Super Billboards to Welcome Interstate Travelers at Opening

Interstate Highway 20 will be opened south of Eastland and Cisco probably sometime between the middle of October and Nov. 1, Resident Engineer R. P. (Buddy) Haun reports.

Original estimate was for an Oct. 1 opening, but a re-design of Highway Signs is going to delay the opening for some time, he said. Under a new national program, all interchanges ont the Interstate are to be numbered, and although the signing contract was let back in May for this project, revisions are being made by the sign contractor. The roadway will not be open until signs are in place (Interchanges in this project will be in the 300 series.)

The two construction contractors probably will complete the highway before that date, but the stretch won't be opened to traffic until the major portion of the signs are in place, Mr. Haun said.

BILBOARDS TO BE READY

Contract has been let by the Billboard Committee of ETHE Eastland Chamber of Commerce, President Jeff Glazner reports, and the giant signs will be erected east of Eastland SOOL

Designed by top-flight designers, the boards to the east will be in a series of three. There will be two eight by 16 feet Scotchlighted signs: the first will read: "Watch for the 10-mile bbreak just ahead."

The third and biggest board will be 40 feet wide and 19 feet tall. All the signs will be erected 10 feet off ground level, making them easily seen and read. The big sign will be electrically lighted.

To the left of the big sign is a map showing the "10-mile break" routeon U. S. 80 "off the Interstate", which if followed by the traveler, will take him from east of Eastland to west of Cisco.

Cisco and Eastland are working co-operatively on this project, and the billboards to be erected by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce will plug the same 10-mile stretch, so that traveler getting off west mf Cisco, will logically follow old U.S. 80 (which will continue to be maintained as a national highway,) all the way through Eastland, to rejoin the Interstate east of Eastland. All the signs will be primary colors of sunflower yellow backgrounds with jet black lettering, except for one line (See Old Rip at the Courthouse!) in royal blue. Copy on the sign reads: 10mile "Take br a Copy on the big sign reads: "Take a 10-mile break from the Interstate through Eastland.

Mr. and Mrs. Furse, who reside at 407 Ashford Forest Drive in Houston, are parents of a son and a daughter.






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Sorority Paints Playground Equipment







Almost every day for the past f. ew weeks I've looked at the calendar to make sure this is August. The weather has been everything but typical for August.

James Reid, Eastland Banker, says he has never heard of peanut farmers say he didn't want any more rain in August. There are quite a few saying it now. Most of the growers with irrigated peanuts tell me their peanuts are waterlogged and need lots of sunshine. Claude Fuller of Gorman thinks his peanuts will make less than last year's crop He told me about another grower who had planted peanuts in April, irrigated three times, and has now had 22 inches of rain on them.

Most dry land peanuts producers agree that it's better to have too much rain than to have none. Lee Starr of Cisco said that around July 20 the prospects for a peanut crop looked as bad as in the early 50's. Now the out look is much brighter, and the prospect for a good dry land crop is about as good as any year he can remember

The lesser cornstalk borer activity has decreased but some damage is still occuring. The worst threat to peanuts now is the leaf spot disease. It spreads fast in warm humid weather. Fortunately producers can do something about this disease if they begin treatment early enough an continue treatment at 7 to 14 day intervals through the remainder of the season. There are several good fungicides available for leaf spot control.

The summer for age crops are the best I have seen during my five years in Eastland county As I drive around the county I see a lot of hay that needs to be cut, but wet ground prevents harvest operations.

Hay cut at an early stage of growth have higher protein content than those harvested at a mature stage; so when making hay, don't forsake quality for quantity.

The stage of growth and the time of the year greatly influence quality. Harvest your hay young and expect slightly lower yields per cutting when weather permits. In many cases, thetotal yield per year will be just as high as if the crops had been allowed to grow '

Costal bermudagrass should be cut when it reaches a height of 12 to 14 inches. Sorghum. sudan hybrids, johnsongrass and native grass hays should be cut in the boot stage, just before bloom ing.

Once the crops are cut and baled, it gets no better. It is never any better than the day it was cut.

The pecan crop is going to be very small this year, but the quality should be excellent. The nuts are extremely large for

This means that persons now using a registered brand or mark must register within the six month period (Sept. 1, 1971 through February 29, 1972). After this time any unrecorded brand becomes available on a "first - come" basis The brands and marks must be rerecorded every 10 years.

Periodic reregistrations are enacted to lear the records of brands no longer being used.

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VETERANS

Veterans and their depen-dents-and the general publicfrequently refer to veterans' entitlement to "compensation" and "pension" as if the terms were interchangeable. Each of these words have distinctively different meanings in describing veterans' benefits, according to Jack Coker, Waco VA Regional Director.

Compensation, the Veterans Administration explains, is paid because of a disability or death that resulted from

military service. Pension, on the other hand, is paid on the basis of need to wartime veterans or their dependent survivors when the veteran is tot ally and per-manent: ly disabled from causes not traceably to military service, or when he dies of such causes.

Payments for compensation nay go to a veteran, if he has been disabled by an injury or disease that originated or was aggravated while he was in active military service. When death results from military service or from a service-connected disability after service, compensation goes to the veterans unremarried widow or dependents. Income from other sources is not considered.

Payments for pension may be made to eligible veterans or surviving dependents whose income falls below levels set by law. The amount of the pension varies with the recipients in-

come from other sources. Information on these benefits and other Veterans Administration programs may be obtained from any VA office, veterans county service officer. or local veterans service organization representative.





Free Lunch Program Outlined

The Eastland Public Schools today announced a free and reduced price lunch policy for Eastland school children unable to pay the full price. Local School Officials have adopted a family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within the scales oor those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the

Siebert, Supt. of Schools, whose address is Box 31, Eastland Texas (900 W. Plummer St.) has been designated as the Hearing Official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy. The policy also provides that

there will be no identification of our discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch. A complete copy of the policy

is on file in each school and in the office of the Superintendent of Schools at the High School Building where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.
