

Scott's Secrets

This strawberry pie is as deli-cious as it is beautiful: Cook pie shell and cool. Soften one package cream cheese with enough

Cook one box strawberries, mashed, with one scant cup sugar and three tablespoons flour. Cook until thick. Cool.
