Livestock of a different variety will be much in evidence at the Eastland County Sheriff's Posse Barn this Saturday and Sunday, when the first annual Eastland Jaycee Rattlesnake Round-Up gets underway.

What's the rattle situation in the Eastland area?

Better than might be expected, it's guessed. (One resident is reportedly saving a big den — about 100 pounds — of rattler in his cellar, to cash in at the Round-Up.)

Eugene Kitchens is chairman for the Jaycee event and to be featured will be Bill Ransberger of Sweetwater who will give demonstrations of live domestic snakes and treatment for snake bite. Kitchens may be contacted at 629-2566 for more information.

In the sheep division of the show, in the breeding medium wool, Danny Harvey placed 4th and fifth while Jerry Wilson placed second and tenth.

In the market lambs fine wool class, Charles Marshall placed third, Fine-medium wool Cross Terry Wilson placed fifth and Ray Williams, 9th.

In the swine division Jim Brown won Reserve Champion of all breeds. He placed first in the breeding class while Doug Almand placed second. Wally Pierce placed third. Sam Harris placed fifth and Gary Mathis placed tenth.

Peach, Plum Spraying Time Now Agent Says

It is now time to begin the spray schedule for the control of insects and diseases on peach and plum trees. County Agent De Gordon says the main insect to control is the plum curculio. The adult insect begins laying eggs when the petals fall, and continue for several weeks.

The agent suggests using malathion and wettable sulfur to control the major fruit insects and diseases such as brown rot and peach scab. The first spray should be applied when 75% of the blossom petals have fallen. The second application should be sprayed on 10 days after petal fall. The third spray should be applied 10 to 14 days after the second application. A fourth application should be sprayed on 14 to 21 days after the third application.

Gordon said it is important to correctly apply all four applications. One or two applications will not control the insects. Discontinue using malathion after four applications, but sulfur should be applied every two or three weeks if disease has been a problem in the past.

Fish Farming Is Topic for Rotary Meeting

Frank Sayre informed Rotarians and guests on the interesting findings in the "Catfish Production" business, at the Rotary meeting, Monday, at the White Elephant.

Sayre, Division Manager of Texas Electric Service Co., gave information on the latest research work that is being done in the work and production of the "Catfish Farm" which is a Texas Electric Service Company Research Department project.

The beginning objective of the catfish culture, in the discharge canals of power plants, came about when studies by the company and others indicated that waste heat and water circulation which are by-products of steam-electric production of power caused production of fish in Lake Colorado City in West Texas.

Basically the idea for fish culture is to take the waste energy found in the warm discharge waters and convert this energy to fish growth during those fall, winter, and spring months when normal Texas water temperatures are too cold for significant fish growth.

It was extremely interesting to note how the fish grew from a little less than 4 inches in the beginning, and within a very maximum length of time, would double and quadruple in size and weight.

They do not sell the fish. The research is just to explore the possibilities for fish culture and other beneficial uses of the growth energy of the warm discharge. The "farm" stays open the year around. Rotarians had guest from Breckenridge, and Cisco.

Report From Your Representative

Something new is going on in the legislature this year: a tax bill is to be passed first, before appropriations!

In the past, the tax bill has been one of the last to be presented in the sessions. It was decided it might save the state some money if the tax bill came first, and then let the appropriations committee decide which agency gets what from the money produced from that tax bill, or what ever is available.

We believe it is better to spend within some frame work, than not to have any guide when deciding on new and additional services and function for the state to perform.

Friday, the 12th, is the close of the 60-day period for true introduction of bills. Hereafter, only "emergency" measures can be introduced, and then only by consent of the House or Senate.

Two observations are paramount of the legislative system:

(1) that almost without exception, bills introduced are never exactly what one would

like to vote on. Each contains parts that are not to the best interest of the particular member's district. We must make the decision: "does the proposed law contain more good than bad?" With 150 men voting, this is understandable, for each would prepare a different approach to any given subject.

(2) That committees in studying the bills referred to them are thorough and conscientious. Most of these committees have 21 members and when a subject is presented before them, they can ask all the questions needed to understand the intent of the bill and who it will help or hurt. The person or persons presenting the proposal feels that he is on the witness stand being questioned by not one, but 20 district attorneys. This committee work does more to keep down unwanted legislation, by amending objectionable parts of bills, than any other part of the process of making laws.

The Apollo 11 space craft was viewed by over 200,000 people. Many waited as much as three hours standing in line to get a view of the craft and moon rocks. This shows the interest by the public to the space program. I was able to greet a number of people of our area who brought their children to Austin to see this interesting and educational exhibit.

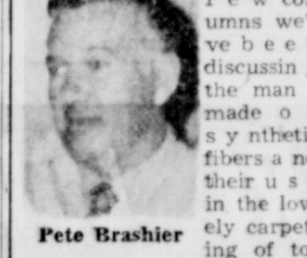
