1,000 Acres Plus Burned in Fires Here This Week

Close to 1,000 acres of land were destroyed by fire Wednesday night, Feb. 17, about five miles east of Eastland near Lake Leon. Bud Fox on the Lake Road, was first to report the fire.
According to Guy Peel, Eastland Fire Chief, the fire started near the Lone Cedar Country Club, between Eastland and the lake, and threatened a number of buildings at one time.
He said the firefighters main objective was to protect the buildings in the area. There have been no reports of any buildings being damaged or any injuries.
Volunteers and fire units from Ranger, Carbon, Eastland and Gorman began fighting the fire about 3:30 p. m. Wednesday, he said.
Peel said bulldozers and maintainers were being used to blow fires.
The firefighters worked up until about 1:00 a. m. Thursday morning, before they got where they could bring it under control.
A small fire broke out from the remains, again, Thursday morning, about 8:00 a. m., and one Thursday evening about 7:00 p. m., requiring the services of the Fire Department.
Two small fires have been reported within the Eastland City Limits since Thursday morning. One house was endangered, and two units were called as a result.

Public Invited Wednesday

The Eastland Youth Conference will present to Area School Children, a panel of four inmates, called "Operation Kick-It," at different intervals Wednesday, Feb. 24 and Thursday, Feb. 25.
The Texas Department of Corrections, in an effort to actively combat the growing drug abuse problem, has initiated a program which attempts to strike at the heart of the drug problem by demonstrating what can happen to the drug abuser. These four inmates, have been touring the state since June, telling their story of drug misuse before junior and senior high school assemblies.
Through this program, the inmates are enabled to speak directly to the public and present their simple message—"Illegal drugs are dangerous. Drug abuse is against the law and you can go to prison for it. We did."

The four volunteer panelists are young first offenders, age 17-21. Each was convicted for possession of marijuana, one for the sale of drugs.
Each inmate tells briefly about his home life, how he began using drugs, and the events leading to his arrest.
"Operation Kick-It," which is funded by a grant from the Governor's Criminal Justice Council, is similar in format to the highly successful "Operation: Teenager," which was established by TDC in 1962. The purpose of this program is to combat crime among youth by presenting an inmate's story of his own road to crime.
The appeal of "Operation Kick-It" is straightforward and sincere. As one inmate panelist summarizes it, "Down at the pen, it's the simple things that count. Don't ignore the simple life, because that's where it's at."

Eastland Civic League and Garden Club, 12, noon Wednesday 24;
Eastland High School, 1:40 p. m. Wednesday 24;
Gorman High School, 9:00 Thursday 25;
Carbon High School, 11:00, Thursday 25;
Rising Star High School.

The program is free of charge, and is approximately 35 minutes long.

**PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 5)
Special Election May 18, 1971**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Section 51-a of the Texas Constitution be amended to read as follows: "Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of: (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years; (2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps; (3) Needy blind persons; (4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children. "The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation

in these programs as it deems appropriate. "The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of State funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of State funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of State funds paid for assistance grants for needy dependent children and the caretakers of the children shall not exceed Fifty-Five Million Dollars (\$55,000,000) during any fiscal year. "Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to the State for these purposes, then and in that event the

Burleson Introduces Bill To Expand Health Care Services

WASHINGTON — Congressman Omar Burleson today re-introduced a bill to make comprehensive health care insurance accessible to all Americans and strengthen the organization and delivery of health services in the U.S.

Twelve other congressmen joined the Texas representative in co-sponsoring the National Healthcare Act.

The legislation, with minor technical variations, parallels the Healthcare Bill which Burleson introduced in the closing days of the 91st Congress.

"My bill is a middle-of-the-road approach to resolving one of our most pressing domestic problems, financing and providing for the delivery of adequate medical care to all our citizens," Mr. Burleson said.

"It is an effort to make certain that all Americans will be cared for in times of illness—and at a price this nation can afford to bear.

"The Healthcare approach retains the best features of our existing voluntary insurance plans, seeks to control costs in health delivery while extending health care to all Americans regardless of their ability to pay.

"My bill aims at remedying shortages and poor distribution of Health manpower by improved student loan program for doctors, nurses and allied personnel. My bill also calls for a study of existing loan and grant programs. It provides for grants to schools to facilitate training additional personnel and to foster ambulatory care. Personnel agreeing to serve in areas short of critical medical services could also qualify for grants.

"To increase ambulatory care, the bill would extend hospital loan programs and provide grants to encourage development of ambulatory care centers. Ambulatory care benefits would also be covered in all health insurance plans.

"Financial support for state and local health planning would also be made to encourage priority-ranked community plans which can be coordinated with other health programs.

"To hold down spiraling costs and assure quality care, the plan would tie all federal loans, grants and contracts to certification of need by a comprehensive health planning unit.

"Tax incentives would be provided to assure comprehensive benefit levels and state pools of private health insurers would be established to provide standard benefits for the poor, near-poor and

previously uninsurable. Benefits for the latter would be subsidized by federal and state funds.

"Minimum Standard Health Care Benefits would be set by the government. These standards, effective in 1973 for private group and individual plans, would cover diagnostic X-ray and lab examination on an ambulatory basis; all surgery and radiation therapy in ambulatory care center; well-baby care for up to six visits with in six months after birth; charges for physician's services while institutionalized; the first 30 days of semi-private general or psychiatric hospital care; the first 60 days of nursing home convalescence, and the first 90 days of approved home health care per illness.

"State benefit pool plans for the poor and others would begin July 1, 1972, and would provide additional benefits in these areas: six visits per year per family member to a doctor or ambulatory care center; well-baby care for up to 12 visits during the first two years; dental care for children under 19; prescription drugs; rehabilitation services, maternity care and family planning; the first 120 days of semi-private general or psychiatric hospital care; the first 120 days of nursing home care and the first 180 days in an approved home health care program.

"In 1976, benefits for private and individual plans would be raised to the level initially required for the state pool plans. State pool plans would also be raised in 1976 to cover all ambulatory and dental care without limit and up to 300 days of hospital care. These additional benefits would be required for qualified private and individual insurance plans in 1970.

"It is estimated that present costs, that the National Health Act would add \$3.2 billion to federal outlays for health programs in the first year the plan would be in effect," Mr. Burleson said.
