# Corn Stalk Borer Now **Decreasing Report Says**

cornstalk borer infest.ation che counties shows that lesser cornstalk borer numbers are decreasing slightly.

The decrease in corn borer popuulations is the result of the control programs being applied to the peanut fields. The survey indicated that pea nut fields which have had a complete series of treatments sisters. for corn borers have a low population at this time. However, almost all fields which are not in the control program are showing a sharp increate in numbers of corn
