JERUSALEM (AP)—Israeli troops were reported today to have driven 126 miles to within 12 miles of the Suez Canal in an invasion of Egypt and the Arab world began mobilizing for possible all-out war. Israel announced that both the Egyptian and Israeli air forces were in action in the desert battle.

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

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### The Men And Issues

Let's do a little comparing.

Come November 6, you will vote. What will you be voting for?

Naturally, your ballot is going to be marked after some person's name, not after some particular policy or issue, the theory being that the man you vote for believes a certain way on an issue or has a particular

After all there isn't much point in just voting for a personality. In politics, one rascal is just about as good as another, excepting as they are dedicated to ideas and beliefs. People aren't supposed to vote for candidates on the strength of their ready wits, their grins or their pleasing personalities. The whole business of elections is theoretically tied to the idea that the man represents

It so happens that there are a number of crucial issues facing the people of the United States. These issues haven't been brought out too well by either the Republicans or Democratic champions. This does not remove the issues. Rather, it makes them more urgent, if this is possible.

Probably the major issue of our time relates to taxes, with INCOME TAX as the principal bone of contention. Here's the way it lines up.

President Eisenhower wants to keep the income tax and although he talks of cutting taxes, he plans more ways of spending money. If you vote for him you are voting for more taxes.

Adlai Stevenson wants to keep the income tax, also. He criticizes Eisenhower for the manner in which the money has been spent. Stevenson wants to spend even more in many more original and unique ways. There is positively no choice to be had between these two candidates on the tax question.

To find an alternate, you must turn to the independent candidates about whom comparatively little is known. The independent candidates are T. Coleman Andrews, former tax commissioner and Thomas Werdel, former Congressman from California. Andrews is a Democrat, Werdel a Republican. Here is what they say about

"The income tax is thoroughly un-American. It is right out of the communists' Manifesto, which states rankly that the surest way to destroy a capitalist so ciety is by steeply graduated income taxes. Granted, reformation of the tax system of the greatest nation in the world is serious business, and it must be done with the greatest care. But we already are too late getting started on it, and if, in the process, the income tax cannot be shorn of its evils — and we seriously doubt that it can - then it must go."

There is another major issue. It has to do with the concept that THE STATES ARE SOVEREIGN and that the U. S. government is only a federation of sovereign

Again on this issue, Eisenhower and Stevenson are in perfect agreement. They want and demand more and more power centralized in the Washington bureaucracy. This is exemplified in the recent Supreme Court rulings affecting segregation, internal security, and labor management relations. In these three areas the Supreme Cort has usurped the sovereignty of the states and proclaimed the divine right of kings for the federal government, Both Eisenhower and Stevenson favor these actions.

To get another point of view, you must again turn to the independent candidates. Here is what they say:

'(We) hold undeviating respect for state and individual rights. Without this respect there can be neither union of sovereign states nor personal liberty. There can be only tyranny. On this question (we) stand squarely on Article 10 of the Bill of Rights.

'It is a violation of this constitutional guarantee for the federal government to inject itself into matters that should be left to state and local governments. Moreover, to do so adds unnecessarily to the cost of government by spawning a vast bureaucracy, usually to the detriment rather than the improvement of good govern-

Let's take two more issues.

Status of Forces Treaty. Eisenhower is for it. So is Stevenson. Andrews and Werdel say: "This dangerous pact subjects U. S. overseas servicemen to jurisdiction of foreign courts. These defenders of our flag must not be placed at the mercy of foreign courts."

What about our foreign policy? Eisenhower likes what we have. So does Stevenson, except that he wants more foreign give-away, and more international monkey

Andrews and Werdel say this: "American defense - indeed, American survival - lies in the building of an air striking force that can destroy any target, any-Then they go on to say:

There is no reason why the United States cannot exercise world leadership without yielding our independence. We want no socialistic world organization chipping away American sovereignty and independence.

It appears from the evidence that a vote for either Eisenhower or Stevenson is a vote for the same kind of political mess we have had for many years. Only an

independent vote could possibly bring a change Come November 6, vote for Andrews for President

Love Education

A wire story from Jefferson City, Mo., tells how Mrs. Mary Schoenheit had lost her fight to have her God-given right to educate her daughter. She had moved from Pomona, Calif., to near Jefferson City in hopes of having the right to educate her child. She was arrested and put in jail and her child taken from her and turned over to the state.

If she stayed in jail and the child remained in the care of the state, she, of course, could not do what she wanted to do - have the right to educate her daughter. Even if she stayed in jail for 10 days she would again have been arrested\_and put in jail if she dia not send her child to gun-run schools - schools that are not based on the inalienable rights of a parent to choose how his children shall be educated.

She made no objection to paying to support government schools. All she wanted to do was have the right of a mother and father to see that their children were educated to believe that their natural rights, that belong to every individual, were not to be interfered with by the state.

