We have been told that if Eastland, Ranger and Cisco was set up under a one telephone unit the cost of such service would be prohibitive. We do not believe this is so. For one thing such service has been offered in the Rio Grande Valley and other points for years, and their service rate is far from prohibi-

We can think of nothing which would bring these three cities closer together than a one service system. Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. would be doing a wonderful service for Eastland County, and in the long run a stronger county would mean more business for Bell.

We do not know how much money Bell clears a month on long distance calls between these three towns. At 15c a call it couldn't be a great amount. We do know that the three towns combined have 5383 telephones in use. Let's say, just to find a starting place, that the tri-city service would cost an additional 25c a month. That would mean a profit of \$1,345.75 a month for Bell, or \$16,148 a year. The (Continued on Page Four)






