John Connally has been given the 'Old Rip'—a dead mummy in the highest honor bestowed on candidates by the Eastland County Democrats.

A local lovely, Carol MacMoy, high school senior, queen of just about everything that Eastland's ever held a contest for, gifted the Demo hopeful with the corpse, accompanied by suitable presentation remarks.

The gift of 'Old Rip' so overwhelmed John Connally in Eastland Friday that he almost became speechless.

It wasn't until after his train had left Eastland, that he realized the significance of the gift.

And when he did, he couldn't accept it.

"The Blarney Stone belongs in Ireland," he told reporters, "and Old Rip belongs in Eastland."

County newsmen aboard the train took the famous frog when they got off the train in Cisco, and it again rests in the Courthouse Lobby.

Chances are, he'll never forget the town that offered one of its most precious gifts.

And the legend of Old Rip roars along—even years after his death.

## 'Open House' Friday At District Office

How does the Texas Highway Department use tiny glass beads to make your driving safer? Why do highway engineers cut circular holes in brand-new highways?

These are only two of the many fascinating aspects of highway engineering and maintenance that local citizens may explore on Friday, May 25.

On that day the Highway Department will hold "Open House" at the District Office as part of National Highway Week (May 20-26), announced District Engineer E. M. Pritchard.

Any interested resident of the area may visit the Brownwood District office at 500 W. Commerce & District Warehouse & Shop on Cisco Highway (U.S. 183) during the hours 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and observe the daily functions of the public agency which is responsible for the care of a complex highway network of 2183 miles in this District.

District Engineer Pritchard said the Open House will show the public how the Highway Department operates on a normal working day.

"I would like to extend a most cordial invitation to the citizens of this area open house," he said. "Your neighbors who work for the Highway Department would like to show you through our facilities and demonstrate a few of the many tests and operations we conduct daily to care for the highways."

Visitors to the Open House will see examples of two-way radio communications; shops where new highway signs are made and old signs repaired; and the various machinery and laboratory testing apparatus used to determine the quality of new highways being constructed and to maintain existing roads in smooth riding condition.

WHEREAS, one of the best-known and well-regarded qualities of the State of Texas is its soundly built and carefully maintained highway system; and

WHEREAS, a consistent program of highway construction and modernization has in recent years brought about a reduction of more than 25 percent in the fatality rate on all Federal and State highway in Texas; but

WHEREAS, heavy increases in traffic endanger these advances in highway safety, since the state's population has increased by one-fourth since 1950, the state now has more than five million registered motor vehicles, and the miles traveled by these vehicles now totals 43 billion miles a year; and

WHEREAS, due to this flood of traffic some 22,000 miles of the state's 25,000-mile system of U. S. and State-numbered highways are already obsolete for the loads of traffic they carry;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, as the Nation at large observes National Highway Week during the period May 20-26, 1962, that the Texas Highway Department be commended for its achievements in building and maintaining today's fine highway system in the face of mounting traffic problems; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the citizens of Texas be urged to view with concern the adverse economic effects and the cost in human lives that will result if highway traffic overwhelms the capacity of our roads, and to support a sustained program of highway improvement and modernization to keep Texas growing.

THEREFORE, I do hereby designate the period May 20-26, 1962, as HIGHWAY WEEK and urge that special attention be directed to the needs of our highway system.

## County To Be 'Pilot Site' For Industry -- Connally

Eastland County will be the pilot site for an urban industrialization project if John Connally gets elected Governor.

That was his promise Friday as he whirl-winded through this county aboard his "Victory Special."

The three speaking stops in Ranger, Eastland and Cisco were the only three in one county on the Texarkana to El Paso 49-stop, vote-seeking trek.

Connally is campaigning for the Democratic nomination and is in the June 2nd run-off with Don Yarborough. Winner of the run-off will meet Republican Jack Cox in the November general election.

In return for his promise for industry, Connally was

gifted with an assortment of local items—including the county's revered relic, "Old Rip."

He began talking industry as soon as he entered the county.

Coming into Ranger accompanied by a group of Ranger backers who had gone to Gordon to board his special, he began his talk before about 300 spectators by recalling the Oil Boom days, and the present need for industry to keep the people "next to the soil."

In Ranger he complimented Ranger Junior College and the work it is doing and promised to encourage educational advantages.

He called the moral fiber in this part of the county the best

to be found anywhere, and emphasized that industries are needed to keep the strength of the people.

He was introduced in Ranger by Dr. Ted Nicksick, president of Ranger Junior College, and was presented a bouquet and gifts for his family by Mrs. Roscoe Hopper.

Dick Henderson, Dr. Nicksick, Mrs. Hopper and Sam Aills boarded the special train at Gordon.