The mother was a former school teacher. She objected to sending her daughter to government schools because she claimed they turned out "trained seals."

It is hard to conceive how those people who believe in majority-rule gun-run schools can believe that the individual can develop his faculties if he is deprived of the right to use them in training his children. And when the state takes away from the person the right to educate his children, it takes away from the parent the most sacred thing in his life. What the parent believes is what he wants his children to believe. And to deprive the parent of that right is doing exactly in the United States what the Communists are doing in Rus-

Just how silly can we be to be fighting against Communism when We are practicing the worst part of Communism in the United States? And can anybody think of anything more tyrannical than taking away from a person with convictions his right to try to instill in his offspring those convic-

I received a long distance call the day after this case was reported - a call from a minister from Oregon. He called me because he knew I had been interested in trying to get Mary Turner to have the right to educate her children. We were not successful in getting the Supreme Court to near it on the ground that It viplated the 14th Amendment.

The Reverend had about the same idea of government schools that I had. He said his children were being educated by his wife and they had never gone to governent schools and hoped they never would.

What he wanted to know from me was whether our attorneys had tried to defend the Turner case on the grounds of religious feeedom. He thought that that might be a

I did not remember that that had been a part of the petition to get the Supreme Court to hear the case so I referred him to Atty. James Ingebretsen who represented Mary Turner in her attempt to appeal the case to the Supreme Court of the United States. Mrs. Turner was driven out of California and is now living in

If they are really interested in knowing whether the child is being taught reading, writing and arithmatic, or whatever the state wants, if it isn't pure propaganda and they daren't submit to such an examination, they could once a year have an examination of those children who were being educated by their parants to determine whether they were learning these subjects. This could be done for \$25 or \$50 a year and the state could save the difference between the cost of gun-run schools and schools based on love, which would be in the neighborhood of \$250 a year per pupil savings. Besides this, the child would get a



I have referred on many previous occasions to the enormous improvement in health which has occurred over North America in the last half a century. This, together with the extra-

ordinary mobility of the people, has a profound influence on the distribution of medical facilities both now and far into the future. Several things have been happening to us simultaneously.

There has been a dramatic rise in the birth rate so that now some 4,000,000 children are born each year in the United States alone. During the 10 years from 1945 to 1954, for example, nearly 37,000,000 babies were born alive in the United States. If the present pattern continues, by 1975 there should be in the neighborhood of 24,000,000 children under 5 years old in this country.

No wonder the pediatricians are busy and getting busier.

ALONG WITH this has come an increase in the number of older people. Life expectancy at the turn of the century was only about 47 years. It is now almost 70. Thus, at both extremes of life,

increased medical facilities and attention are needed. There is another change occurring in the population picture. Peo-

ple are moving from one place to another more and more. In 1950, for example, 17 out of 100 residents of the United States

were living in a different house from that which they occupied the year before. If everybody moved at this rate, the entire population would move once every six

IT IS TRUE that some of this moving about is just within the narrow confines of the same community. However, there have been general movements too - toward the far west, the Gulf Coast, Florida, the Great Lakes industrial area and the middle Atlantic

There has also been movement of people from rural areas to the cities and from the cities to the

Such regions may be in desperate need of public health services, school health services, and many others which have to be built al-

Cities from which the more properous citizens have removed to the suburbs may be deprived of tax revenues to supply desirable health services.



#### THE NATION'S PRESS

ALONG PENNSYLVANIA

AUBREY HERBERT

(Faith And Freedom) "What can I do?" is a common complaint in politics. What can a lone individual do to turn a political tide that seems invincible? The libertarian is especially prey to this kind of defeatism. Opposed by the weight of millions, by masscirculation propaganda, what can he hope to accomplish?

Libertarians can now take heart, because the great drama of the past session of Congress featured the triumph of a vigilant handful of alert libertarians. The national press has given this victory no publicity - it would hardly be convenient to advertise such a defeat for the statist machine. Yet, in the midst of an incredibly dull session, the little - known victory on the Alaska Mental Health Bill brings a beacon of hope to Amer-

The story begins in routine style. Alaska Territory has no mentalhospital, and Alaskan mental patients were shipped to an Oregon hospital for treatment. Furthermore, Alaskan mental patients were treated in the same way as common criminals.

A bill sped through the House last winter, without opposition, changing commitment procedures, and granting Alaska one million acres of land to finance the mental hospital.

The bill was slated for quick adoption in the Senate. But, out in California, the American Public Relations Forum - smelled a rat. The Forum specializes in battling America's new number one propaganda campaign-Mental Health.

Suddenly, as if by spontaneous combustion, we hear radio commercials bark about "mental health," newspaper ads trumpet the slogans, etc. As always, this is the prelude to tens of millions of federal tax dollars poured down some "welfare" rathole. But the Forum sees something far more sinister in the offing. It finds in state mental health bills provisions compulsory commitment of peaceful citizens - sometimes just on the say-so of a governmental psychiatrist.

