Freight Fate To Be Decided On Local Site

A hearing to determine the fate of railway freight service and the depot building here will be held in Eastland according to announcement by Chamber of Commerce President Jeff Glazner.

A hearing originally set for June 1 in Austin has been temporarily postponed and will be re-scheduled to be held in Eastland at a date to be announced.

The T&P Railway Co. had requested that the Texas Railroad Commission grant permission to terminate rail freight service in Eastland give permission to dismantle the depot building.

Chamber officials and local residents joined in an appeal to the R.R. Commission to re-schedule the hearing in Eastland. State Rep. Joe Hanna joined in the appeal, and the June 1 hearing was cancelled and will be re-set here.

Two years ago Eastland was successful in having a similar railroad request denied.

Jewell of the draft board retires

GREETINGS: This has thousands and thousands of Eastland Countians been greeted over the years, in letters of induction into the Army from the Selective Service.

And invariably the feeling has been that such summons come from Jewell Reaves, the lady at the draft board in Eastland.

The fact is of course, she has but been carrying out the orders of the Selective Service System, as administered by a local, civilian board.

But to one and all, Mrs. Jewell Reaves has been the link between civilian and draftee. She's been executive secretary of the board for 31 years.

She's now in retirement, having worked her last day for S.S. on Friday, May 28. And "not going to the office" is a hard task for her after those long years.

Naturally, she's had some very strong feelings about the induction of young men for military service, as one might imagine. She didn't like the idea of drafting men, knowing that many would be going to war, and that some would not be coming back. Try cleping with that thought on your mind for a while.

An unpleasant task, perhaps, but one that the circumstances of our society has deemed necessary, so Jewell did it the best way it could be done — as her record of audits and inspections proves.

And it's a difficult office job to begin with. Following regulations as set down at

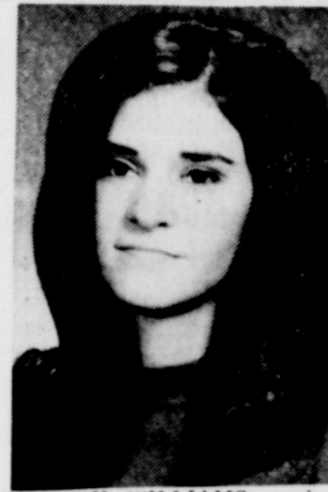
After the war, you may recall, the selective service shut down for about a year (from May, 1947 until the summer of 1948), and then came the Berlin crisis.

Who remembers that the draft board was on the fifth floor of the courthouse (now occupied by the 11th Court of Civil Appeals)?

The local offices were moved to the second floor of the Petroleum (Bank) Building in 1951.

Chairman of the first draft board in Eastland County was the late John Turner, long-time noted attorney here. Mrs. Reaves later served with boards under the chairmanship of Judge Frank Sparks, and for many years, the board was chaired by the late K. B. Tanner.

Crop And Pasture Outlook Good, Lakes Gain In Weekend Rainfall

Weekend rains that measured from six to nine inches over Eastland County materially improved the outlook for the planting of peanut and fall grain crops, filled stock tanks, raised the level of lakes and gave pastures their first real soaking in some six months.

Sept. 24, 1970, is generally considered the date of the last really good rain in the county.

High winds lashed the Rising Star area Monday afternoon during a rainstorm that added more moisture to the crop-savvy rains already received. There was little wind damage reported.

Precipitation ranged from a sprinkle north of Rising Star to two inches about four miles south. May received only a slight amount.

Total precipitation in the area varied from three inches to five or six during the past week or ten days, putting the croplands in excellent condition for planting, restoring pastures and replenishing stock water supplies.

Peanut farmers, who had planted only about 20 per cent of their 1971 allotted acres, were preparing to "hit the fields running" as soon as the land dries enough to work. June is usually the big planting month. The county has some 35,000 acres in peanut land allotments.

Pastures are expected to begin improving immediately as a result of the rain. Stock tanks throughout the county were reported to be full and in excellent condition.

County dirt roads had some damage, but machinery was busy in all precincts this week.

Tonkawa Downs Grand Opening Is Announced

Horsemen from Breckenridge, Eastland, Cisco, Ranger, Throckmorton and the Graham area have combined to establish a beautiful new Quarterhorse Race Track southwest of Graham.

The new facilities, located among beautiful 100-year-old pecan trees on the banks of the storied Brazos River, has been named "Tonkawa Downs."

The location site is part of the original Brazos River Indian Reservation established by the State of Texas prior to 1880.

The one-half mile straightway track will be formally opened at 3 p.m. Sunday, June 6 with a 10-race program featuring the First Annual Brazos River Purse, added, for 2-year-old registered quarterhorses.

The track facilities, consisting of stables, stands, concessions, picnic tables, etc., will be part of a 60-acre all-family park complex due for completion by the Spring of '72.

Seeking early certification from the American and Texas Quarterhorse Racing Association, Tonkawa Downs will be operated in compliance with all applicable state laws including prohibition of gambling, public drunkenness, etc.

Methodists To Meet June 7-9 In Fort Worth

FORT WORTH—Ratification of two proposed amendments to the United Methodist Church's constitution, election of representatives to the quadrennial policy making body of the church and the appearance of Dr. Molin Morris, "successor to Methodist founder, the Reverend John Wesley," are expected to highlight the Central Texas Annual Conference meeting June 7-9.

Business sessions will be conducted in the Sheraton-Fort Worth Hotel and First United Methodist Church will be the site of the evening worship services.

The two constitutional amendments before the conference were approved by the 1970 United Methodist General Conference and will become effective if ratified by at least two-thirds of the aggregate vote of the more than 80 annual conferences of the denomination.

One of the amendments would delete the minimum age requirement of 21 for members of the annual conferences. The other provides for two persons under 25 years of age from each district being seated in the session.

Dr. Colin Morris is pastor of Wesley's Chapel Methodist Church on City Road in London, England. Dr. Morris will be the conference preacher for this annual session of Central Texas Methodists. He will speak at worship services at First United Methodist Church Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday evenings at 7:30 p.m.

The Annual conference will also elect 22 delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences. The General Conference is the church's top law-making body, and the Jurisdictional Conference will elect and assign bishops, among other duties. The two bodies meet in 1972.

Bishop W. Kenneth Pope is expected to read 240 pastoral appointments Wednesday evening June 9.
