STANFORD, Calif. (AP) --- Who's sane? Who's insane?

The psychiatrists and staffs of mental hospitals cannot be trusted to tell the difference, declares Prof. David L. Rosenhan, a Stanford University psychologist. Rosenhan says he and seven other sane investigators arranged as a test to be admitted as schizophrenic patients in 12 different mental hospitals, yet none of the eight was found to be sane by hospital professionals.

But Rosenhan says it was "quite common" for actual psychiatric patients to correctly identify the "pseudopatient" imposters.

"The fact that patients often recognized normality when staff did not raised important questions," Rosenhan observes. Rosenhan reports on the findings of the study in an article in the Jan. 19 issue of

Science magazine. Rosenhan said he and his seven

colleagues eventually were released as "schozphrenics in remission," despite.

their best efforts to convince the hospital staff of their sanity.

We now know that we cannot distinguish insanity from sanity," Rosenhan declared.

We continue to label patients schizoprehnic', manicdepressive', and 'insane' as if in those words we had captured the essence of understanding." he wrote.

"The facts of the matter are that we have known for a long time that our diagnoses often are not useful or reliable, but we have nevertheless continued to use

Rosenhan, who also teaches law at Stanford, said he and the other pseudopatients were shocked and horrified by their experiences.

But, he said, they did not blame the hospital staffs.

By and large, they were well-intentioned people, and in no way do we want to malign them," he said.

'The hospital itself imposes a special environment in which the meanings of behavior can easily be misunderstood." Rosenhan said the pseudopatient group

How many times have you bought a carton of soured milk? A loaf of stale bread? Or wondered just how fresh those fresh/eggs were?

Well, there is a way to determine the freshness of the food you buy. It's usually called "open dating."

Look for open dating. Many food products on your grocer's shelves have coded date information about their freshness stamped on the container, but deciphering this, information can prove next to impossible. Fortunately for consumers, many chain food stores and/or food processors are now labeling. their perishable commodities with "open dating"-actual dates, not coded messages, that can be understood by shoppers.

Open dating can help you to shop harder by telling you how fresh a product is. Freshness is your assurance that the product is of the same quality when you are ready to buy it as it was when it was processed or packaged.

Bacteriological changes though; are common to all food products. These alteraor the deterioration of tions quality that comes with age--cause minor flavor change. Or a considerable loss of vitamin content. Or even spoilage.

Age is not the sole cause of these food changes. Other factors are proper temperature controls, handling procedures in warehouses and in the stores and what you do when you get the product

While open dating is a good shopping tool, it is imrstand that a

variety of systems are used by different neighborhood stores or food processors to convey freshness information. Does the date printed on the package refer to the pack date-the date of processing? Or is it the pull datethe last date a product can be offered for sale?

Is it maybe the final date the product will have the same quality as the day it left the plant? Or the expiration datethe last time the product can

be used. Obviously, to get the most from open dating, consumers need to know which system of dating is being used for a given product. If your store is still play-

# For All Yogurt Fans: Their Own Cookbook

Why do so many people eat yogurt today? That's a modern question that needs an up-to-date answer.

Yogurt has been around a long, long time. In fact, for centuries. Eastern peoples seem always to have lived on it. Scads of Americans, however, have discovered this custard-like cultured milk item only within the last few p years.

Statistics reveal that around 22 per cent of North Americans eat it. It is most popular in the west, then on the eastern seaboard. Southerners apparently have other foods they prefer.

Why do people eat it? Be-cause they like it. That is the outstanding reason given. There are those, of course, who want to lose weight. A cup of plain yogurt made from partially skimmed milk, has 125 calories. Made of whole milk, it has 150 calories. Flavored yogurts have more calories.

It contains protein, fat, carbohydrate, calcium, iron, vitamin A; thiamine, riboflavin, niacin and ascorbic acid. And it is not fattening unless it tops off a too-high daily caloric intake.

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Which may explain why girls and women from 17 years up are the greatest users. Men like it, too, but not quite so enthusiastically. Last year over 100,000 tons of yogurt were sold in the United States. So lets call it a booming year for the lactic stuff.

Most people use it as a complete luncheon, for between meal snacking and as dessert. The most popular flavor is strawberry, then blueberry and raspberry. Plain yogurt follows next.


Its smooth and slightly acid way adds subtlety to many cooked dishes. Southern fried chicken in yogurt gravy is one rich suggestion. It comes from "Yogurt Cookery, Good and Gour-met" by Kay Shaw Nelson. She believes it's the first vogurt cookbook. If you are a yogurt fan, then study her more than 250 recipes.

"I avoid," she says, "the stories about the wonders of yogurt-that it can restore virility, prolong life, cure insomnia, improve the complexion, relieve sunburn, alcers and stomach aches and serve as an antidote for food poisoning and excessive drinking. But I do know that the piquant taste of yogurt will be an addition to appetizers, entrees, soups and desserts," she says.

