

Gloom Salesmen

"Depression is becoming the most widely advertised product of 1954," Merle Thorpe, author, editor and director of Business Development of Cities Service, told a group of oil men the other day in an address entitled, "How to Promote a Depression."

Americans, he said, believe in making things bigger and better, so "if we really want a depression, and it seems that we do, let's make it the biggest and best one of all times. Let's work out a definite program, organize and speed up the day of disaster."

We have at hand, said Mr. Thorpe, five factors, "all tried out successfully in the promotion of the depressions of 1857, '73, '93, 1907 and the 'thirties,' and he thinks that with today's improved communications they should work even better. They are:

1. Politics. The "outs" pick on the "ins," charging the administration with hard-times-ahead and doing nothing about it. The "ins" think up defenses. They know all about it, they say. They have a "plan" to meet every contingency.

2. Statistics. These may be used for any purpose, and "no one questions a statistic." For instance, we report those out of work, instead of those on the job, and include school-boys above 14 and our habitual non-workers. The Census Burea, Mr. Thorpe pointed out, has assisted the campaign, adding 728,000 to the jobless figure simply by a new method of counting!

3. Bad news. The public loves to hear it. This year, as in 1930, said the speaker, "we will have more idle tongues than idle hands."

4. Plans. "The more cock-eyed the 'plan' the more useful." These constituted "perpetual emotion" in the 5. A whipping-boy. "The universal desire of human

beings, even as you and I, to find a scape-goat to blame for their own faults.

But in spite of all this effective aid, Mr. Thorpe feels, "It will not be an easy job to promote another depression." He even suggests that "People may be smarter than they were in the 'thirties. They may not look for a scape-goat but understand that a blessed change-over from war to peace brings with it temporary changes in business relationships.

It will be difficult, he warns us, to expand unemployment in a country that is "working feverishly to get byproducts from the split atom, and power from the sun, purified water from the sea, synthetic fibers, substitutes milk; lighter, cheaper and longer-lasting but materials," a country that has derived 11,000 products from a "drop of crude oil," and 1100 from a lump of coal: that has yet to investigate 50,000 more fungi that may contain secrets as vital as penicillin.

Mr. Thorpe sees as the greatest resistance of all "the old-time American spirit reasserting itself."

Anyone familiar with the factics of some of the construction and common labor unions will have no doubts but that there is considerable truth in the reports. It is the top leaders of the unions involved who are

demanding a consultive voice in the negotiation of bracero agreements. They have no right to a part in this and until they clean out the rackets in their own house involving wetbacks their demands are brazen effrontery.








