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Hassler's Car Found Abandoned In Big Spring

The search for Ben Alexander Hassler, Skellytown resident, formerly of Pampa, wanted for questioning in the murder and rape earlier this month of a Skellytown woman, has swung from Texas and Oklahoma to California, according to Carson County Sheriff John Nunn.

We hunted for him there and then early this week his mother got a call from him and he told her he was in Los Angeles, Nunn said.

When asked if Hassler, who is also wanted in Ochiltree County for rape and failure to live up to bond requirements, said he was returning to Skellytown, Nunn said, "I don't believe he said anything about it."

The sheriff also said, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has not been called into the case. "We are just using its laboratory to check some things out. There have been no federal laws broken that we know of," the sheriff said.

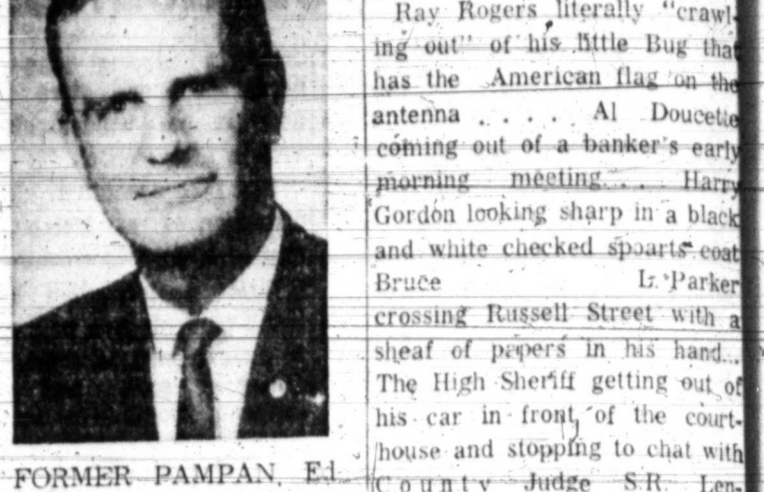

Criminal Lawyer To Defend Berets

SAIGON (UPI)—F. Lee Bailey, the lawyer who defended the Boston strangler and Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard, agreed Tuesday to represent one of the six U.S. Green Berets accused of murdering a suspected Vietnamese spy.

"I'll be more than happy to be in the case," Bailey said in a telephone call from his office in Boston to Saigon where he spoke with Capt. Thomas Young of Honolulu, the military lawyer for Capt. Robert F. Marasco, 27, of Bloomfield, N.J. "I'll be there as soon as possible."

Marasco is accused of murdering a conspiracy to murder along with Col. Robert R. Reault, 43, of Vineyard Haven, Mass., former Green Beret commander in Vietnam.

Maj. Thomas C. Middleton, 29, of Jefferson, S.C.; Capt. Eugene J. Williams, 27, of Athens, Ga.; Maj. David E. Crow, 33, of Cedar Rapids, Iowa; and Capt. Leonard J. Brumley, 26, of Duncan, Okla.

Bailey is the third prominent lawyer to join the case, a mysterious affair which has received wide publicity. The others are Edward Bennett Williams of Washington, D.C., who is defending Reault, and Henry B. Rothblatt, of New York City, who is defending Brumley.

Rothblatt said the defense would open its case by calling Gen. Creighton W. Abrams, the U.S. commander in South Vietnam, as its first witness.

Rothblatt accused the Army of tapping telephones and interfering with the mails in building its case. He did not elaborate, but sources close to the defense have said letters between attorneys have been intercepted and opened.

The six Green Beret officers Tuesday were handed the official charges against them, but U.S. military spokesmen said they would not be made public prior to their referral to the court-martial.

SMEAR CAMPAIGN

The new front suspension provides smooth friction-free action and improves turning stability. It also reduces effort with manual steering, makes for a quieter ride, and minimized nose-down tendency when braking, Pickett said.

With the new anti-theft system, ignition, steering wheel and transmission are locked simultaneously. A built-in safeguard warns the driver to remove the ignition key as he leaves the car. Opening the driver's door activates a buzzer when the key is left in the ignition.

