The Gordon Spot

When I left Eastland County to attend three weeks of school July 12 it was hot and dry. Crops were in need of rain and lawns were burned. I returned the first week mf August to find everything green and the fields were wet. I hope no one thinks my absence had anything to do with the rain.

I appreciate the other extension agents and our secretary, Janice King, for taking care of our responsibilities while I was gone. One of the unexpected problems that came up was the threat of Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis. It appears that the vaccination program was handled most efficiently. The credit for such a good job goes to Drs. John Foster, Bill Cardand Dick Hodges. Assistant Agent Paul Campbell helped by getting the information on the clinics to all horse owners through the news

Since mosquitoes are considered to be the prime vectors of the VEE disease, efforts should be made now to control the mosquitoes. You can help to mosquitoes possibly prevent the spread of Vee by eliminating mosquito breeding areas on or near your premises

Mosquitoes cannot hatch upless they are in water, so all standing water should be eliminated. Mosquitoes frequently breed in commonly over looked containers shouch as old tires, tin cans, jars, tubs, birdbaths, unused fish ponds, evaporative coolers, or even on a flat roof where water accumulates. Also septic tanks and cesterns are ideal breeding places unless they are kept tightly covered. Such areas should be carefully eliminated. Standing puuddlescan be treated with a householdin-secticide or a diesel fuel, or a small quantity of kerosene, but avoid treating animals drinking

Spray shrubbery, eaves of the house and around windows and doors with malathion to help control hiding mosquitoes and prevent them from entering

your home where mesquitoes very mosquito which could bite you or your horse to transmit

While looking at peanut fields this week I found that peanuts were turning yellow especially in low areas of the fields. Several things could cause this condition, but I believe the main cause is wet soil. When the soil becomes waterlogged the roots do not get enough oxygen causing the leaves to turn yellow.

Start the applications of fungicide as soon as the first evidence of the disease is dected and continue on seven to fourteen days intervals, depending on weather conditions. Failure to do an adequate job of controlling leaf spot early makes it most difficult to control latter.

Demonstrations have shown that good control of leaf spot can increase net returns as much as \$50 per acre over uncontrolled areas
