#### Reinforcements **Parachuted** In To Dien Bien Phu

HANOL Indo-Chink, May 1-UP Fighter - bombers supplied by a United States virtually silenced Red anti-aircraft and artillery ring-ing Dien Bien Phu Saturday wiffe new reinforcements parachuted into the three - quarter - mile area into the three - quarter - mile area held by concentrated French forc-

French flyers in American - built Corsairs, B-26's, Hellcats and Bearats attacked the Red emplacements around the besieged bastion, allowing French paratroopers to drop, unworried by Communist fire, into the shrunken defenses of the fortress.

While every available combat plane was blasting the Red gun positions, C-119 transports, some flown by American civilian pilots, under contract to the French, oumped food and munitions into the French camp. On the ground the French pushed at patrols to feel out the Reds.

An official spokesman at French headquarters in Hanoi told a press onference that the 50-day-long Red nege at Dien Bien Phu created a serious, but not dramatic or desperate situation,

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The hike in public-liability and property-damage (PL&PD) insurance rates in Texas, necessitated inter large measure by the increase in traffic accidents, especially among persons under 25, poses this serious question:

What are we going to do about it

Police records of nearly all cities, Pampa included, show that teen-agers are involved in a majority of accidents on the highway. This sad fact is reflected in the order of the Texas Board of Insurance Commissioners raising the PL&PD rates on cars driven by persons 25 and under the maximum 20 per cent. The increase became effective Saturday.

The records clearly convict the youngsters of being responsible for most of the deaths and personal injuries suffered in automobile mishaps. It is not a pleasant fact to face but nevertheless one that must be considered and dealt with intelligently.

Foolhardiness among teen-agers is too often mistaken for derring-do. Courage is an admirable character quality but to take unnecessary chances on the highway is nothing short of sheer folly and shows a complete disregard of the possible consequences to others. In the past, youngsters have been pardoned for their wanton reckfessness because of their immaturity. But records indicate that maybe parents and the courts have been a little too lenient with them.

The problem is not new and did not develop overnight. But it is getting worse from day to day and has reached a point that demands action. Wholesale violations of traffic laws by some kids are evident most any day on Mary Ellen, Charles, Hobart, Duncan, Francis and mony other Pampa streets.

Police and parents have been seeking the answer to the problem everysince kids began driving the family jalapy. Kids being kids - unpredictable and looking for someplace to go in a hurry - the problem will probably remain unsolved until their nature is changed.

However, this fact does not relieve the community of the responsibility for the deplorable condition. It figures then that something must be done. Driving instructions the teen-agers obtain in the national JayCee Road-e-o seem to be a step in the right direction. Many police officials are of the opinion drivers' licenses of teen-aged offenders should be suspended or revoked more frequently. A few coldly realistic parents have refused to permit their kids to use the family car.

Nobady seems to know where the closest approach to the answer lies. Maybe, since kids are such strong personalities, a little of this and a little of that would work in individual cases. Certainly some sort of punative action should be taken with offenders if the growing number of accidents caused by teen-agers is to be halted.

# And Atoms

Announcements concerning the construction of atomic power plants and the launching of the Navy's new submarine Nautilus are dramatic evidence that atomic power is here to stay.

A lot of people, including many experts both in and out of the industry, have spent considerable time finding out just what this is going to mean to the oil business. The results of all their study add up to just one thing. If you have any sound oil stock, hang on to it. It's going to be an extremely good bet for a long time to come.

Atomic scientists Harold C. Urey estimates that with-In the next 25 years atomic energy will be used to an important extent in the fueling of central power stations and possibly ships. Indications are that the oil industry may actually welcome a lessening in demand for the low grade fuels now used for those purposes. To meet the needs of future years, a much greater percentage of each barrel of crude oil will have to be utilized for the production of higher grade fuel such as gasoline. For example, it has been reliably estimated that domestic gasoline demand in 1967 will be 46 per cent greater than it was in 1951.

Though it has already developed hundreds of products ranging all the way from the miracle fabric Dacron to floor wax, the petrochemical industry has barely scratched the surface.

Atomic energy then, though it may change the pattern of demand, is not likely to alleviate our heavy dependence on oil and its products. Judging by past per-formance the industry will more than be able to meet every demand of the American people, but it all depends on one thing. As a spokesmon for the industry put it, "All long range speculation about the future of the oil industry must necessarily presume that oil companies will remain free to compete, for competition is the secret of progress."



In a recent address, Herbert Hoover found no reason to fear or anticipate another major depression. He described the destructive economic forces and weakness that resulted in the collapse of the 30's, and said there is no parallel condition now.

Then he made this important statement: "I believe that due to scientific discovery, invention and improvement of production methods, our present industrial plants can support the present standard of living of our peaple and, beyond that, can produce some surpluses. It is these surpluses, plus some dehydrated optimism, that are worrying the situation today.
