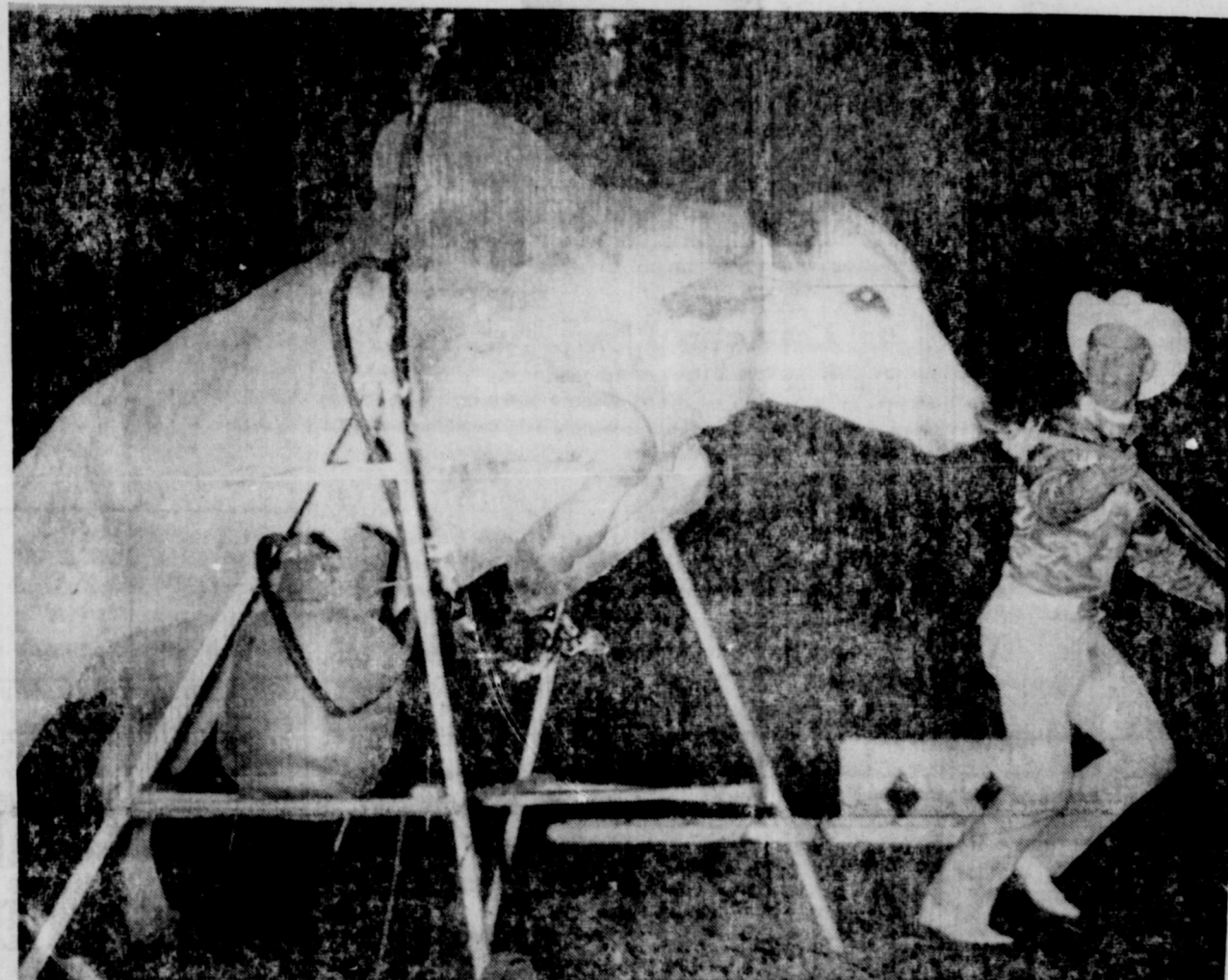

Murder Investigation Intensifies In One of County's Most Brutal Crimes

Investigation continues into one of the most cold-blooded murders ever committed in Eastland County which occurred 3 miles south of Ranger when the body of Travis Winsett, 52, was found in a cistern inside an abandoned farm house at 10:30 p.m. Saturday.

The search for Mr. Winsett began Saturday afternoon after his sister, Mrs. Hugh Capps, of Coleman, discovered him missing and reported it to Ranger Police.

