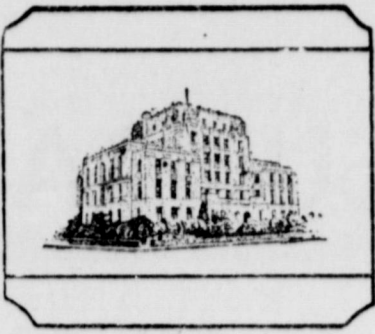

NOBODY ASKED, but if they were to, here's what we'd say about the Calley situation:

It seems a little late for the hue and cry! And this is not a pronouncement on guilt or innocence. It is the position that our protests should have come a long time ago — at the time of the original charge, and definitely before "due process of law."

If we object to this man's being charged with slaughtering civilians, we should have "raised the roof" when it first became known.

To wait so long, after a formal trial, to raise our voices and petitions isn't too healthy. Certainly every American has the right to petition, but should we petition the due process of law.

To attack the system smacks of revolt and the only kind of revolution we endorse is the one we all have at the ballot box every year or two or four. It was a military court that convicted the young lieutenant, and this is a part of our Judiciary system.

We cannot attack that system.

7th Annual Kendrick Pageant Here To Attract Largest Audience Ever

A record attendance is expected for the Seventh Annual Kendrick Easter Pageant at the Amphitheater between Eastland and Cisco this Sunday, judging from a year's publicity effort and tremendous early contacts concern-

H. Kendrick reports. An extra feature this year will be the presentation in nine scenes of the Book of Samuel, which will precede the portrayal of the birth, life, death and resurrection of Christ.

Given a half-way decent weekend, weatherwise, thousands are expected to cover the entire area and be on hand for the event which begins at 3:30 a.m. Sunday. The public is welcome to the free event and an exceptional presentation is anticipated.

A labor of love for the Kendrick family, they are joined by a multitude of area residents who assist and take part in the religious enactment of the favorite Bible stories.

New features this year also include the addition of a brand new, elaborate sound system and the Pageant's own resident camel, purchased especially to join the flock of Bible animals used yearly in the Pageant. The story will unfold on the multiple stages built especially for the Pageant.

Mark Kuhn of Eastland will be playing the part of Jesus in this year's production. The Pageant drew international publicity when the Progressive Farmer Magazine came and took pictures and ran an extensive color spread in that publication about the production. VFW Asks Calley Reversal

Texas Senators John Tower and Lloyd Benson are being petitioned by members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post here and across the state to reverse the decision in the case of Lt. Calley.

Copy of the resolution signed by Post Commander Milton Nash and Post Quartermaster J. W. Harper is as follows:

"We the 130 members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post No. 4136, Eastland, Texas, do respectfully request that the 'guilty' verdict be reversed in the case of Lt. Calley.

"We feel that this is one of the most horrible mistakes that the United States has made in our lifetime and feel that this is a personal slap in the face to every veteran who has served this country in wars in the past.

"Please reverse this decision immediately. For too much harm has been done already."

The Post Auxiliary is reportedly joining in the request to the government officials in behalf of Lt. Calley.



Doc Cabaness, 73, Prominent In Insurance, Masonic Bodies Dies

Doc Haywood Cabaness, 73, long time Cisco insurance man and prominent in Masonic and Veterans organizations, died Saturday, April 3, in E. L. Graham Memorial Hospital at 5:30 p. m. and was buried Sunday in Oakwood Cemetery here after funeral services at Cisco Funeral Home Chapel at 3 p. m.

Death followed an illness of about four weeks.

The services were conducted by the Rev. Robert W. Marsh, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church and Cisco Funeral Home directed burial arrangements.

Palbearers were Earl Gorr, J. D. Yardley, Tony White, George Boyd, Charlie Graham, Dago Huffmyer, Bob Elliott, and W. B. Wright.

Survivors include one brother Otto Cabaness of Cisco; a sister, Mrs. M. H. French of

Cisco; a nephew, Dr. Ralph Cabaness of El Paso and a niece, Mrs. Jere Hart of El Paso.

Mr. Cabaness wife, the former Jessie Carothers, whom he married in 1928, died in 1948.

Mr. Cabaness was born on May 30, 1897, in Anson, Texas. He had lived in Cisco for most of his life, where he was long prominent in the insurance business.

He was also very active in Masonry, and was a member of all Masonic bodies, from the basic or Blue Lodge through the Chapter and council; the Commandery, the Moslah Shrine of Fort Worth and the Dallas Consistory, in which he was associated for more than 50 years. He was a past commander of the Cisco Commandery and its treasurer at the time of his death. He was also a member of the Eastern Star Chapter, a Masonic auxiliary.

A veteran of World War I, he took a prominent part in the activities of the John William Butts Post of the American Legion of which he was a charter member and also in the Veteran of World War I organization.

The Cisco Rotary Club was another organization which he was long devoted.
