Respect for Authority Is Key to Law, Order Judge Collings Reports

Old-fashioned "law and order" was defined and some basic ways of achieving it were outlined Tuesday for members of the Lions Club at their regular luncheon meeting by Civil Appeals Court Judge Cecil Collings.

Introduced by Program Chairman of the day Earnest Sneed, Judge Collings boiled it down to the fact that respect and love for authority begins in the home where it must be taught right. "Of course," he said, "we don't have as much trouble here as in the big towns where large groups of youth are rebelling against society because they haven't had this right training at home."

And the longtime-judge stressed that force or the threat of force in the home and by police officers in society is necessary in this training. "The old-time 'lickings' in school and at home taught us respect for authority, and this, all must have."

It's a two-way street, he said, in that parents and public officials and officers must be worthy of respect. "They must deserve the respect they're expecting." All officials and officers of the law should be above reproach, and good ones carry out their duties and in so doing increase the respect of even those whom they punish.

Judge Collings warned against the dangers of the "spoiled child in the home and called such action a wrong way of teaching respect.

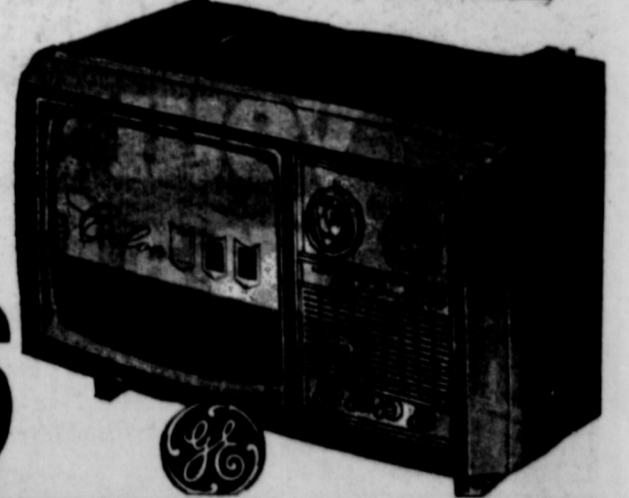

Season Tickets For CJC Games On Sale

Season tickets for all Cisco Junior College home football games went on sale Monday at the CJC Business Office, according to an announcement by Head Coach and Athletic Director Harold "Ace" Prescott.

Four home contests are scheduled for the Wranglers during the 1969 season. The home opener will be a return game with McCook, Nebraska Junior College on September 27. Other home games will be Kilgore Junior College on October 11, Tyler Junior Junior on October 18, and Blinn J C on November 1. The Blinn game will be the annual homecoming game. All home games are scheduled for 7:30 p. m. at Chesley Field.

Two games will be held in nearby cities, with the Peanut Game pitting Cisco against Ranger on Sept. 20 to open the grid season, and another game with Ranger JC at Ranger on Nov. 15. The Peanut Bowl Game will be at 8 p. m., but all other night games are scheduled for 7:30 p. m.

CJC's out-of-town schedule calls for games with Henderson County JC at Athens on October 4, Wharton JC (coached by former CJC coach Jim Puryear) on October 25, Navarro J. C. on November 8, the Ranger game, and North Texas Freshman at Denton on November 20. The Denton game will be the only afternoon contest, at 2:30 p. m.

Prescott is head coach, and assistant coaches are Joe Turner and Lewis Whitson. Whitson has just recently joined the CJC coaching staff after several years at Denton High School.

Persons who had season tickets for last year's Wrangler

games may reserve the same seats by calling the Business Office, 442-2567, and making arrangements for same with Mrs. Emma Watts, Business Manager. Seats will be held for last year's season ticket holders until Monday, August 18 at which time they will be offered for sale if not reserved. Other reserved season tickets are on sale at present, as are reserved seats for individual games. Prices for the four-games season are \$6.00 each, while individual reserved seats are \$1.75 each. General admission tickets will be sold on the day of games only at \$1.50 per person. Tickets may be secured at the CJC Business Office any time between 8:00 a. m. and 12:00 noon and 1:00 to 4:00 p. m. weekdays, or may be reserved by telephone during the same times.

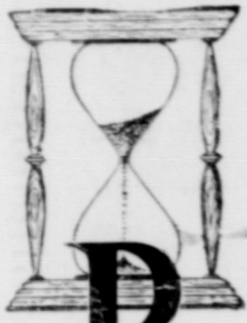

J. C. SAYS ...

Aug. 16 Deadline For Claiming Part In Drug Funds

Attorney General Crawford C. Martin has urged Texas consumers to check their records and file refund claims for broad spectrum antibiotics purchased during the years 1954 through 1966.

Aug. 16, 1969, is the deadline for mailing a notarized claim to the Clerk, United States District Court, P. O. Box 745, Bronx, New York, 10451, he said.