"It is, of course, excellent for digestion and definitely improves the condition of the intestinal tract. It is given to the elderly, too. But the rea-son for its growing popularity is simply that people like That's the answer most it. people give. So when people like a food-just like it-you can be sure its popularity will grow. That's why I think my book "Yogurt Cookery" will be welcome.





# Liberalized Child Care and **Dependent Deductions**

### By RAY DE CRANE (Ninth in a Series.)

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Among the many changes affecting the 1972 income tax return, nowhere was Congress more generous than in the greatly liberalized provision for deductions for child care and dependent care

Those who will be chiefly helped by these changes are widowers and working widows with small children, a working wife who must hire a babysitter to look after young children while the mother works and unmarried sons or daughters who hire a nursemaid to look after an incapacitated parent.

Taxpayers with an adjusted gross income of \$18,000 or less may be eligible for a deduction of up to \$400 a month.

Where total income is beyond the \$18,000 figure, the deduction is reduced 50 cents for each dollar beyond \$18,000.

Married taxpayers can. claim the deduction only when they file a joint return. To be eligible for the deduction, you as the taxpayer must provide more than one-half of the cost of operating a home which includes a dependent child under the age of 15, a disabled dependent of any age, or a wife or husband who is unable to care for himself because of either a physical or mental condition.

The allowable deduction consists of such household expenses as the employment of a maid, housekeeper, cook or babysitter who takes care of a child, disabled dependent, or a handicapped wife or husband to permit the taxpayer to work and earn a living. They also include expenses outside the home for

the care of a child or children under the age of 15. Typical of such outside



**For Parents** 

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - A suit has challenged a 1972 California law that gives tax credits to the parents of pupils in private schools on grounds it would unfairly benefit religious-related schools. particularly Roman Catholic schools

The suit filed Tuesday in U.S. District Court asked that the law, which provides personal income tax credits up to \$125, be declared unconstitutional and enforcement halted. The law was to begin after Dec. 31. 1972.

The suit contends the tax credits will benefit schools controlled by churches or religious groups that "teach, propagate or promote a particular reli-

gious faith. The complaint notes that 409. 421 children were enrolled in nonpublic California schools as of Oct. 1, 1971, and 351,425 of these attended religious-related institutions. Ninety per cent attended Catholic schools, it said. The state Franchise Tax Board which collects taxes was named defendant

Lawyer Henry Clausen of San Francisco said the plaintiffs expect to go to court today to seek a temporary restraining order to prevent state acceptance of income tax returns listing private school credits.

PITTSBURGH, Pa. -NEA) - He came into the National Football League with a ready-made reputation. He was Mean Joe Greene, the smiling terror from Temple, Tex. And right from the start it was apparent he would be one of the great ones.

Now, having completed his fourth regular season as a defensive tackle for the Pittsburgh Steelers, Joe Greene stands at the pinnacle. He has been voted the George Halas Trophy as the outstanding defensive player in professional football.

It wasn't even close. The two men tied for the runnerup spot, linebacker Chris Hanburger of the Washington Redskins and linebacker Dave Wilcox of the San Francisco 49ers, each received one-fourth of the support given Greene.

The balloting was conducted by Newspaper Enterprise Association among the team captains and player representatives of the 26 NFL teams, in cooperation with the NFL Players Association

The honor, inaugurated by NEA in 1966 to recognize the growing role of defense in pro ball, has gone to such modern greats as Larry Wilson, Deacon Jones, Dick Butkus and Carl Eller.

Greene is a logical hearer of the defensive tradition. The Steelers his year moved to their first division championship in history because of a development which began with the drafting of Mean Joe as their No. 1 choice in 1969. He was the anchor of the building pro-gram by coach Chuck Noll, who arrived the same year. Led by his charge at the defensive left tackle, the Steelers have come up with a ferocious pass rush which led the American Football Conference in sacking the quarterback this season and also cut off the opposition from scoring touchdowns in seven of the 14 games on the

regular season schedule. Mean Joe is a 6-4,- 270pound specimen with great agility and speed. He was a unanimous All-American at North Texas State, where he picked up his nickname. Actually, Joe claims it belonged

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

# **IRS Hits Tax 'Pros**

A severe shaking out is in prospect for professional tax preparers, who have sprung up like Topsies in recent years thanks to the ever-simplified but always labyrithine Form 1040, according to Don Oakley of Newspaper Enterprise Assn.

Last year, according to the Internal Revenue Service, more than half the 80 million returns filed by American taxpayers were prepared by someone other than the taxpayer-to the tune of \$640 million since fees paid to tax preparers are deductible. Neither was it entirely on the up and up. In a spot check of returns

prepared by some 3.200 private firms during 1972, every other return was unacceptable, says the IRS, either because of careless or inaccurate work or actual cheating.

Thus it has declared a kind of war on the private tax services by, among a number of things, bringing back short Form 1040A and by announcing that IRS offices will provide complete. free tax preparation service for any taxpayer who wishes it.

Because the standard deduction has been raised from 10 per cent to 15 per cent and the income ceiling abolishedfor eligibility to use 1040A, it is estimated that 32 million taxpayers will elect to file the short form in 1973.

