CHICAGO — UP — The National Safety Council declared a national "traffic accident emergency" Monday in the wake of the worst March highway death toll in history.

In telegrams to each of the state governors, the council warned "a traffic accident emergency exists in the United States." It urged "all-out action to end the 'critical' situation and stop rising highway deaths."

Near Eland, Wis., Sunday, a head-on collision wiped out seven lives. Four of the victims were children.

The LaCrosse, Wis., record of 857 days without a traffic fatality ended in another head-on smash-up. Two little boys were killed.

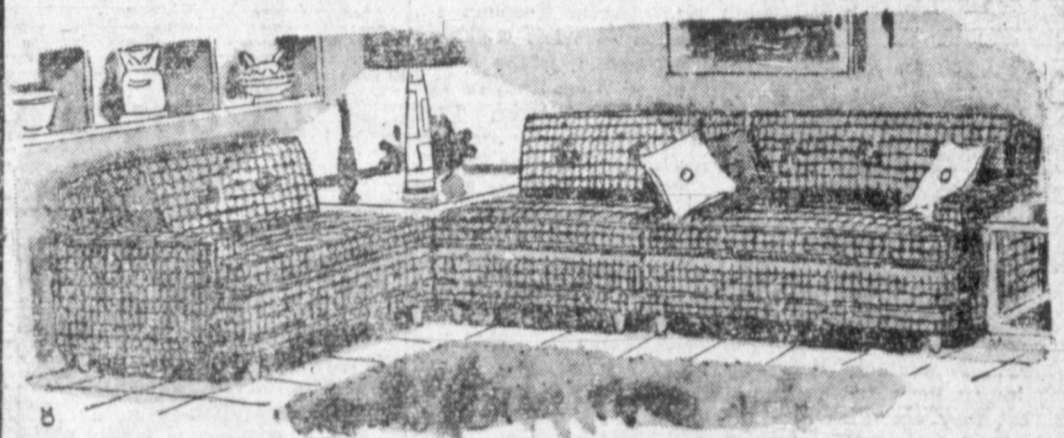

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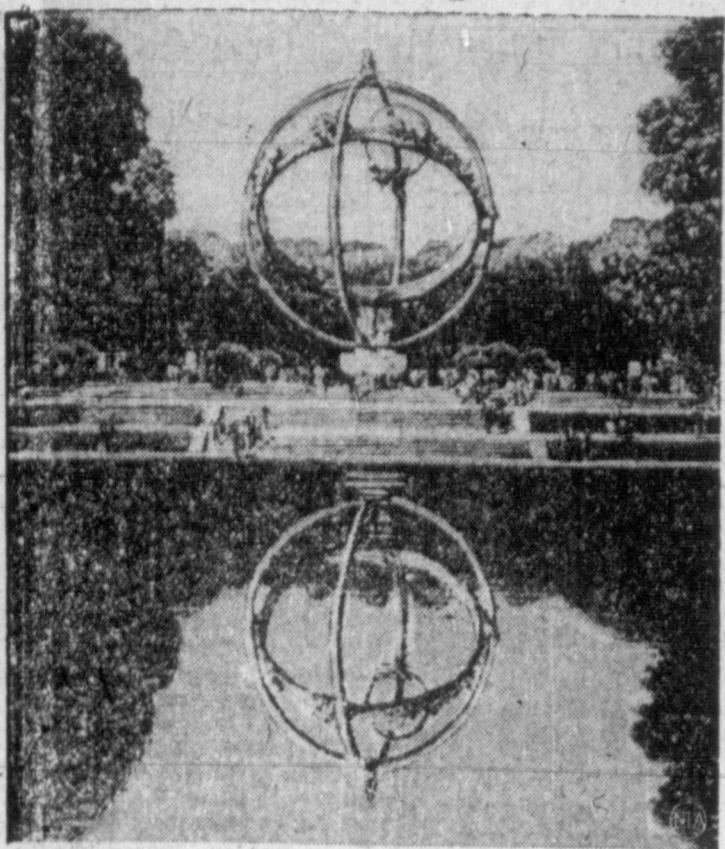

### Some Records May Not Sound Alike

High-quality recordings, made by the same company, the same audio range and possibly pressed on the same machine, often sound differently.

