started at 5 a.m. that morning. Sixty-six dropped out that day.

He said the only time he lost any weight was the time he got food poisoning in Missouri. He lost 15 pounds in two days.

Mr. Campbell was forced to drop out of the race in Toledo. His feet had developed bunyons and the doctor ordered him to quit.

He had run 2,600 miles in 64 days.