District Attorney Emory Walton, Kenneth Brown of the Ranger Fire Department, and Sheriff Lefty Sublett found Winsett's body after a tip from Ranger Police dispatcher Benny Moseley.

Moseley remembered that the police department log showed the fire department answered a fire alarm call at the Hathcock farm about 10 p. m. Monday at the vacant house where the cistern was located.

Sublett said the house, which is about five miles south of Winsett's home, was set

afire and completely destroyed.

Officers said Winsett's home had been ransacked and that a small safety deposit box found in the house had been pried open. Also believed missing is a transistor radio, 40 arrow heads which Winsett had collected, a few coins including a \$5 gold piece, and a gold ring.

Officers searched the cistern in which the body was found with a heavy magnet Sunday morning for a weapon possibly used to shoot Mr. Winsett. No weapon was found.

Police said the body had a hole on the right side of the head which appeared to have been made by a small-caliber bullet.

Winsett's body was taken Sunday morning to Hendricks Memorial for an autopsy.

Officers theorize Winsett may have been shot late Monday night, basing this on the fact that mail had been delivered Tuesday was found in his mailbox.

Winsett, who lived alone in

his six-room frame home, was last seen Monday afternoon in downtown Ranger and was seen driving his pickup near his home about 5:45 p. m. Monday.

Authorities said they found a spent cartridge — believed to be a .22-caliber — near a front gate about 58 feet from Winsett's home.

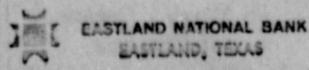
A small hole, believed to be made by a small bullet, was discovered in the front window screen. The window was raised.

Near a chair in which officers theorize Winsett was sitting, police found dried blood. Officers said a bookcase had been moved to cover the larger stains.

The chair was located approximately 12 feet from the front window.

A memorial service was held Monday at 4 p. m. in Killingsworth Funeral Home Chapel with the Rev. R. G. Flagg of the Eastland Episcopal Church officiating.

The only survivor is his sister, Mrs. Hubert (Vida) Capps, of Coleman.

Carbon Folks Hope 'There'll Always Be Merritt and Bertha'

The printing of the Carbon Messenger on pretty lemon-colored paper in commemoration of the Big Carbon Homecoming this weekend is the nearest thing to Yellow Journalism its readers have ever seen.

Known far and wide for its "good news only" policy, the little Carbon paper is loved by Carbon residents and now-scattered Exes.

Equally well-known and beloved in the Messenger's Publisher Merritt Dunn and his wife and Number One Help-Mate, Bertha.

In nearly 45 years of continuous publication, the Carbon Messenger a tabloid-sized chronicle with lots of personal news has heralded the births, graduations, weddings, accomplishments and deaths of Carbon area folk. The publisher's philosophy: "If you can't say something good, don't say anything." has been a hallmark of good newspapering for a lot of younger would-be scribes.

Merritt and Bertha and the Messenger are true Carbon institutions. It's hard to tell where Merritt ends and the Messenger begins. On Aug. 5, 1970, they'll have been at it for 45 years... that amounts to 52 issues a year and a grand total of 2340 editions. Every week papers are looked forward to by the subscribers, many of whom keep up with what's going back at home through the Messenger.

Believing that their newspaper, like others throughout the country, are unifying influences for their community, the DUNNs take their work seriously, and try to give full value in news and advertising. It's printed on an old Campbell Book Press ("It's in the best shape right now than it's been in 30 years," says Merritt).

It's been a spell since Merritt took over the Messenger, at age 19, from his step-father who had run it for seven or eight years. Merritt will be 65 on July 27, and most agree that after Bertha, and the Messenger, his big love is sports. He rarely misses a ballgame.

Newsmaning is a business and Merritt has proved himself to be a good businessman, without frills or flourishes. One of his big thrills was be-

ing written up a few years ago in the Fort Worth Star Telegram by George Dolan in his "This Is West Texas" column. Merritt liked the article, except the part where George speculated on how much money the Messenger made.

Every writer who knows Merritt sees him as "good copy" and this one acknowledges the compliment in being given permission, but recognizes the difficulties in accurately putting Merritt on paper. Generous by nature in praise of others and conservative in things material, Merritt is one of those persons about whom you've heard it said: "They threw the mould away when they made him." He insisted on "No flowers, please."

