WASHINGTON -UP- President Eisenhower sent his semi - annual report on the mutual security program to congress Monday and reported that the United States has shifted the bulk of its economic aid to Asia.

He pointed out that the under-developed counties of Asia hold the bulk of the world's population, occupy the largest land area, con-tain major sources of key raw ma-terials and minerals and many of the most valuable military bases.

Because of this the United States must be "deeply concerned with the stability of these countries," and help them achieve the economse growth necessary to facilitate the raising of their living standards and their movement toward Democratic government, Mr. Eisenhow-

The President will submit special message to congress next month. Foreign aid chief Harold Stassen, just back from a 30,000mile trip to seven Asian countries, said Monday that this will recom-mend a "significant" increase in U.S. economic ald to Far Eastern

# World Rule

The United Nations is an organization which is pre-

This modern aggregation of Babylonians is convinced that the way to peace is a matter of removing the lines of demarcation which separate us into nations, religions, races, and economic groups.

According to the one-world theory, it is these barriers which cause us all our difficulties. If we can have one world, one government, one church, one race and all wealth redistributed equally about the face of the globe. then we would have peace. This is the theory. The theory beas the belief that each line of demarcation, is a potential battleground. If people have no lines separating them from other people, then they will have nothing to fight over. It is an interesting concept.

For it is on this theory that the entire U. N. functions. Yet, this same predilection with lines manifests itself in another way, also.

The World Association of Parliamentarians for World Government, an organization which is part and parcel of the one-world movement, and totally devoted to the United Nations ideal of world government, met in London in September of 1952 to map out the ways and means to lasting peace.

This time the line obliterators drew a great many more lines than they erased. Here we see that they have divided up the world like any ten-year-old divides an orange.

And they have submitted this proposal to the U. N. with the hopes that 1955 will be the year which will bring it to fruition.

In order to maintain peace in a world under a single government, a single police force will have to be relied upon. It is self-evident that it would be unwise (keeping the removal of barriers in mind) to let any subject nation police its own domain.

It is presumed that some vestige of national pride and honor might prejudice the rank and file of world policemen. Therefore, a not altogether original device has been plotted to avoid such inexcusable jingoism as love of country and of flag.

American troops as members of the world police force (bear in mind there will be no other American troops in existence) are to be stationed where the asterisks appear on the map — Czechoslovakia, Rumania, Tibet, the Ukraine and Australia.

The United States will be policed by foreigners. Eire has the interesting assignment of keeping peace throughout the Pacific States. Belgium will wield the guns and clubs from the Great Lakes westward down through part of Colorado. However, immediately south, for Colorado is apparently to be divided, the Muscovites will take over to arrest all violators of the creeds of internationalism. And a portion of Texas, Arizona, New Mexico, and San Diego will be ruled over by the Mongolians. The populous New England and industrial East will be kept in line by soldiers from Colombia and Venezuela.

This is Caesar's stuff. He called it "Divide and conquer." And this is precisely what is intended by the World Parliamentarians, the UN-ers, the One-Worlders, and the great and growing clique of internationalists.

But as we intimated above we are intrigued by all these lines. We note that while the U. N. ostensibly wants them removed, it has actually helped to create new ones in a lot of unlikely places. It was global hooey that drew the lines which made of Berlin a piece of pizza. And another line emanating from the same thinkers carved Germany into quarters.

A line through the city of Trieste nearly brought on a war, but the line was moved (not erased) and tensions lessened for a time.

There's been a fabulous bit of gerrymandering around the entire State of Israel, and no end to blood-letting since it was drawn. There's a brand new line in Indo-China now which divides a country not only harizontally but vertically.

Under U. N. auspices India has had its eastern and western rims cut off, and then, fantastic though it seems, those two divided segments form the independent nation of Pakistan, with 1500 miles of India in between. There's also the little matter of the 38th parallel in Korea, over which a great and bloody police action was waged.

So it appears that for all their theory about doing away with lines, the U. N. crowd is just about the busiest bunch of line-drawers in the business.

Further, it appears that wherever they put their lines trouble ensues.

This being the case, we look at their mapped version of what the world ought to look like in 1956 with a cold chill. There are at least a hundred NEW lines. For instance, the 38th parallel in Korea has disappeared and Korea stands united. Also, FORMOSA IS A PART OF CHINA PROPER by their plans drawn in 1952!

Now assuming that their theory of eliminating war, based on the removal of barriers, is tenable. Just how many good wars could the U. N. start by all this gloney of line drawing? Since one-world thinking has already been the infamous cause of the tensions in Berlin and Pakistan, and wars in Palestine, Inda China, and Korea the same thinking applied to the United ites must give us on uncomfortable pause.

Conjecture on this problem provides us with a fertile old for horror. It is not where the lines are drawn but that they are drawn at all. How dare anyone divide this nation?

It is clearly apparent that the United Nations has grown its usefulness if any, indeed, existed. Let's get the United States out of the U. N. and the

If it can do as the heading of this article suggests, that is, help the individual to get a clearer understanding of political and economic matters, it is certainly worth the price. The March issue of The Freeman is devoted entirely to the United Nations. Every person who believes in the United Nations should read articles by writers who do not believe that the United Nations is good for the United States. The March issue has articles by 16 prominent students of government and history — such men as John T. Flynn, Frank E. Holman, Edmund A. Opits, Dean Russell, John Chamberlain, W. H. Chamberlin, F. A. Harper and Frank Chodorov.

Here is the way Chodorov starts out the editorial under the heading of "One Worldism" :

"Ten years ago the United Nations was ushered into the world as the guarantor of peace. It has failed. Despite that obvious fact, there are many whose faith in some sort of Superstate as an instrument of peace is unshaken, and who lay the failure of the UN to the limitations put upon it by the autonomy of its members. That is to say, they believe in peace through coercion; the more

"History cannot give this faith the slightest support. The grandeur that was Rome did not prevent the parts of that empire from coming into conflict with one another nor from rising up against the central authority. Even our American coalition of commonwealths came near breaking up in war, and uprisings have all but disintegrated the British Empire. Centralization of power has never been a guarantor of peace.

"The best that can be said of any coalition of nations is that it can keep smodering fires from breaking out only so long as one of its members can dominate the others. It can maintan an armed truce. The UN has not done even that, simply because no one State has shown sufficient strength to take control. The two most powerful members have been in contention since its beginning and are now flexing their muscles for a test of

"The UN - it is moonshine to think otherwise - consists of two hostile camps, one held together by the American dollar, the other by fear of the Soviet army. Neither law, morality nor ideology is a cementing influence. If the American dollar is withdrawn the West will break up, its members entering into new alignments dictated by expediency; if the Soviet power shows weakness, the Red Empire will splinter.

"In short, it is evident now even as it always was to anyone familiar with the history of political alliances — that the moral purpose written into the charter of the UN is but a fairy tale. World peace is not to be achieved through this or any other political concoction — simply because peace and power politics are thetical. 'War,' said von Clausewitz,' is merely the continuation of politics by other means."




