

GIRL SCOUTS ATTEND TRAINING SESSION





Farmers to Vote

Peanut growers will vote by mail in a referendum on having marketing quotas on their 1972, 1973, and 1974 crops, says Tommy J. Lawson, county executive director of the Eastland County Agricultural Stablization and Conservation Service. The referendum dates have been set as December 6 through 10, and ballots must be returned to the county ASCS office - - By mail or in person - -By the December 10 deadline. "Growers have approved

marketing quotas for each year's peanut crop since 1949. In the last 3-year vote held in December 1968, 96.9 percent of the 50,358 growers voting approved quotas. We are hopeful that all peanut voters will use the convenient mailing system to cast their ballots this year, "

A grower will be eligible to vote in the referendum if he is entitled to share in the 1971 peanut crop of a farm which produced more than 1 acre of nuts. A landlord of a standing rent, cash rent, or fixed rent tenant is not eligible to vote.

It takes a favorable vote by two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum to approve marketing quotas for the next three years. Whether or not quotas are approved, peanut acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for government loans. Lawson explained that if

marketing quotas stay in effect there will be marketing penalties on the peanuts produced in excess of a farm's allotment. Growers who do not exceed their allotments will be eligible for loans at 75 percent of parity.

If more than one-third of the growers voting are opposed, marketing quotas and penalties will not be in effect for the 1972 peanut crop, and loans to growers who keep within their acreage allotments will drop to 50 percent of parity. In this case, another referendum would be held in 1972 for the next three crops.

Texas has received an allotment of 358,005 acres. which represents the state's share of the 1,610,000 national acreage allotment. There are some 850 peanut farms in Eastland County. Growers will receive notice of their individual farm peanut allotments prior to the referendum. "Peanut farmers in the area

should keep in mind the referendum date, and be sure to case their votes by the December 10 deadline," Lawson said.

"All eligible farmers are encouraged to participate in the voting. ASCS closely adheres to the nondiscrimination guidelines set up by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Every farmer in the county is welcome to seek assistance, information and answers to any questions they may have concerning the agency's Farm Action Programs, regardless of race, color, sex, creed, or national

origin," Lawson added. The county ASCS office is located in the courthouse in Eastland, Texas. The telephone number is 817-629-1636.

"As the nation enters phase II. ASCS county offices along with the Internal Revenue Service will continue to provide public information at the local level, " Lawson said.

The county ASCS Office will receive regular updated in-Cost-of-Living Council, Price Commission, and Pay Board. Residents calling or visiting the county office about a wageprice problem, will get answers on the spot if the questions fall within existing guidelines.

More complex questions will be forwarded by county office personnel to the nearest IRS Office for reply.

We are not authorized to handle complaints, violations and requests for exemptions, but we will forward them to the IRS district headquarters office," Lawson explained. Mr. Lawson also said that the

number and name of anyone filing a complaint or violation will be kept confidential.

Any questions that cannot be answered by ASCS or interpreted by the IRS district office will be forwarded for higher level action. The person making the inquiry will be informed if this action is taken. Details on procedures for appealing decisions also are available upon request.