**Inside Washington** Any Day Now, a Chinese ICBM --2 Years Ahead of Schedule By ROBERTS. ALLEN WASHINGTON - It will happen any day now--Red China joining the United States and Russia in possessing the cataclysmic nuclear-armed

intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) The Communist Chinese are all set to test an ICBM -- with a range of between 2,500 and 5,000

miles. The fateful firing is expected momentarily. They already have nuclear warheads for this lethal global weapon.

These thermonuclear warheads were perfected in a series of tests over a period of several years. The latest was last March

In testing an ACBM, the Chinese are not embarking on long-range missile weaponry from scratch. The ICBM test is one more step in their relentless and astonishingly rapid drive to become a military super power.

They already have nuclear-armed intermediate ballistic milliles (IRBM)--with a range of around 800 miles. Around 20 IRBM are known to be deployed in Shensi province.

from which they could decimate targets in Russia's Pacific maritime provinces, Japan, South Korea and Taiwan U.S. experts anticipated Red China would have an ICBM by 1975. This estimate is being

sharply revised. It is now calculated Peking will have a number of operational ICBMs by then. Undoubtedly. these long-range nuclear weapons

will not be as advanced and powerful as the current generation of U.S. and Soviet missiles. But they will exist and presumably be ready for instant catastrophic employment-either offensively or defensively.

Pace Setter That's more than France has so far

It is still in the process of perfecting an ICBM. Preparations for a trial firing are now underway in the South Pacific ... with the date still indefinite.

Starting years after the French, the Chinese have consistently outpaced them in nuclear weaponry development. The Chinese produced a thermonuclear bomb and warhead several

years before the French. The French tests in the South Pacific last fall involved warheads of a magnitude and type the Chinese detonated

Behind it is a looming and dire threat -- the ever-present dread of a decimating Russian preemptive strike at China's nuclear centers and strategic strongholds

In effect, the two Communist giants are at war ideologically

and militarily. Both have huge air and ground forces on their common borders. In recent years, there have been a number of bloody clashes. Last October. Intelligence authorities estimated Russian strength in this region at around 50 divisions, 10 of them armored. and more than1.000 combat

Chinese strength was put at about half of that.

Stark Facts

The centuries-old Sino-Russian enmity is forcefully underscored in an unnoticed report published by Sen. Henry Jackson, D-Wash., chairman of the subcommittee on National Security in-International Operations.

A ranking member of the powerful Armed Services Committee, Jackson graphically cites the venomous strife just short of war raging between the Soviet and Red China. While the two Communist powers are ferociously attributing the basest motives and most heinous crimes to each other. Jackson stresses both are unsparingly castigating the US

To the Russians, the U.S. is the "imperialistic lackey" and willing accomplice of heretical China; to the latter, the U.S. is the "war-mongering stooge" and 'colonialist ally' of the renegade Soviet Union

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### Says Jackson:

'Peking has been delivering a simple message: That Russia has replaced the United States not only as China's main enemy, but as the principal threat to the security and independence of the smaller nations of the world. The Chinese 'line' on foreign affairs has shifted so dramatically that the utterances of today are omens which must be read with the greatest caution

Addendum: In the past year China has immensely expanded its international communications facilities-largely with the assistance of American technology and equipment. DISARMING OUR COUNTRY Disarmament negotiations are currently underway in Geneva, Switzerland, between the United States and the Soviet Union. These SALT II talks are a real threat to the security of our country, especially in view of the unwise concessions our government has already made

in the SALT I treaties. **Recently Senator Henry** Jackson of Washington warned of the dangers of SALT II. He states that "the first task of SALT II must be to design a posture that takes account of

the large Soviet strategic reserve force and impose limits that would reduce that reserve.

Senator Jackson pointed out that unsound negotiating policies left the U.S. at a real disadvantage in the SALT 1 talks. U.S. negotiators originally held that we must have the right to substitute sea-based for land-based intercontinental missiles and that a low ceiling must be imposed on the number of Soviet launchers. But in the eagerness to obtain a treaty, both of these provisions were dropped, without correspondence concessions on the part of the Soviet Union. As a result, the Soviets now have a 50 per cent advantage in intercontinental

ballistic missiles and submarine launched ballistic missiles. Senator Jackson urged that the SALT II negotiators should ensure that "in any future treaty the United States would not be limited to levels of intercontinental strategic forces inferior to the levels

granted to the Soviet Union." This is the very minimum that our negotiators should insist upon. For the sake of the security of the United States, the administration should refuse to compromise on this vital issue

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Dear Dr. Lamb-Is it normal to run a temperature every day? During the night it goes down to normal, but during the afternoon it usually goes from 99 to 99.4.

Dear Reader - It can be normal. Some people have a variation in their body temperature over the 24-hour period of as much as two degrees without having any evidence of disease. The temperature is usually lowest in the early morning hours and increases during the late afternoon and evening hours, in normal peo The commonly quoted 98.6 degrees body temperature is merely an average.
