IT HAS BEEN

(Editor's Note — Source of the following article by Mrs. Vada Arnold is some old Cisco newspapers found among the effects of Odie Kean recently).

The Cisco weekly newspaper of 1895 bore the name of "The Cisco Weekly Round-Up". Edited and published by Frank Vernon, the paper was in its fourteenth year.

Happenings of the town and community were printed on Saturday each week.

Some news items may seem insignificant compared to newspaper stories of today. Nevertheless they were interesting and enjoyed by numbers of early day subscribers. In the Saturday August 10, 1895 issue the editor said:

"We have in our office a cluster of pears from the orchard of Mr. H. Rominger which is a curiosity. The five twigs holding them are about an inch long and all growing from the same joint around the main twig, which is about the size of a lead pencil and two inches long and the entire bunch grew straight out from the body of the tree, and not from any branch.

"A few nights ago a number of Cisco people drove over to Eastland to participate in the enjoyment of an ice cream supper given by the Baptist ladies, and while there some marauders ransacked the vehicles, carrying off every basket, grip, etc. and all the collars and cuffs, curling irons and appertenances of like nature. While the value was not great in itself, yet the inconvenience was considerable. And while the parties do not hold any of the good people of Eastland to account, yet they would feel duly grateful were the proper parties thoroughly punished.

"LOST A POCKET BOOK" — Monday afternoon Charlie Rhinehart left a large red pocket book in one out building containing \$100 in \$20 bills, and upon returning to get it, it was gone. This is every cent hard earned money, and it is to be hoped it will yet be returned. In case some stranger found it and

knows not the owner, a fair reward will be paid for the trouble of returning it. There were three notes and some receipts in the pocket book.

"Wednesday night some Eastland boys were in town in the capacity of hack drivers and about 1:30 in the very early morning hours they took their abrupt departure, at a dead run, the roar of the wheels, clatter of the horses hoofs and constant yelling of the youthful, passing out of town over the hard Macadamized streets awoke the natives to a realization of they know not what. City Marshal Whiteside will have a reckoning, however then! Oh, Then; things (and especially the funny things) will not be what they seem."

Rural correspondents came in for their share of the news from Scranton —

"The Sharp shooters and worms are doing great damage to the cotton crops. Farmers are busy ricking their cane for winter feed. The Baptist will begin their protracted meeting at this place on Tuesday after the second Sunday in this month August. The annual camp meeting at Pisgah begins there next Friday night. They always have a good meeting there and treat everybody nice.

"Mrs. Mountcastle will teach a singing school at Scranton this summer. It is not known when she will begin teaching, but sometime soon. She is an excellent singer and a fine musician, being a graduate of a Chicago college.

"Sipe Springs reported an exciting and enjoyable game of ball that was played a Sipe Springs, last Tuesday between Sipe Springs nine and Gorman nine. The grounds were about one mile from town in T. F. Haley's pasture, quite a number witnessing the game. Except for a little squabble everything passed off very smoothly.

The positions of the Sipe Springs nine follows. Standifer-catcher, Needham-pitcher, Jansford, first base, Yantis-second base, Haley-third base, Hall-short stop, Ashenghurst-center field, Wilkerson left fielder, Spivey-right fielder & P. H. Chilton-umpire. The score stood at 8 to 13 in favor of Sipe Springs.

A baby shower was held in compliments to Mrs. Greg Emphinger, by members of the Olden Baptist Church, Sunday evening at 8:30 in the Fellowship Hall of the church.

The serving table was laid with a white net cloth, and centered with a charming arrangement of baby doll, pink and blue blossoms.

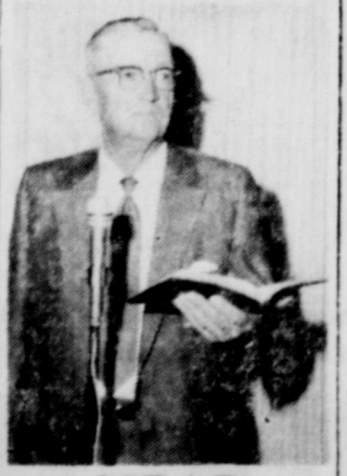

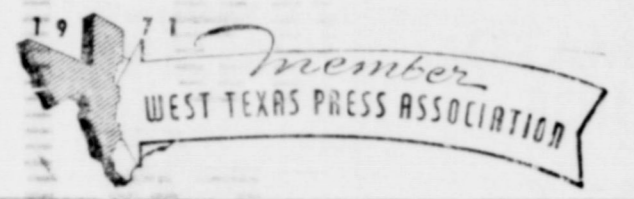

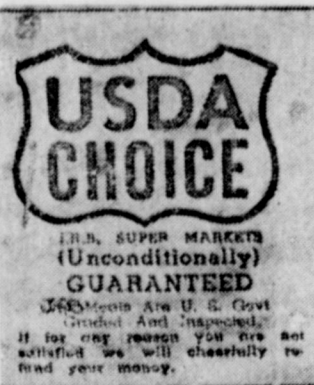

Seed Laboratory Moved To New Location

GIDDINGS—The new 10,000 square foot Texas Department of Agriculture Seed Laboratory at Giddings is now open for business, according to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White.