One recording will sound almost alive. Another, of undeniable quality otherwise, won't have the ring of life. Examples of this "presence" and the lack of it are in four of Capitol's new 12-inch LPs.

For instance, there is a recording of six of Claude Debussy's pieces under the title "Children's Corner" on one side of a Capitol record (PSS28, 12-inch, 33 1/3 RPM's—RIAA Curve) by the Concert Arts Orchestra, under Felix Slatkin's direction.

On the other side of the recording is the four-part Debussy "Petit Suite." Both sides are outstanding examples of clean, pure sound that will entrance almost any listener. The recording makes the music come almost alive.

Another lacks sparkle. In reproduction, of the less pretentious Debussy pieces.

Then there is the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra's recording of Ludwig Von Beethoven's Symphony No. 3 (Sinfonia Eroica) under the Capitol label (PSS34, 12-inch, 33 1/3 RPM's—RIAA Curve).

Walter Steinberg, one of the nation's top conductors, conducted the Pittsburgh Symphony, in what is a "standard" in the repertoire of symphony orchestras. But it still lacks the sparkle, in reproduction, of the less pretentious Debussy pieces.

Another fine recording and musical job is the ballet music from Leo Delibes' Sylvia and Coppelia. Pierre Michel Le Conte conducts the orchestra of the Paris Opera in this recording (Capitol, 18001, 12-inch, 33 1/3 RPM's—RIAA Curve).

Capitol's engineer in Paris has accomplished the same thing its engineer in Hollywood did with the Debussy pieces. The sound is alive and clear, as crisp as a bell on a frosty morning.

### Footnotes

Among the newly acquired books at Pampa's Lovett Memorial Library is "The Friendly Persuasion," by Jessamyn West. It is not a newly published book, most of it having been written in 1940, 1944, and 1945, but it is new at the library. Most of the pieces appeared in "Collier's," "Harper's Bazaar," "The Atlantic Monthly," and other magazines.

There are 14 rich, sound, and intensely beautiful stories, each by itself a fresh and unusual accomplishment in prose. "Taken all together, added one to one like glittering beads on a fine strong chain, they have the effect of a

novel, rendering in full the good substance and meaning of life as lived by the Birdwell family," says Richard Sullivan in the Chicago "Tribune."

The stories and incidents are about Jess Birdwell, his wife Eliza, who was a Quaker preacher, and their six children. Jess is a red-headed nurseryman and farmer. In one incident he is against all of his Quaker convictions, finds that in his heart he loves music. So he buys himself an organ. Eliza admits it to the house, but it must be placed in the attic. The highly comical ending of this incident occurs when

several staunch Quakers, who have heard rumors that there is music in their preacher's house, come to see if it is true.

Another choice incident, in which Miss West demonstrates her exhilaration sense of fun and subtle knowledge of human nature, is called "First Day Finish." Jess Birdwell and the Methodist preacher had a long-standing, but never voiced feud over their horses. The preacher always passed the Birdwells on the way to First Day (Sunday) meetings, and Jess was forced to drive in his dust, a thing which put him "in no fit state to worship" as he put it. Eliza's sense of property and fitness was aroused the day Jess finally had had enough and tried to make his horse pass the preacher's by yelling and fanning at it with his tall Quaker hat.

Jess, following the letter but not the spirit of his wife's request to trade off the "racy-looking" horse, acquired another named Lady that was not a pretty beast, but had the fault or virtue of never letting another rig pass her, and could not be held back by the driver.