The Carbon folk will be thanking Merritt and Bertha for carrying on the Messenger when they all gather for the July 4 weekend reunion, and hoping that the Messenger will be continued, if and when the DUNNs decide they've carried on as long as they can.

Every town has its pillars, and for Carbon: "There's always been Merritt."

Lions Exchanger Writes Of Swedish Holidays

Alexa Meredith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Meredith of Eastland, is on a 35-day tour of Sweden and other European countries. Alexa is living with a Swedish family for several days and will then visit several cities in Italy. She has already visited London and Paris and hopes to visit Norway. Alexa is staying in the home of Marianne Ohlsson, a Swedish girl who visited in her home last summer. The following letter tells of some of Alexa's experiences:

"We have been celebrating midsummer here. To the Swedish people, this is really an event. They decorate a pole (which reminds me of a May Pole) and the children dance around it. The ones who have the old costumes wear them. I have seen two of the celebrations. One is

funny. Marianne was talking about her birthday and that she would not get any presents and she said, 'We just don't take birthdays so hard.' Tonight we were talking about rockets and Mr. Ohlsson asked me if I had ever seen one run away from the earth.

"We are at the 'lake house' (it's not on the lake) Some of the furniture dates back to the 17th century. It is really pretty. The doors are very little. If you aren't careful, you will trip over the bottom part and bump your head on the top part. The reason for their being so small is that they wanted to keep all of the heat inside. The winters here are very cold. This house belonged to Mrs. Ohlsson's people. Her grandfather is still living; he is 100 years old.

"Today we went to Tallberg where Ohlsson's house is being built. The houses are built there and then moved to the place where it is wanted. It seems rather inconvenient to me but I guess they know what they're doing. It takes about 2 1/2 hours to drive to Hällefors from there. The garage is completely separate from the house. Both the house and garage are made of logs (pine). They make very beautiful houses and the amazing thing is that they use no nails. The house is two stories—(cellar and ground level).

"Sweden is really beautiful. Saturday Mr. and Mrs. Ohlsson and I went up to a mountain where some snow skiing is done in the winter. We went up on the ski lift and down on it too. It is over 1,000 feet high. The view is something you will never forget!

"We may go to Norway. If we don't go there we will probably go to the southern part of Sweden to see some old castles and museums.

"They tell me that it's time to mail the letter. Sorry about my writing and spelling and hope to see you soon."

Tony White Talks Pecans For Eastland Rotarians

The million-dollar pecan industry, its supporting association and events were outlined in a program for members of the Eastland Rotary Club Monday noon by Tony White of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Pecan Raisers Association.

Citing the importance of the industry, Mr. White pointed out that there are 15,000 acres of native pecan orchards, 2,100 acres of planted orchards, with an annual yield of some million and a half pounds from the improved varieties and about two and a half million pounds from the natives. "That's equal to about a million dollars and a good size factory payroll," he said.

"The first pecan show in the state was held in Eastland County 18 years ago this fall, Mr. White said and it was through the work of the late J. M. Cooper, longtime county agricultural agent, that the pecan industry grew in the county. Other officers in addition to White are: Dale Calhoun of Cisco, vice president; County Agent De Gordon of Eastland, secretary; and Ben McKinnis of Eastland, treasurer.

The association meets five times each year: an annual meeting in January; a budding and grafting school in April; a spring field trip; a fall field trip; and the annual show in December.

At the last meeting, it was voted by the association board to hold the annual show in Eastland each year rather than alternating the site, mainly because of the central location.

The last two shows, both held in Eastland, were outstanding successes, Mr. White said.

Two factors which are going to affect the economic picture of the pecan industry will be the development of improved varieties and mechanization. The association's job is to help those in the industry, and the key to a successful operation is control of insects and orchard

growth. Club President Roy Smith presided and guests included: Bob Qualls, Roy Huffmyer, Stanlee McCracken, Larry Robinson and Lawrence Davis, all of Cisco; Jim Well of Eastland; and Acting Sweetheart, Susie Hanna.

Buddy Carter was program chairman and introduced Mr. White. The Club will install new officers next week at the White Elephant Restaurant Monday meeting.