A low fuel warning light which warns the driver when the gasoline level drops to about two gallons is standard on Ambassador SST models and is included in optional trim groups for all other models. A "rim-blow" sports steering wheel is

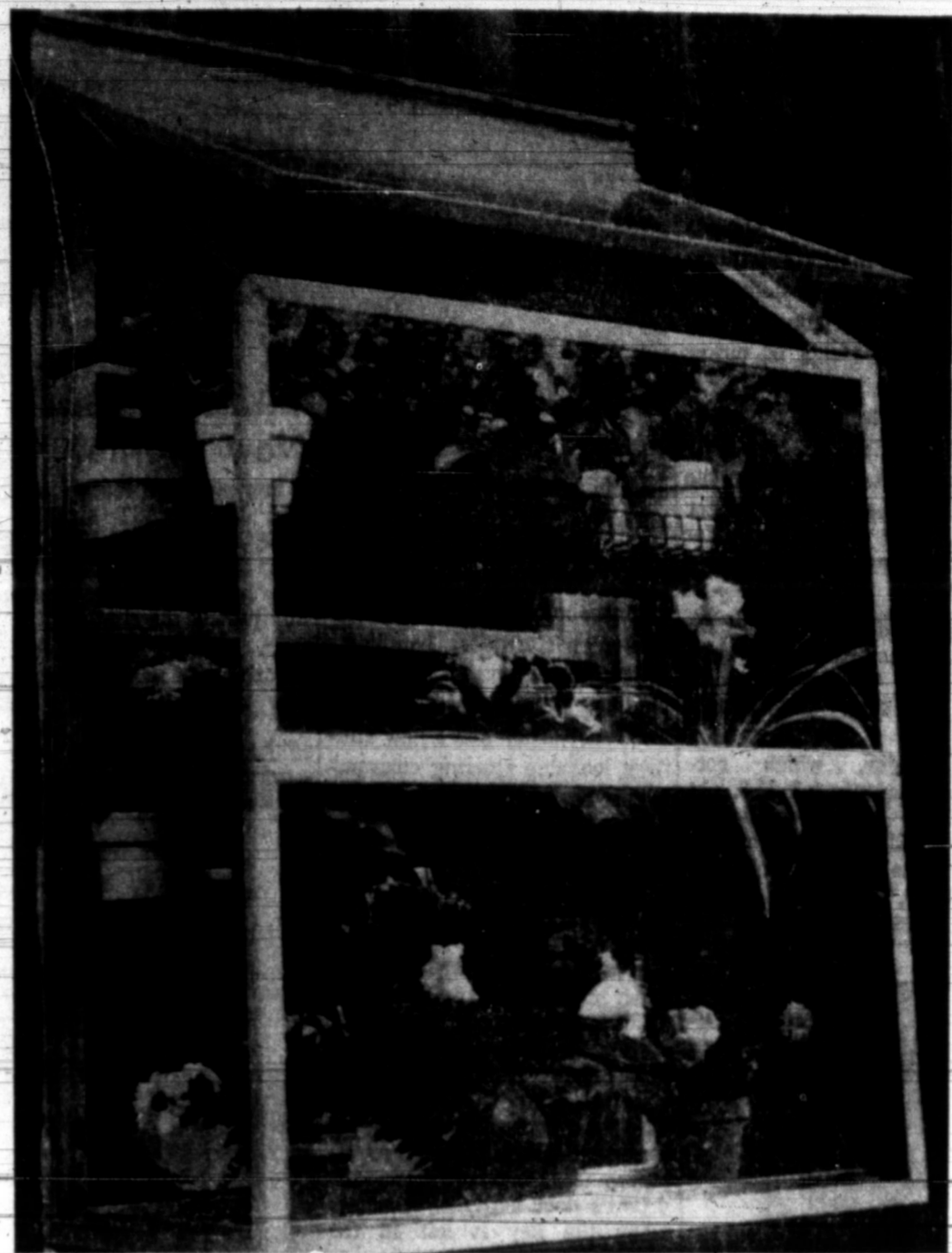

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A primary instrument of President Nixon's self-labeled "open administration" is the journalistic procedure known as back-grounds.

These semi-private sessions come in various sizes and packages. Essentially the technique is this: A department issues a written, public announcement. Then the cabinet officer or one of his deputies gathers reporters to explain the action on a background basis. Such explanations vary between hard sell and soft sell in most cases.

On occasion, the background officer may be identified and quoted directly. In other, more sensitive cases, he permits identification only as a department spokesman or "administration official" with no direct quotations allowed.

Deep Background

There also is the so-called deep background wherein a high government official distributes certain facts and expresses certain opinions—none of which may be attributed to him at all. That accounts for some news stories which establish what appears to be primary information, then say "it was learned today."

