
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Aerial View of Celanese Corporation of America, Pampa, Texas, Plant

Russian Goats

What goes on in the mind of a native-born American Communist? What is responsible for the direction his "oking takes?


Those and kindred questions have been the subject of endless discussion. A significant contribution to that discussion has been made by Judge Frank Picard, of the U. S. District Court, Detroit. The occasion was his sentencing of six Michigon Communist leaders who had been convicted of conspiracy against the government.

The Judge began by saying that it was not his desire to kick a man when i e is down, "and you people ore down." But he want on, "You have been convict-ed of one of the gravest orfenses of which a citizen may be guilty - a plot - a conspiracy - to overthrow your government by force and violence . . . That's akin to treason."

The Communists before the bench, he pointed out, were neither stupid nor ignorant. They had demonstrated high abilities in various directions. In his opinion, they were sincere believers in Communism, and in the idea that it is the only way to better the lot of the masses of the people. Then he said: "The only trouble with you is that in addition to your own extremely liberal ideas that put every capitalist in the role of a villain, you have been altac.ed by a virus known as 'Russianitis' and you really are gullible enough to think that if ou could get control - with the help of Russia - of is country you would be able to shrug off Russia and then enjoy the millennium . . . Either that or you be-fieve you would be big shots in this country . . .

At this point Judge Picard dealt, and highly effectiveby with the old claim that Russia has no control whatsolaver over the American Communist party and that it is an indigenous organization free of any alien influence. a discussed, in capil, the about-face the American Com-Aunists took when the Nazi-Soviet non-aggression pact allopeed and Germany and Russia went to war. Prior to that time, American Communism had urged a strictly solctionist stand for this country. Thereafter, no group was more eager for our participation in the conflict. He cited other examples, and said, "The only time you have been with the United States was when Russia and the United States happended to be fighting on the same side . . . Your admiration for Russia is so great that there, isn't any doubt . . . that there is nothing you wouldn't do - lie, cheat, or even worse - in order to obtain your objectives.

Shortly thereafter, the Judge made this extremely important statement - and what makes it extremely important is that the Communists always cry that they are being persecuted, Hitler-fashion, for their honest-Picard told them: rictions. Judge You really think you are martyrs. But you're not going to jail for your belief. Nor for any books. You can read them all. You're going to jail because you want to force those beliefs on officers by force and violance. So you're not martyrs --you're goals - and Russian goals at that." Finally, the defendants were sentanced to prison terms ministing from four to five years and to fines of \$10,000 mach, the maximum allowed by the statute.



Private Spending


Business activity has dropped somewhat from the extremely high levels of recent years.

One way to stimulate industry lies in reducing the taxes individuals pay, and thus leaving them more money to buy the products that keep our farms and factories going. A second, and equally important but often overlooked

way, lies in measures and reforms that will encourage men to take risks, and invest their money in job-making productive enterprise.

As an example, two kinds of taxes, both manifestly sinfair in character, are serious barriers to incentive. One is the capital gains tax. The other is the double taxation of corporation dividends. And this last, as one authority has pointed out, "strikes directly at the corporate form of business ownership, the one form of ownership offering the greatest opportunity for small sovers to share in America's growth.

It is argued that the government needs the revenues these taxes provide. But it can also be argued, and past experience supports it, that any losses would soon be made up by increases in normal tax revenues resulting from increased business activity. And certainly, at a fime wash government spending is being cut, we should take every logical step to spur private spending and in-