Commissioner White and Seed Division director Bill Staffel said persons formerly using the TDA Seed Laboratory in Austin, should now send seed samples for purity and or germination testing to the Giddings facility.

The move from the expensive Capitol area complex in Austin to Giddings will save taxpayers nearly \$3000 monthly in rent and utilities.

A new concept in cooperation between state agencies coincides with the lab construction. The TDA will provide training programs for youths under detention at the Texas Youth Council in the labs, greenhouses and 85 acres that will be used for seed testing, explained White.

TDA seed analyst John Metcalf will head laboratory operations. He will have about 20 employees, most of whom transferred from the old lab at Austin.

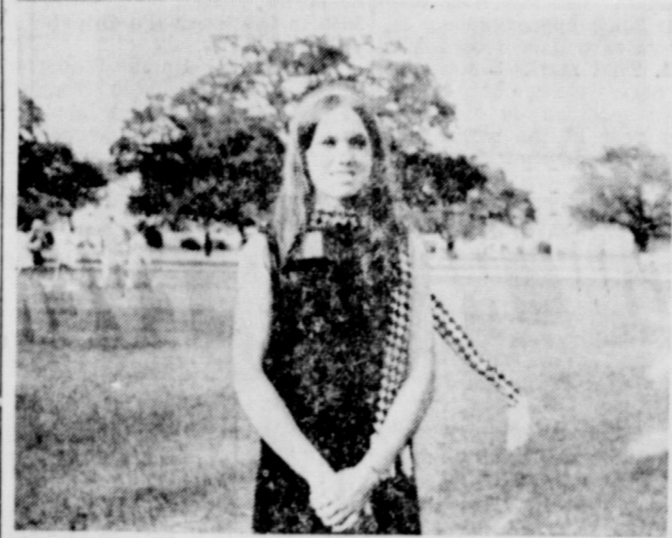

Ben Barnes To Be Candidate For Governor

Austin, June 14—Lieutenant Governor Ben Barnes Monday announced that he will be a candidate for Governor of Texas in next year's elections. Barnes announced his decision at a news conference at the State Capitol. The announcement ended speculation whether Barnes would seek the Governorship or run for the United States Senate.

Barnes, at 33, has more than ten years of experience in public office in Texas. He first won election to the Texas House from De Leon in 1960. He was elected Speaker of the House in January, 1965, and 1967, thus becoming the youngest Speaker in Texas history to serve two consecutive terms.

In his first bid for statewide office, Barnes was elected Lieutenant Governor in November of 1968, and became the first candidate in the history of Texas to poll more than two million votes. He was re-elected to a second term in November of 1970.

Accent on Health

Just last month, on May 14, the dread disease smallpox, the world medical community Why would this be of in- marked the 175th anniversary terest to the average Texan of the first vaccination against today? Because one of the

true victories for the science of immunology is now appar- ent. The eradication of the disease organism that causes smallpox is now almost com- plete. It is now estimated that only six countries in all the world will continue to report the occurrence of this once dreaded disease by the end of 1971. That cheerful word comes from officials at the Texas State Department of Health. During the first four months of 1971, less than 14,000

cases of smallpox were re- ported by 13 countries to the World Health Organization. Over half of these cases were reported by Ethiopia, with the balance spread out over scattered areas of Africa, Asia, South America, and a few cases in Europe. Health officials new estimate that approximately 25,000 cases will be recorded in 1971. That marks a substan- tial decrease from the 131,000 cases recorded in 1967, the first year of the world-wide

Smallpox Eradication Pro- gram. Still, you continue to ask, how does this affect me? While smallpox is still consid- ered a problem in some parts of the world, the disease does not at present occur in the United States. The last out- break in America occurred in 1949 in the lower Rio Grande valley of Texas. In 1938, the United States recorded nearly 15,000 cases of smallpox. Ten years later, in 1948, less than one per

cent of that number of cases was reported. Only 50 cases were diagnosed in the United States. For almost two decades now there have been no smallpox cases reported in this country. So why should you contin- ue to be concerned over a dis- ease that is now almost era- dicated? The answer is quite simple. The only way to af- ford you and your children 100 per cent protection from smallpox is to completely era- dicate it from the face of the