Backgrounds—some times are so deep that the information developed from them must be stated flatly on the reporters' own authority and nothing more.

An example is when President Nixon sends a message to Congress involving a major legislative recommendation. Messages of this caliber usually are accompanied by background sessions which may involve as many as half a dozen top ranking government officials. Usually they may be described by newsmen as White House officials. Sometimes they may be identified and quoted.

The rules change from session to session, however.

Nor is this a distinctively Nixon administration practice. It has been going on for years. What does seem to be new in this administration is the broad variety of backgrounds.

Underlying Reasons

Why are they held? The underlying reasons for the background technique is that the government may want to expand on the bare bones of an official pronouncement without having to make this expansion an entry in the official record.

A federal official may be much more candid under background conditions than if microphones and cameras were turned on and his every word was recorded.

This is one reason why some reporters dislike the background technique, but they do not advocate doing away with it.

Two of the best background officers in Washington are Dr. Henry Kissinger, assistant to the President for National Security Affairs, and Dr. Arthur E. Burns, counsel to the President and resident White House specialist in domestic matters.

Father Found Innocent Of Murdering Son's Fiancee

CHICAGO (UPI)—Businessman Samuel Saikin, found innocent of murdering the go-go dancer his son hoped to marry, was sentenced to from two to three years, in prison for plotting to hide her body.

A jury late Monday found Saikin innocent of the slaying of Ella Jean Scott, 18, but guilty of conspiring with his son to obstruct justice.

The son, Joel, 26, testified his father fell in love with Miss Scott and asked her to undergo brain surgery to wipe out the memory of Joel and of her soldier husband. The father killed her when she refused, the son said.

The elder Saikin insisted his son was the murderer.

In passing sentence, criminal court Judge Philip Romiti said, "this is a very grave and very serious offense which is borne out by the fact that the murder and murderer may have to go unpunished."

The two to three-year sentence was recommended by asst. state's atty. Matthew Moran; Saikin's lawyers said they would appeal and asked that Saikin be released on bond.

AGAINST PIPE DREAMS

WILLISTON, N.D. (UPI)—A department of the interior official said today oil import controls would be needed even if Alaska drilling produced a big strike. Dr. Wilson M. Laird, director of the department's office of oil and gas, told the North Dakota Oil and Gas Association that dropping the controls still would leave the United States "intolerably vulnerable to events in foreign producing countries."

Polish Press reports said Soviet and East German warships had arrived in this nation's ports to join military units from Poland and Czechoslovakia in the exercises.

The maneuvers are called "Oder-Neisse 69" after Poland's post-World War II frontier with East Germany, and the Oder and Neisse Rivers.

Garmon Gets Prison Term For Crimes

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI)—Delbert Harmon Garmon, 30, who terrorized persons in Texas and Oklahoma in 1965, was given seven 15-year prison sentences and one for 10 years.

Garmon pleaded guilty Monday to three armed robbery charges, a kidnaping count, theft of a car and assault with a dangerous weapon in Oklahoma County.

The sentences, which totaled 30 years, will be served when Garmon finishes serving a 16-year federal sentence for two kidnapings in connection with his crime spree through Oklahoma and Texas. He has served four years and would be eligible for parole to Oklahoma in November, his attorney said.

Breaks With Lawyers; Cohen To Defend Self

NEW YORK (UPI)—Attorney-financier Roy M. Cohn broke up with his lawyer today at Cohn's trial for bribery and conspiracy and said he would defend himself against charges that could send him to prison for 36 years.

It was a day of reverses for the cocky 41-year-old Cohn who became a national figure as chief counsel for the late Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy's Communist-hunting Senate subcommittee in the early 1950s.

Federal Judge Inzer B. Wyatt dismissed Cohn's motion that Wyatt disqualify himself and refused another motion for a two-day postponement.

Selection of a 12-man jury with five alternates got underway before noon in spite of repeated objections by the harassed Cohn.

Earlier, he had sought a two-week adjournment of the trial, claiming another attorney was ready to step in but needed the time to prepare the case.

Myron Green, one of two defense counsels, announced that he was excusing himself from the case because he and Cohn couldn't agree on how the defense should be conducted.

"It's his life," Green told Wyatt. "I ask the court's permission to be excused."

Wyatt then told Cohn he could be defended by the other counsel, Cohn's law partner, Thomas A. Bolan, could get a new lawyer, or could defend

himself. Cohn pointed out that Bolan was scheduled to testify as a defense witness, so could not take on the active defense.

