O. was serious when he told us we should string an eight column picture of flowers across the top of Sunday's Telegram with the words, "Spring Is Here."

How does he know? He says all you have to do is believe. Then he told us of the story of the little town which decided that believing would do the trick as far as stopping their drought was concerned. So one Friday everyone in town carried their rain coats around with them. That Friday morning the sun laughed down at the townsfolk but they kept carrying those raincoats. And at 5 p.m. sharp clouds seemed to come from nowhere and a heavy rain began to fall.

Now as best we can figure this thing out, the thing for all of us to do now is to pack our winter clothes and wear short sleeves to work Monday morning. We mentioned this theory to one local MD and he was all for it. "Certainly would help my business," he said.

The other day at the meeting of Eastland's Old Men's Club, Dr. J. H. Caton, a charter member of the Rotary Club, gave a talk on the club's history.

In his talk Dr. Caton spoke about things "which are amusing today but were at one time things we didn't talk about."

Like for instance, he told his fellow members of the Order of the Rocking Chair, that when the club was first organized no preachers were allowed to join. The Eastland citizen then beat a hasty retreat home.

Cisco citizens were aroused after learning what had happened, and they voiced their opinions loud and strong. Finally, Dr. Caton recalls, a minister held a revival halfway between the two cities and calmed the atmosphere down.

Then there was the time a student loan program was initiated. Dr. Caton's memory of that is that one student ended up with all the loans.

While there was a lot of humor mixed in with the good Doctor's report, there was also a long list of accomplishments the club has to its credit. And, as Dr. Caton said, the list of past members reads like a Who's Who book. The Rotary Club is, as it has been for many years, a vital part of this community. It's opportunities are unlimited.

Peanut Growers Ask Increase In Acreage

No Spanish Peanut Surplus In Nation

Representatives of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association will meet with officials of the U. S. Department of Agriculture Friday to seek an increase in 1958 peanut acreage. The increase will be requested only on the Spanish type peanut which is grown principally in Texas and Oklahoma.

The Association sold its' entire inventory of Spanish peanuts this year at better than 105 percent of the 1957 support price. Commercial processors generally could have sold to manufacturers greater quantities of Southwest Spanish peanuts if the supply had been sufficient, Ross Wilson, manager, declared. Under the present law an acreage increase may be granted "if the Secretary of Agriculture determines, on the basis of the average yield per acre of peanuts by types during the preceding five years, adjusted for trends in yields and abnormal conditions of production affecting yields in such five years, that the supply of any type of peanuts for any marketing year will be insufficient to meet (Continued on page Six.)"

Journalism Scholarship Deadline Set

Deadline for entries in the West Texas Press association's \$400 Journalism Scholarship Contest was announced as May 1 today by Ray B. Fox of Colorado City, contest committee chairman. The Eastland Telegram is one of the participating newspapers which annually award this scholarship. Winner will receive \$100 per year for each of his or her four years at any of 10 cooperating West Texas college and universities. Two previous winners are now studying college journalism or WTPA scholarships.

Rules for the journalism scholarship award have been forwarded to high school principals and newspaper editors and publishers throughout West Texas. Applicants must be in the top 25 per cent of their 1958 high school graduating class, demonstrate an interest in journalism and be interested in journalism as a career.

Easter Seals Mailed Out to More County Citizens Than Ever Before

Thousands of sheets of colorful Easter Seals cascaded into the mail this past week, getting the Eastland County 1958 appeal underway, Mrs. Marlene Johnson, chairman, announced today. Mrs. Johnson said that this year's mailing will reach even more homes than in 1957, seeking support for the continuation and expansion of the Easter Seal service for crippled children. Contributions were already being returned by Wednesday, and \$60 had been contributed by this morning. The early response to the drive, Mrs. Johnson said, "makes us believe that this year's drive will be a big success." The 1958 appeal, sponsored by three National Society for Crippled Children and adults and its 1655 Easter Seal affiliates in every state, will continue the drive.

Getting You to Eat Peanuts Is Growers' Problem

Eastland County has one of three associations in the nation which are authorized by the Government to carry out the peanut price support program, Ross Wilson, manager of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, with headquarters in Gorman, told Eastland Lions Tuesday.

Wilson pointed out in his talk before Lions, that the Association he directs serves peanut growers in 243 counties and five states west of the Mississippi. In all that represents 40,000 farmers, 13,000 of them active members of the Association.