Dwaine Dennis, editor of the Ranger Times, and H. V. O'Brien, editor of the Eastland Telegram, boarded the gubernatorial special in Ranger to accompany it through the county, de-training in Cisco, following his third speech.

The two interviewed Connally as the train sped toward Eastland.

## School Construction Will Be Discussed

A board meeting has been tentatively set for June 4th for the discussion of new elementary school construction in Eastland.

During a school board meeting Thursday night, which lasted until 1:30 a.m., trustees talked about construction.

A committee composed of W. L. Griffin, Dr. B. B. Alexander and J. T. Gregory will meet with Negro representatives to discuss the possibility

of retaining the Douglas School as a Community Center.

Members of the board accepted the tender of one bond which lowered the school debt to \$94,000. The board will advise for additional bonds to be tendered.

A meeting of the school tax board of equalization has been set for June 12 in the High School.

No new teachers were hired during the meeting to fill vacancies made by the resignations of Phil Hewett, Jimmy Hughes and Carroll Shelton.

The board is in the process of interviewing applicants for the positions of band directors and coaches.

The Eastland School System will be eligible for three new teachers in addition to the three replacements for the next fall term.

### \$4,060 in Consumer Goods Per Family in This County

Residents of Eastland County have been adding to their stock of worldly goods in recent years.  
The physical possessions that the average local family has accumulated - automobile, home freezer, refrigerator, washing machine and other consumer durable goods - represent an investment that has reached an all-time high.  
As local incomes grew larger over the years, people became able to acquire the luxuries and conveniences of modern living.  
Just how much money they put into the purchases of these items is another question. Few families can even guess at the cost.  
Some help in this direction, as it applies to the average household, is now available through figures in a national study released by the University of Michigan and through surveys by the National Bureau of Economic Research.  
The broad picture that they reveal is that families with higher earnings have proportionately more invested in durable goods. The amount so invested comes to somewhat more than their annual incomes.  
In Eastland County, with each increase in earnings, local families have acquired additional physical assets.  
On the basis of the figures given, the average family in the county now has an estimated \$4,060 in consumer durable goods.  
For the 7,130 local households, the grand total of these assets comes to \$28,959,000, figured at the purchase price.  
Throughout the United States as a whole, the gross amount invested in such items is of the order of \$385 billion, the reports show. About 40 percent of it, some \$145 billion, represents automobiles.  
However, if these possessions were to be offered for sale at the present time, they would yield less than half the amount that was paid for them. Normal wear and tear have reduced their value.  
Allowing for this depreciation, the finding is that the average American household would be able to realize about \$900 on its car and \$2,400 on its other durable goods.  
Much of this equipment, other than cars, was bought five to ten years ago and is in need of replacement, says the report. It foresees a rise in durable goods sales in the near future.

**Huge Sum Spent By Highway Agency On Litter Vandalism**

AUSTIN—Almost two million dollars—funds that could have built 72 miles of farm to market roads or 24 miles of two-lane primary highways had to be spent by the Texas Highway Department to remove litter from the highways and repair vandalism damage last year.

This is much like a man throwing trash in his own yard and then paying someone to pick it up, for Texas motorists are covering the bill with a trail of trash and then "footing the bill" to have it cleaned up. Last year the Highway Department had to spend \$1,344,000 to remove this unsightly and unsanitary mess from the roadsides.

In addition, sign vandalism accounted for another \$385,900.

Vandalism, according to the Highway Department classification, covers such items as

damaging and destroying sign and sign supports, marking on structures, and damaging rest areas (roadside parks). Litter includes beer cans, watermelon rinds, bottles, wrappers, newspapers, milk cartons, and cigarette packages.

The litter problem is more or less localized to certain sections of highways along the more heavily traveled routes and the urban areas. It is believed that people are more likely to throw trash from their cars when they travel the same route every day. Also, roads leading from "wet" counties to "dry" counties come under heavy bombing of cans and bottles.

At the present time, well-traveled federal and state highways are cleaned about three or four times a year, farm to market roads once a year, and freeways in the urban areas require much more mowing and cleaning.

Highway engineers are constantly seeking new methods or machines that will help to remove the mess from our highways, but so far the only satisfactory method has proved to be the man with the stick.

Many concerned citizens and highway engineers feel that an education program and strict law enforcement of the anti-litter law are necessary to stop the litterbug. Strick law enforcement helps to some extent, but it is almost impossible to stop littering by patrolling "heavy litter" areas. The trend, and some feel the only solution to the problem, is toward education of the public through mass media and through programs sponsored by the Texas Highway Department, civic clubs and other organizations.