"I will defend myself, your honor," Cohn said, after arguing that he would like to bring in attorney Joseph Brill but he would need the two week adjournment in this case.

"Mr. Brill can step in anytime," said Wyatt. "We will begin the jury selection today."

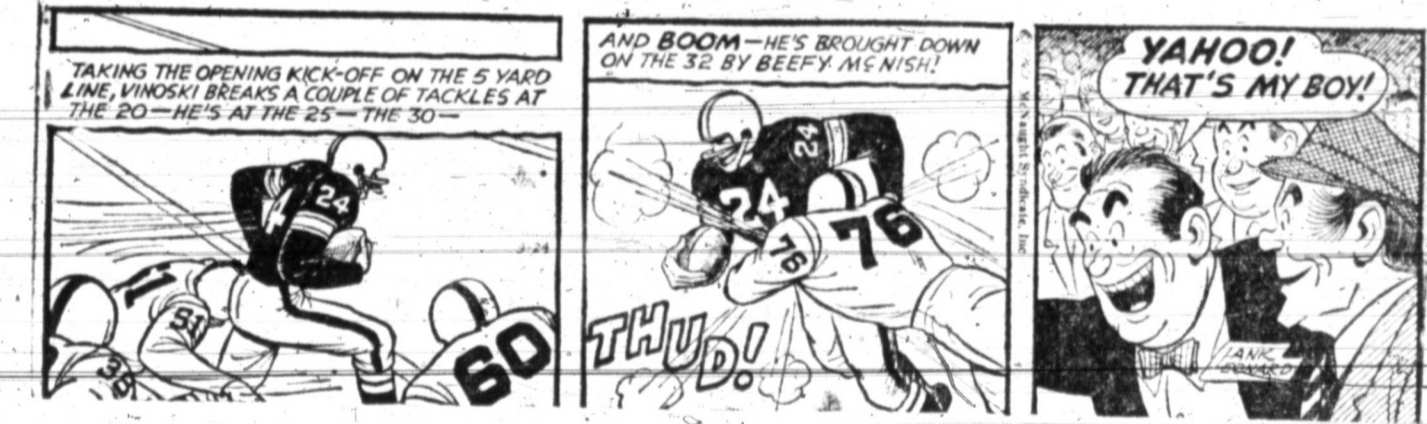

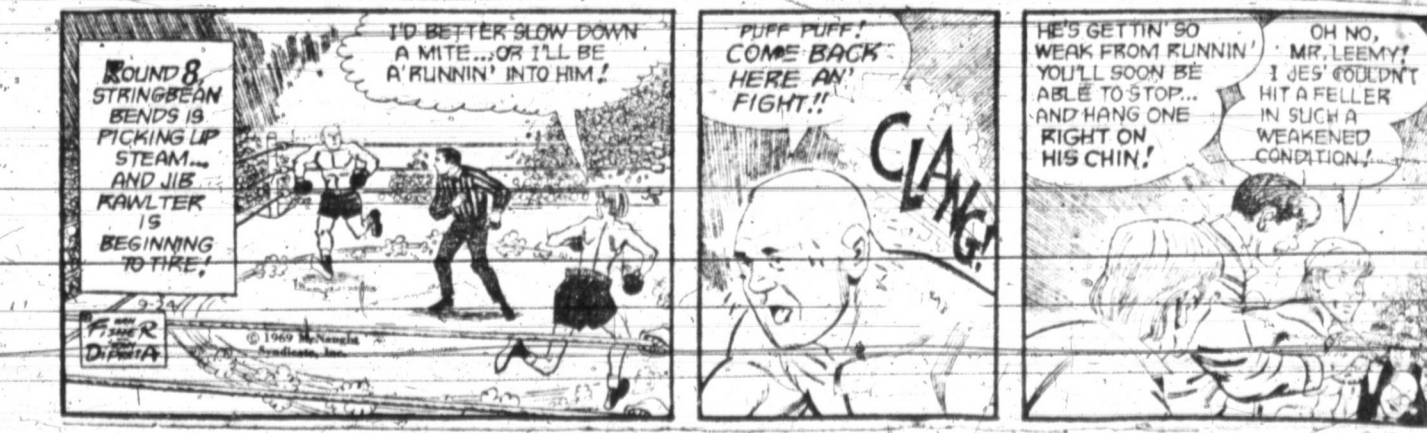
