MacMoy's Has New Barbecue Pit In Use

Smell that aroma? If you haven't, it can mean just one thing. You haven't been within three blocks of MacMoy's Clover Farm Store, in the last couple of days.

MacMoy's has just completed their new barbecue pit, and Bill Walters, meat market manager, is busy preparing his famous barbecue.

The new pit is something unusual. It is built of Haydite bricks which are full of sand and is lined with fire brick inside.

The pit is built on the back of the store and its door, which opens by weights, opens into the store itself. The door to the fire chamber opens outside, and once the big pit is heated it remains warm for a week.

Walters, one of the best known cooks with the long fork in the business, uses hickory and oak to slowly barbecue the meat. The fire and the heat are in two different chambers, assuring slow, even cooking.

Inside, MacMoy's has a newly built "bean cooker." It is the pits co-partner in the stores new catering business.

The pit was designed by a Fort Worth Engineer.

died this year in highway accidents, January through April of 1953 only 13 persons were killed. This is an increase of over 222 per cent. Highway Patrolmen of this district have investigated 349 accidents this year. This is 72 per cent more than the 203 reported by this time in 1953.

Total property damage has also increased, but not in proportion to the death and total accident rate. Property damage this year has been \$204,534.50 as compared to \$194,844 at this time last year.

Captain G. L. Morahan, officer in charge of the Abilene THP district, cites speeding and driving while drinking as primary causes of the accidents. He cites arrests made by the 20 patrolmen during April to support his contention. The patrolmen made 348 hazardous and 92 non-hazardous arrests last month. (Hazardous arrests are moving traffic violations.)

Speeding accounted for 218 of the 348 hazardous arrests, defective lights 28, running stop signs 22, and driving while intoxicated 17, he said.

In addition the patrolmen gave 1,114 warnings last month. Of that number, 375 were for speeding, 380 for defective lights, and 112 for stop sign violations.

The patrolmen also worked 87 accidents in the district last month. In four of these there were five fatalities, 41 persons were injured in 28 accidents and in the remaining 55 there was property damage.

An alarming figure, Captain Monahan said, is that of the 87 accidents only one car was involved in 34 of them.

In Eastland County no fatal accidents have occurred this year due to a car accident. Total amount of accidents during the month was 9 causing personal injuries to three and property damage in the amount of \$5,755.