Texas consumers will receive a share of \$100 million offered by five large drug manufacturers in settlement of multiple civil antitrust actions filed against them by Martin and the Attorneys General of other states.

Forms may be picked up at the County Clerk's office in each Texas county.

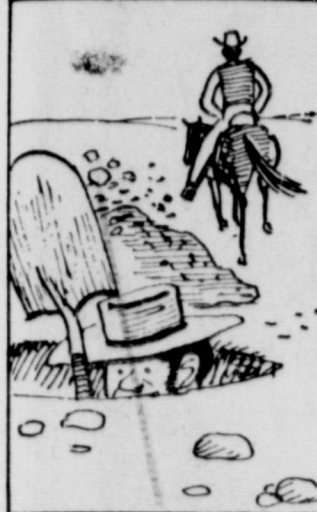
The drugs involved are Aureomycin, Terramycin, Achromycin, Mystecilin, Panalba, Panmycin, Polycycline, Stellan, Tetracyclin and Tetrex.

If a person fails to file a claim, it will constitute authorization to use the money recovered in his behalf for the benefit of all consumers in a manner directed by the Federal Court.

"Thousands of Texans are eligible to make claims and I hope they will avail themselves of the opportunity," the Attorney General said. "The form is a simple one, providing for estimates of the total amount a consumer purchased and the names and addresses of the drugstores where the purchases were made in the years 1954-66."

Support of Peanut Assessment Program Urged by Associations

The assessment program to be decided in the September referendum by Texas peanut growers has been endorsed by officials of every local grower association in Texas. Grower leaders emphasize that Texas is the only major peanut producing state, which has not voted the "check-off program."

"Texas produced peanuts ought to go into the stomachs of American people and not into storage warehouses," says J. O. Jackson, Jr. of Gorman, president of the West Texas Timbers Peanut Producers Association. Jackson believes that peanut promotion needs to be vastly expanded and accelerated to stay ahead of the fast grow-

ing peanut yields in the state. The dollar per ton assessment will not be a cost to the grower he emphasizes, but rather it will be a fine investment which will be returned many fold to producers.

George Toolson of Pearsall says, "We have seen the return on dollars invested in research here in Frio County. If all growers statewide pitch in on this important program, we can really be effective in finding the answer to our pressing peanut production problems including diseases and insect control." Another grower, Chester Cunningham of Grapeland said, "I have wanted this program for Texas growers a long time. I have seen what a little help can do in research and education. With this program throughout the state, we can make great progress."

Ballots will be mailed to all growers on Sept. 6 so they can vote from Sept. 9-24 either For or Against the "check-off program." If two thirds of those voting, vote For the proposition — up to \$1. per ton

will be assessed on all peanuts marketed in Texas beginning about Oct. 1, 1969. At the same time growers will vote to elect 9 growers to a producers board. The board once elected will organize and employ an executive secretary to

carry out his position. Growers who contribute money to this program may get refunds if they so request within 60 days of the date of assessment. States already having similar plans on peanuts: Oklahoma, New Mexico, Georgia, Alabama, North Carolina, Virginia and Florida.

J. N. Pruitt, peanut grower from Palo Pinto County, summed up the feeling of grower association leaders recently by saying, "all peanut growers are willing to help themselves by providing resources to deal with their problems."

New Rules To Govern Highway Right-of-way

AUSTIN — Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that effective September 1, laws passed by the Texas Legislature will establish new rules of right of way and new rules for following too closely.

Speir urged all drivers to review the rules closely, and note the instances in which they must stop, yield and grant the right-of-way.

Drivers at intersections controlled by stop, yield or traffic control devices must obey

the signs. Drivers of vehicles on a single lane street or roadway consisting of two traffic lanes, upon approaching an intersection not controlled by signs of a divided street or a street or roadway divided into three or more marked lanes, must stop, yield and grant the privilege of right-of-way to vehicles on the larger street.

Drivers of vehicles on unpaved streets intersecting a roadway that is paved must stop, yield and grant the right-of-way to vehicles on the paved street.

Drivers of vehicles on streets of equal size and paving must stop, yield and grant the privilege of immediate use of such intersection to any other vehicle which has entered the intersection from such driver's right, or is approaching such intersection from the driver's right in such proximity as to constitute a hazard.

Speir said the act provides a rule of evidence that in cases of collision, the person shall have been presumed not to have yielded the right-of-way if the four conditions have not

been satisfied.

The following too closely law, as amended, will require drivers to maintain an assured clear distance between the vehicle ahead exercising due regard for the speed of the vehicles and the traffic upon and conditions of the street or highway. Drivers must be able to bring their vehicles to a stop, using these guidelines, without colliding with the preceding vehicle, or veering into other vehicles, objects or persons on or near the street