Of course, the outcome of this situation was that, through no actual urging on Jess' part, the Birdwells entered into a first day race to the Meeting Houses with the Methodist preacher. It left Jess triumphant but conscience-subdued and Eliza in a state to test all the faith and forgiveness she had, because she, in the heat of the race, had found it in her to urge Lady on herself.

## Good And Bad Of Week's News

The week's good and bad news on the international balance sheet:

**GOOD NEWS**

1. Secretary of State John Foster Dulles announced that the United States is willing to consider

extending the North Atlantic Treaty Organization by including economic co-operation. It was an important move to strengthen the alliance which was formed seven years ago to meet the threat, then acutely dangerous, of Soviet Russian aggression. Canada, France and Italy had been urging for some months that the time had come to put "NATO" on a broader base. Dulles' agreement means that plans for wider co-operation will be discussed when he and other foreign ministers of the alliance meet in Paris next Thursday.

2. The Kremlin's debunking of Josef Stalin as a Communist deity hit the governments of Iron Curtain countries with increasing impact. In Poland, two high police officials were arrested and held for trial after three cabinet ministers had been dismissed. Another victim was Alexei Cepicka, a top-ranking Communist in Czechoslovakia. He was fired from his posts of vice premier and defense minister.

3. The United States ordered two members of the Soviet Russian delegation to the United Nations to leave the country. They were accused of taking part in the virtual kidnaping of five Russian seamen who had been given refuge in the United States. A stiff American note ousting the two officials also rebuked Arkady A. Sobolev, Soviet chief delegate to the UN for his part in the ugly incident.

**BAD NEWS**

1. The visit of Soviet Premier Nikolai A. Bulganin and Communist party leader Nikita S. Khrushchev to Great Britain appeared to have lessened materially any hope that major cold war issues might be settled soon between West and East. The coldness of the British reception to "Mr. B. and Mr. K." was a serious propaganda defeat for the Kremlin. That was good news. But it was indicated also that it would serve to harden the differences between Russia and the free world.

2. In France, Premier Guy Mollet's government was beset by problems at home and in Algeria. It was reported in Paris Mollet now thought it necessary to call 150,000 men in all to the colors, double the number originally planned, to combat the Algerian rebels. This would bring France's military strength in Algeria to nearly 425,000 men — more than the peak number in the costly Indo-China war. In the domestic field, Mollet faced a big budget deficit and popular opposition to the troop call-up.

3. Riots broke out between Greek and Turkish islanders in Cyprus. Greek Cypriot extremists who want Britain to give Cyprus to Greece murdered two Turks. Young Turkish Cypriots retorted by attacking Greek-owned shops and setting fire to some of them. At the same time Greek attacks on British troops, British, Turkish and Greek police and civilians continued. Large areas of the island were put under strict curfews by the British authorities as part of the crackdown campaign of Field Marshal Sir John Harding, British governor and commander in chief.

### Bomb Sent As Gift Explodes

DAYTON, Ohio, April 28 —UP— A mysterious bomb, disguised as a wedding gift, exploded in a suburban home Saturday critically injuring a high school coach who planned to marry Saturday morning and attend the funeral of his father Saturday afternoon.

Donald Dixon, 27, suffered a badly torn left leg and arm, and cuts on his left eye as he opened the package in the living room of the Dixon home in suburban Englewood.

His sister, Mrs. George Cooney, 34, Chicago, Ill., and two aunts, Mrs. Donald Stewart, 45, Washington D.C., and Mrs. Francis Stefanak Elmhurst, Ill., suffered minor injuries.

**Gathered Around Table**

They had gathered around a table in the living room along with other relatives to watch Dixon unwrap the package which had been found on the front porch along with two others about 5:45 a.m. (cst). The other packages contained gifts.

Eighteen persons, including six children, were in the house when the bomb, apparently dynamite which was triggered by a portable radio battery, exploded.