The Forum distrusts the government and the Socialists running it - and well it may, when we note the terrible ordeal of Ezra Pound, or Lucille Miller, or Ron Ramsey, or the Finn Twins - all sent to asylums for arguing with the government. They know that leftists and fashionable psychiatrists consider as "mentally ill" all those who criticize minority groups or world government, or who fail to "adjust" to the prevail-

ing political norm. So the Forum wrote a bulletin atiacking the Alaska Bill as setting the stage for an Alaskan mental concentration camp for rightwingers. The fighting libertarian Hoiles Freedom newspapers picked it up and wrote a famous editorial: "Now Siberia U. S. A." The war was on.

Only a few organized groups got behind the hue and cry. Most influential was the libertarian medical group, the American Association of Physicians and Surgeons, and Dan Smoot's new newsletter. Right-wingers bombarded Congress with protests and demands

left retreated. The Senate passed an Alaska Mental Health Bill, to be sure, but a completely new one submitted by Senator Goldwater (R., New Mex.). Tossed out were all the sections attacked by the Forum, the AAPS, etc. - especially the compulsory commitment procedures and loopholes that might have permitted U.S. citizens to be shipped to Alaska.

In attacking the patriots' position, the leftists omitted all the larger meanings in the case. Sure, the one million acres are not all slated for the hospital-they are part of an old pattern of federal land grants to states to provide revenue for financing such proj-

And sure, if the government must own land, better a state or territory than the federal government. Again, those provisions were probably meant as harmless "exchange clauses-so that Alaskans in New York can be on par with New Yorkers in Alaska, But the point is that we can-

not be too vigilant. We cannot permit loopholes for tyranny. The Miller and other cases are too close. the menace of compulsory commitment too formidable. In the larger sense, the Hoiles papers and other patriots are right, and the smugly superior defenders of the bill are wrong. It is unfortunate, of course, that

the government mixes in medical matters at all - and that it should socialize medical care for mental illness. But, at least, a small group of libertarians rose up and struck a mighty blow. They blocked an opening wedge for compulsory commitment on the federal plane. And they showed us what energy, grit, and vigilance can achieve.

Events are moving almost too swiftly for comment, but it looks like the higgest news story of the decade is breaking right before

our eyes. This story is the cracking of the world Communist em-

pire.
The danger is that we may underestimate the crucial changes that are taking place. The communist movement was built on one central myth - the cult of party infallibility. Sure, the communist "line" changed often - but each time, the leadership of the party was hailed as infallible. When the Nazi-Soviet pact was signed, the Communists hailed Stalin as right before and after - right to be anti-Nazi before 1939 and pro-Nazi aft-

Now, for the first time, Krushchev's famous speech last Febuary heralded an attack by Communists on their own leaders number one - a man whom they worshipped and exalted for thirty

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Once that was done, all the rest followed logically. For, if Stalin was a butcher and monster, the present leaders joined in his crimes, and the foreign Communists grovelled before him without even the alibi of fear of Stalin's guns. Every Communist now sees that he lived a thirty year's lie.

It is folly to ignore all this and laugh the whole thing off as just another tactic to "lull the West." Would a world empire shatter and confuse its ranks and change its system just to score a propaganda point? Lurking In Each Breast

munist movement surrendered to "Titoism," but internal changes are swiftly destroying the old order. Rapidly, the old despotism disintegrates, under the dual pressure of the discontented masses and the natural urge for freedom that lurks in the brest of every man - even of a Communist. Free speech and free elections are beginning to emerge in the Soviet

Not only has the world Com-

Prediction is always risky, but if this trend continues, here's what we will see: before long, there will be nothing wrong with communism except its socialism. All the reasons why the man-in-the-street, and our State Department hate communism (slave labor camps, no elections, no free speech, world Russians control) may evaporate. And we will suddenly wake up to find that Soviet Russia is no worse, say, than the British Labor Party.

This will be a great boon for the cause of liberty. For one thing, the cold war will end, the threat of war will disappear, for why should we fight against a regime no different than a lot of our "allies," and not so far from our own system? And then, libertarians will realize that the enemy. is not communism, ot Soviet Russia, but statism, Everyone will see that communism is just a socialist

Russia is socialist - so is Franco, and Chiang and the British Labor Party and the Americans for Democratic Action.

Then, perhaps, we will understand freedom lies, not in Moscow, but in Washington.

TAXPAYERS WIN A ROUND (N. Y. Daily News)

S. taxpayers finance a big government power dam in Hell's Canyon, on the Snake River, so that a few thousand Idahoans and Oregonians could have belowcost power. The court okayed construction of three dams by the privately owned Idaho Power Co.


