Legal stations will include KTXS (Abilene - Sweetwater) KRBC, (Abilene), WFAA, of Dallas), KTVT (Fort Worth), UHF Channel 39 (Dallas), educational Channel 13 (Dallas), and KRLD (Dallas). Because of certain new FCC regulations, KRLD cannot be carried at all times, but it will be carried whenever legally possible. 



President Willis Is Appointed To Key Study Panel

Leland Willis, President of Cisco Junior College, has been appointed by the Coordinating Board of the Texas College and University System to ser-ve on the Resident Instruction Formula Study Committee.

This study will culminate in the Coordinating Board's designation of formulas for the 1971-73 biennium in January of 1970. Formulas are used by the public junior colleges in preparing requests for legislative appropriations and by the Governor and the Legislative Budget Board in mak-

ing recommendations on these requests. President Willis was one of three college presidents ap-pointed to the committee. Others are Dr. Jean Richardson of Del Mar College and Dr. Wayland Moody of San Antonio College. Representing the Coordinating Board on the



On or before September 1. 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section arplies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and cnly to the extent of actapplication of water to ual beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian rihas prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of wate actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971 Failure to file the sworn stat ement or statements in sub stantial compliance with Sec tion 4 shall extinguish and ban any claim of water right to which the Section applies.