Mavericks Today Trophy Adders

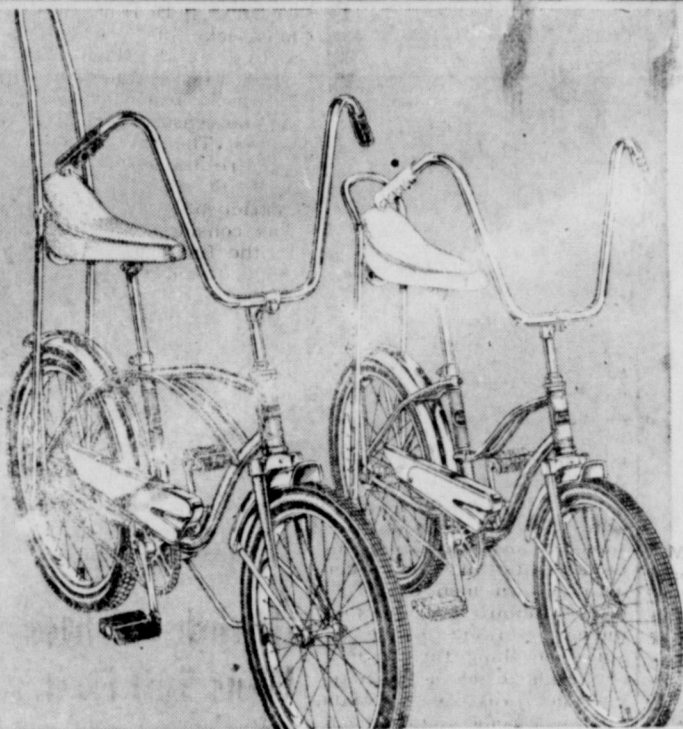

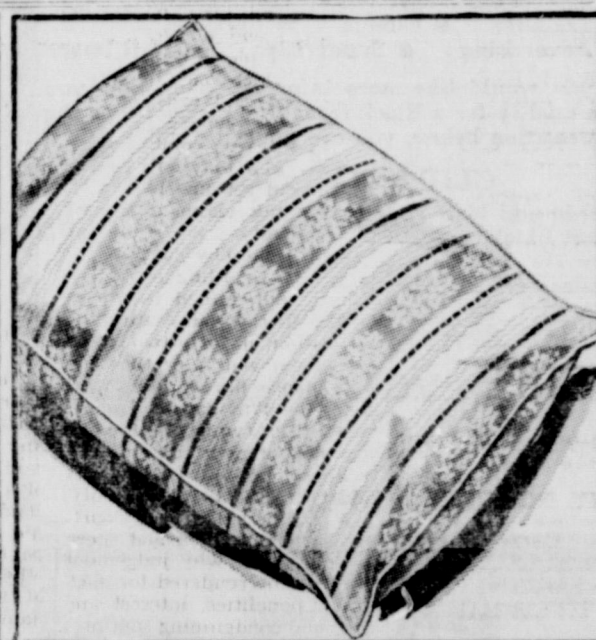

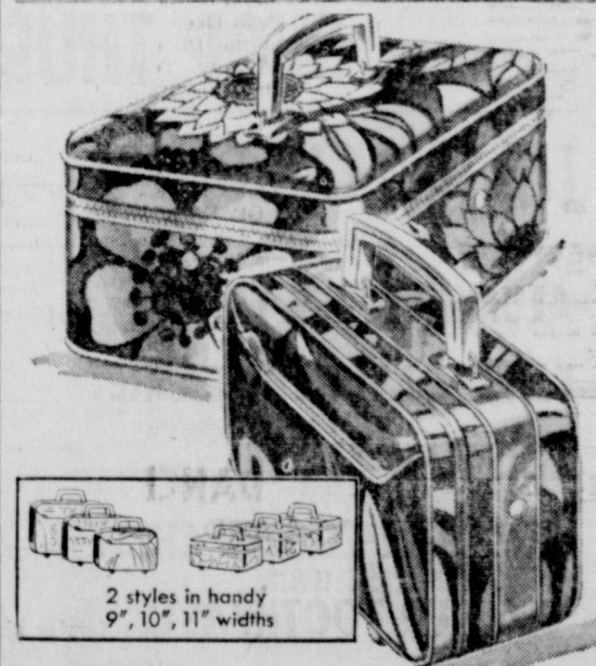