In 1955, Wilson stated, which was the last "near normal peanut crop we had," the Association handled \$11 million for the U.S., all of which went to farmers. Wilson was introduced by J. M. Cooper, county agricultural agent, who was program chairman for the day. Two directors of the Association, E. A. Walker of DeLeon and D. B. Warren of Gorman, also attended the meeting.

The Association director pointed out that Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association has other duties besides carrying out the price support program. He said his Association also is in charge of the government's diversion program. The program is used to sell surplus peanuts for export and for crushing purposes. Wilson said that 95 percent of the nation's surplus in peanuts was caused by production in Georgia and Alabama.

He said his group also encourages research with peanuts in an effort to get a bigger market. Surveys show, he said, that every man, woman and child in the United States consumed an average of 6.5 pounds of peanuts last year. If that figure can be increased to 7.5 pounds "there will be no surplus," he emphasized.

Informing the Association's membership is another duty of the leaders. A monthly newsletter, a quarterly newspaper and growers' meetings help to do this. He frankly admitted that lobbying is another function of the Association, saying that he and other members of the Association spend much time in Washington in the interest of Southwestern peanut growers.

Mavs to Enter Glenrose Track Meet Saturday

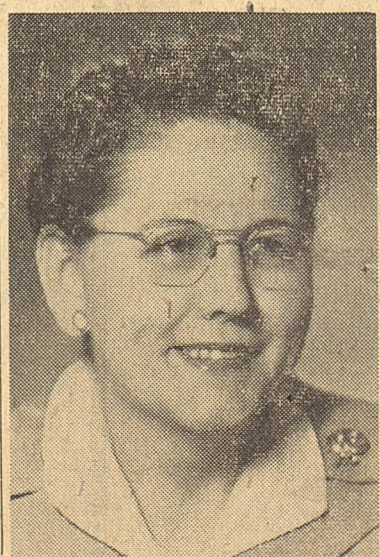

contracts in your daily living. When you drive into a filling station and say "Fill 'er up!" you've made an oral contract obliging you to pay for the gasoline the attendant puts in your tank. Every auction results in many oral contracts of sale. Millions of people are employed on oral contracts. The trouble with an oral contract is the difficulty of proving its terms if a dispute arises. The court will listen to your version of the contract and to the other fellow's version and then try to reach a decision. It is best then to put a contract in writing. But here is the danger

—be sure you put it all in writing. If the written contract does not contain all of the elements you believed to be in the agreement, the court will not even listen to your version of the agreement. Thus, half a written contract may be worse than none. For instance, you buy a stove which the salesman says you may return if you don't like it. You sign a conditional sales agreement that does not mention your right to return it. In fact, the fine print on the form says that you agree that no representations have been made about the stove except those written in the contract. If it

turns out you don't like the stove, you will have no right to return it, and you can be sued if you fail to pay for it. For your own protection, read your contracts before you sign and insist on writing in any promises the seller makes to you but does not put in the contract. 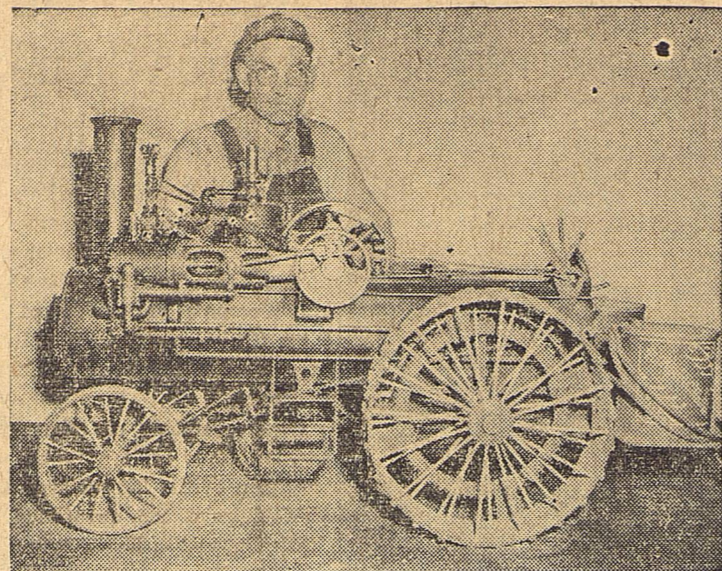
