
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

Air Force is studying the possible use of the "son le boom" as a new tactical weapon. The sonic boom is that man-made thunderclap that's one of the phenomena of our faster-than-sound air age. es from shock waves produced when an airplane flies through and beyond the some barrier. Its crash and concussion over cities have frightened people and broken windows. Suggesting the use of the boom as a tactical weapon, Raymond H. Rice, chief engineer for North American Aviation Co., says: "Shock waves of 50 pounds per square foot could be produced from low-flying supersonic aircraft. This pressure corresponds to a hurricane of 140 miles an hour velocity. Light res might prove to be extremely vulnerable to this force. Radar detection of low-flying supersonic alreraft is difficult, so there would be no warning. The effects of panle from such a sound attack are enormous. The sketches below, prepared by North American, show how the hoom is produced by a supersonic plane going into a dive .-- PETER EDSON.



An airplane (upper left corner) flying at sonic speed causes shock waves in the air. There are an arpiane (upper let corner, fring at some speed in a signal of the airplane; others spring from the wing and several. The first one is the bow wave, ahead of the airplane; others spring from the wing and tail. Upon reaching supersonio speed in a dive from high altitude (right photo) a trailing wave is formed and the shock waves are directed toward the ground. Because the waves "bend" upward under normal atmospheric conditions, they actually will strike the ground at a point beyond the point of the airplane. The ground targets (lower right-hand corner) indicate the claning point (left) and the point the sound soundly hits (right).









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## Danger At Hand

A few weeks ago we pointed out in this space that a Communist foothold in Guatemala was in the making and that such a development would place the entire hemisphere directly under the threat of Red bombing planes.

We did not at that time have any information to indicate that the threat was so immediate as news reports of the past few days have shown.

Delivery of a huge shipment of arms, including, according to reports from Mexico, "six or eight jet aircraft, possibly MIG-15s" from behind the iron curtain is cause for grave concern.

An immediate re-appraisal of the international situation is of the utmost urgency. It has long been obvious that the Kremlin has been seeking Latin American footholds in its deliberate march for world domination and that any direct attack on the United States, other than by mere bombing attacks over the North Pole, would have to be made over one of two routes

One of these would have to be by way of Alaska, a very difficult but not impossible route because of the rugged nature of the terrain. The other would be from the south, through Mexico. That, too, would be difficult, even though Mexico had first been completely subjugated.

The idea of armies swarming up from Guatemala is as yet too fantastic for consideration. The Reds do not operate that way. Any invasion army from the south would be made up of Latin American dupes of the Communists. Such a development, is not at all likely in the forseeable future.

But a heavily armed base in Guatemala, manned by Russian-trained and Russian-led Guatemalans, would be able to cut the Panama canal at will and it would immobilize a large part of the United States Army and Air Force at the canal and on the Mexican border while hordes of Asiatics could swarm across the Bering Strait into Alaska.

No one with any knowledge of sound military strategy has ever believed that atomic attack on the United States would ever be made except as a part of an allout invasion.

The open move into Guatemala is an indication that a military move against us by the Kremlin may be nearer than anyone has dared imagine.



Foreign Operations Director Harold Stassen has skirted the question of U.S. trade with Russia and its satellite areas in his appearances before congressional committees but reports from Washington indicate there is greater administration sentiment for such trade even if only on a limited basis, than the political powers will dare openly admit.

Four of the cabinet members - Dulles, Weeks, Benson and Humphrey — are understood to favor some such trade expansion, provided that key strategic materials are barred.

Such views are not very palatable to some important congressional committees including Appropriations, Commerce and Agriculture where the reasonable view is taken that anything we ship to Russia, even soft goods, contributes to the Red economy.

Indications are that trade may be used as barter for good behaviours on the part of Molotov and Chou En-lai. If the Reds prove tractable on a settlement of Asiatic issues, there may be heavy pressure for weakening the boycott on trade with the Communists despite the fact that such deals have all the trappings of doing business with a gang of highwaymen.


