Boys Confess They Burned Church Building

The arrest of some 15 Eastland and Ranger teenage boys has solved a series of hubcap thefts, Sheriff J. B. Williams declared Saturday morning. Sheriff Wiliams said the youths, ranging in age from 12 to 16 years, have also idmitted setting fire to the Church of God state building just west of Eastland on Highway 80.

Sheriff's officers Saturday norning were still rounding up the oungsters. City Police, are also orking on the case.

Local officers have been trying to break up the gang which has been stealing practically every hubcap and car mirror in sight. They got their break this week when Cisco Police stopped a carload of boys and discovered number of hubcaps. They notified local officers who got confessions out of the boys. The youths first arrested also listed the names of a

number of other boys involved. The boys admitted entering the Church of God building and stuffing paper under some mattresses, then setting it on fire. "Just being me'an," Sheriff Williams told reporter who asked why the youths did it.

The boys had given some older boys a few of the hubcaps, but they were not being held.

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



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
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