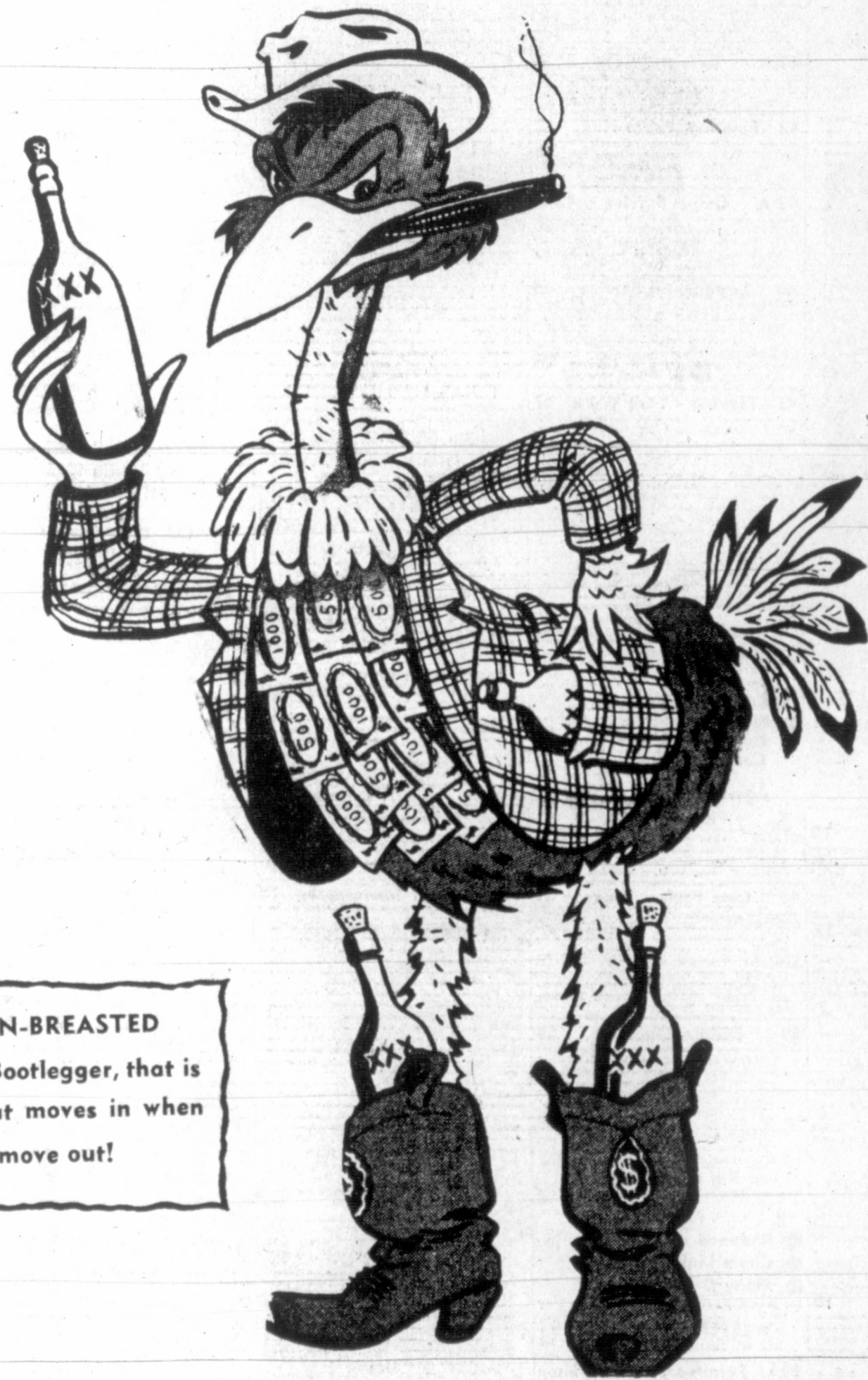
The wedding which had been scheduled for 9 a.m. in St. Albert the Great Roman Catholic Church was postponed indefinitely.
