

Peach. Plum Spraying Time Now Agent Says

It is now time to begin the spray schedule for the control of insects and diseases peach and plum trees. County Agent De Gordon says the main insect to control is the plum curculio. The adult insect begins laying eggs when the petals fall, and continue for several weeks.

The agent suggests using malathion and wettable sulfur to control the major fruit inspots and diseases such as brown rot and peach scab. The first spray should be applied when 75% of the blossom petals have fallen. The second application should be sprayed on 10 days after fall. The third petal spra should be applied 10 to 14 days after the second application. A fourth application should be sprayed on 14 to 21 days after the third application

Gordon said it is importan to correctly apply all four applications. One or two applications will not control the insects. Discontinue using malathion after four applications, but sulfur should be applied every two or three weeks if disease has been a problem in the past.
