This is a public service which is offered to the citizens of Eastland by the North Texas TB and Respiratory Disease Association in an effort to detect tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases such as emphysema, chronic bronchitis as well as coronary diseases.

The period September 19-25 has been proclaimed as "Highway Week in Texas" by Governor Preston Smith.

By official memorandum Governor Smith pointed out that the Texas highway system encompasses some 70 thousand miles of the nation's finest roads and highways.

"These vital travelways are essential to the continued growth of the Texas economy and from the 'Backbone of Total Transportation' in the Lone Star State," the memorandum said, setting the theme for the annual observance.

Governor Smith cited the Texas Highway Department for more than 40 years of leadership in highway beautification and safety, service and efficiency of the highway system.

He described the Highway Department as "The State's Largest Gardener" which plants more trees, wildflowers and ornamental shrubs than any other organization in the State.

Gov. Smith urged "all citizens to lend their total support to the highway program and the Texas Highway Department."

Highway Department installations across the State will stage special open house and other special ceremonies to mark the observance.

Highway Week in Texas has been under sponsorship of the Texas Good Roads Association since the first such observance a decade ago.

Student Immunization Program Starts Jan. 1

Students in Texas Schools must begin an immunization program by January 1, 1972, under provisions of a new law being implemented by the Texas State Department of Health under guidelines set by the Texas Board of Health. All students will be allowed to enter their respective school systems during the summer and fall terms this year with the provision that their immunizations against at least one of six diseases has been started by January 1, 1972, and completed as soon as medically feasible.

Required for grade school level youngsters are immunizations against diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, rubella and smallpox. Measles immunization is not required if there is a history of measles.

The number of immunizations to be given the student depends on high school and college-level students. Immunization requirements are spelled out in Senate Bill 27, which amends the Texas Education Code. Senate Bill 27, an amendment to Senate Bill 26, allows the State Health Department to modify, delete or add any of the required immunizations.

Legislative action came with a San Antonio diphtheria epidemic in the minds of its members and a rise in other diseases which can be prevented by immunizations. In its guidelines, the State Board of Health set January 1 as the date for having started the immunizations. New enrollees in the spring of 1972 and later semesters who have not completed the required immunizations at time of enrollment must complete them as soon as is medically feasible.

Included under the law are students in kindergartens associated with elementary schools, elementary or secondary schools, academies, colleges, universities and schools for the blind, deaf, and mentally retarded.

Exclusions from compliance may be granted to those who may be harmed by the required immunizations. A certificate is required from a physician licensed by the Texas Board of Medical Examiners. Exemptions also may be obtained on religious grounds. A religious exemption won't apply in time of emergency or epidemic declared by Commissioner of Health Dr. James E. Peavy.

Immunization schedules according to grade or age groupings include:

Kindergarten, grades on through five or children ages 5 through 11 in ungraded schools:

Polio — at least three doses of oral vaccine, provided one or more doses have been received since the fourth birthday.

Diphtheria-Tetanus — Minimum of three doses, with at least one dose having been received since the fourth birthday. (Usually given as DTP for children less than six years of age, and Td for children six years and older.)

Measles — One dose of vaccine, or history of measles illness.

Rubella — One dose of vaccine. Not required past age 12 years.

Smallpox — One vaccination within the past 10 years. Secondary Schools, children and others in six through 12, or children and others ages

Measles — One dose of vaccine, or history of measles illness.

Polio — A least three doses of oral vaccine, provided one or more doses have been received since the fourth birthday. (Polio vaccine is not required for persons 19 years of age or older.)

Diphtheria-Tetanus — Minimum of three doses with at last dose within ten years. Booster dose only after initial series. (Pertussis should not be given past age of six years.)

Measles — The majority of children in this group will have been previously immunized or obtained natural immunity through infection. It is recommended but not required on an individualized basis if history of vaccine or illness is thought to be negative.

Institutions of Higher Education — Polio — A least three doses of oral vaccine, provided one or more doses have been received since the fourth birthday. (Polio vaccine is not required for persons 19 years of age or older.)

Diphtheria-Tetanus — Minimum of three doses with last dose within 10 years. Booster dose only after initial series. (smallpox — One vaccination within the past 10 years. All schools will be required to maintain records of the immunization status of individual students. The State Health Department is designing a standard form for this purpose.

Since many types of personal immunization records are in current use, any document listing each immunization received by year will be acceptable during the 1971-1972 school year for either initiating or updating school immunization records.

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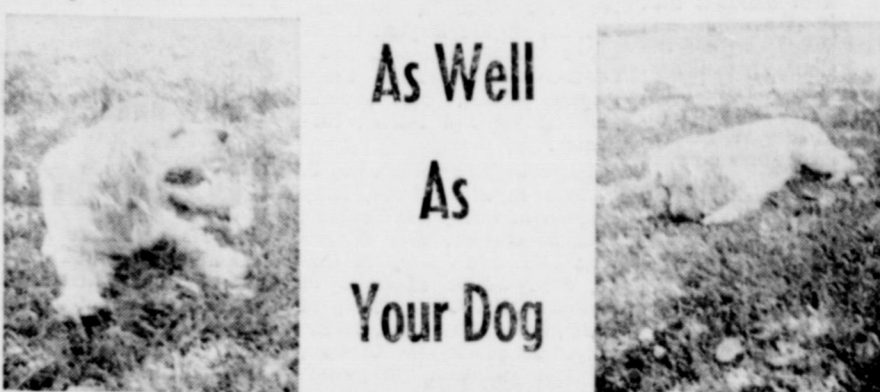

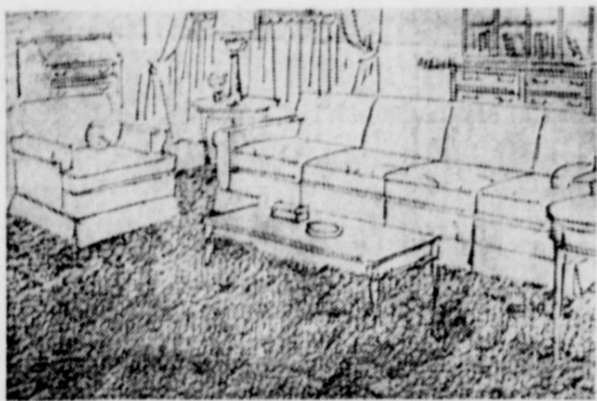

Lapel buttons denying Presidential ambitions among United States Senators would find few sales. The House of Representatives has its share of the ambitious too.

"BECAUSE I'VE BEEN MENTIONED as a Presidential prospect. Just this morning my wife said, 'Joe I think you've got just as much chance of being President as any of those other clunkheads.'" Once mentioned as a prospect you then and there become a Hopeful.

"ONE MENTION DOESN'T MAKE much of a prospect," the interviewer reporter said.

"OF COURSE NOT" AGREED JOE, "but go ask the local experts around the Country. My name will surely crop up."

"YOU MEAN TO VISIT 37 States in one day?"

"By EAOINSHRDLUHRDLR YES, I'LL FLY OVER EACH major city, drop press releases and some film strips

The newspaper, radio and television stations will do the usual and say, "Presidential Hopeful, Joe Blow, Visits Here." This will result in great savings and avoid a lot of stupid questions," Joe says.

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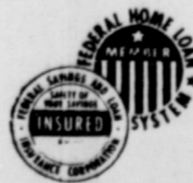
