employment in the fire department, and more recently in the police department, and he was told that he was "too young" (He is actually 21 years of age). He was further told that Eastland is made up of a large number of old, retired people, and that it was the policy to hire old that they seemed to understand all the old people better.

What a ridiculous statement, and requisite for employment. I wonder how much more progressive cities than Eastland manage to get by with their 21 year old policemen.

This particular person is a high school graduate, and attended college . . . well qualified, by local standards, to be employed by the City of Eastland. However, he was turned down. And, only recently, the City Manager told me . . . "James, if you just knew how hard it is to find someone to work for the City."

As I said, I am for the sales tax . . . if it will help Eastland find qualified firemen . . . and policemen . . . and, other help. But, if the City plans to take the money and give a raise in salary to certain employees for the job they are NOT now doing . . . well, then this isn't right.

If a man is going to get a raise in pay, he should earn that raise and do his best to do a better job than is now being done. Of course, there and in all cases, and this rather rash statement naturally does not apply to the hard-

## Gorman Man Asks Water

Jackie D. Simpson, Gorman, has applied for a permit to appropriate state water. The Texas Water Rights Commission in Austin announced receipt of his application for the right to appropriate 40 acre-feet of water annually to irrigate 40 acres of land, and details of the plan are now under examination by Commission engineers.

Simpson has a reservoir on property located 11-1/2 miles south from Eastland and 2 miles south from Carbon, Texas. It is on Hunting Shirt Creek, tributary of Sabanna River, tributary of Leon River, which runs into the Little River and is in the Brazos River Watershed.

A public hearing will be held in Austin June 10 at 10:00 a.m. in Room 810 of the Sam Houston State Office Building, at which time the applicant and those favoring or opposing the project will

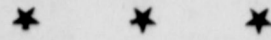

## THINGS TO REMEMBER ABOUT THE FLAG

The flag should be displayed on days when the weather permits; especially on national and state holidays and such days as may be proclaimed by the President. On Memorial Day the flag should be half staffed until noon.

The flag should never be used as drapery of any sort. It is the custom to display the flag only from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on flagstaves in the open, but it should not be displayed on days when the weather is inclement. The flag may be displayed at night upon special occasions.

## CORRECT WAYS TO DISPLAY THE FLAG

Our flag should always have stars to the left of the picture, fabric floating to the right. When hanging with stripes in a vertical position against the wall, the stars should be in the upper left hand corner.

When our flag is carried with other flags in parade it should always claim the place of honor—at the right. When used on a speaker's platform, the flag if displayed above and behind the speaker.

If flown from a staff it should be in the position of honor, at speakers' right, if on a platform. If not, at left of speaker. It should never be used to cover the speakers' desk.

When displayed with another flag or flags against a wall from crossed staffs, the flag of the United States should be at its own right, its staff should be in the front.