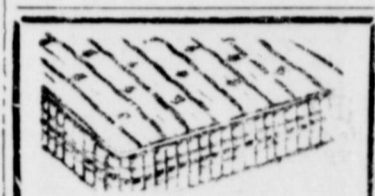

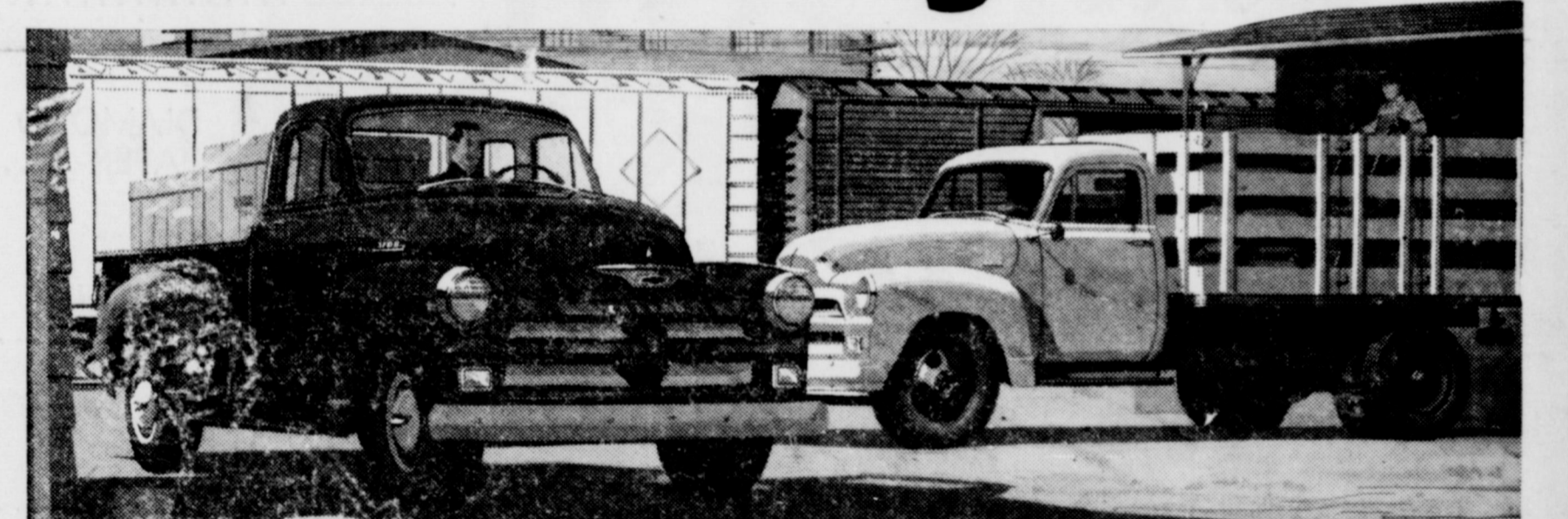

Monday night, April 26, Desdemona baseball team played Olden at Gorman. Olden won by 1 w o points.



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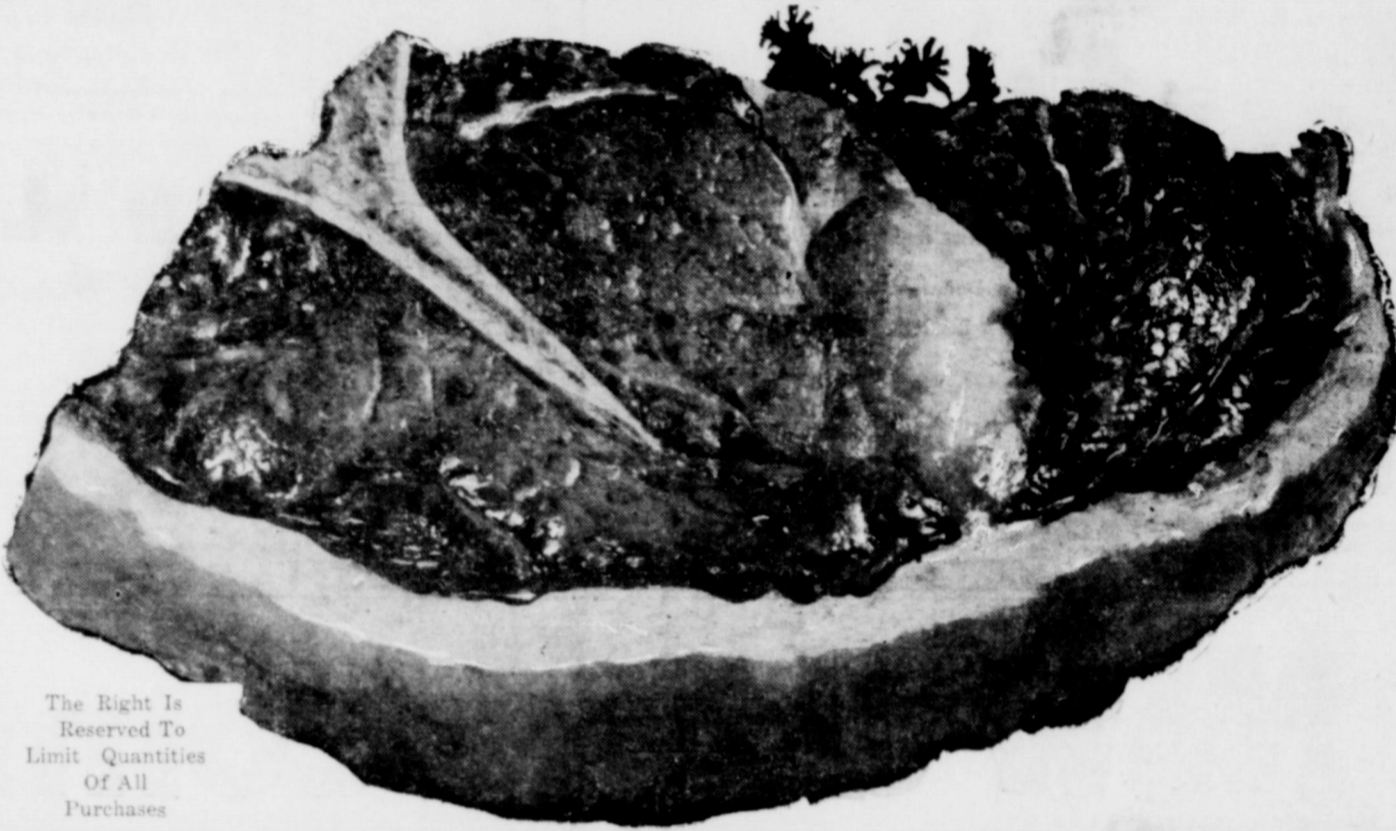
