army was ready for combined action with Egypt against the Israel attack the minute such an order is given by the joint Syro-Egyptian command.

Syrian President Shukri El-Kuwaty and Gen. Tewfik Nizamuddin, Syrian-army chief of staff, cancelled a scheduled visit to Moscow. They conferred with Egyptian Ambassador Mohammed Ryad and Soviet Ambassador Sergein Nemchina.

Nasser Calls Emergency Meet
A Cairo dispatch said Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser called an emergency cabinet meeting for this afternoon to discuss the situation.

French Premier Guy Mollet and Foreign Minister Christian Pineau flew to London for talks with British Prime Minister Sir Anthony Eden and Foreign Minister Selwyn Lloyd.

President Eisenhower was keeping in close touch with Secretary of State John Foster Dulles. Earlier the United States requested NSecurity Council censure daily against Israel.

Details of Fighting Scarce
There were no immediate details in Jerusalem of the Egyptian "bombings" in the Egyptian Sinai desert and the Israeli Negev Desert — the first aerial action reported since the Israeli attack.

There also were no official details of the exact positions held by the Israeli forces which crossed into Egypt Monday night at two points.

There was no report of casualties—Israeli or Egyptian—except for an Israeli announcement that "some slight casualties" were suffered when Egyptian Air Force planes strafed an Israeli transport.

Israel Called Raiders
Most newspapers referred to the Israeli troops as raiders and did not use the word "war."

Report Large Scale Fight
But reports indicated the fighting was of large scale. Israeli sources already had reported a drive to within 18 miles of the Suez and newest reports placed them six miles farther despite Egyptian claims of a counterattack.

The situation was so critical the United States called the Security Council into session today to study the Israeli attack.

Children Die After Collision

HOUSTON (UP) — A car-truck smashup that killed two children on the Alameda-Genoa highway Monday claimed a third victim Monday night.

The latest victim, Karen Laurie Focht, 2, died at 8 p.m., joining her two brothers, Larry, 8, and six-week old Neil Focht, in death.

The children were victims of an accident which occurred early Monday as their mother, Mrs. Barbara Focht, 26, was returning home from the city airport after seeing her husband, F.C. Focht, off to New Orleans on a business trip.

Mrs. Focht, herself seriously injured, told officers she had been up all night nursing little Neil, who was ill, and apparently "fell asleep at the wheel."

The car smashed into a parked truck.

Mrs. Focht is the former Barbara Morrison of Pampa, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Morrison of 1221 Mary Ellen and sister of Don Morrison of Pampa.

Funeral services are scheduled for 2 p.m. Wednesday from the Earthmann - Belair Funeral Home in Houston.

The rural route fleet of the Louisiana - Texas postal region won driver safety recognition in the 25th Annual National Fleet Safety Contest of the National Safety Council, according to a statement today by Postmaster O. K. Gaylor.

The postal region's 2,500 drivers placed third in the passenger car division, based on performance from July 1955 through June 1956. Announcement of the rating was made at ceremonies in the LaSalle Hotel in Chicago Oct. 25.

During the year the rural carriers of the two - state region covered 31,060,814 miles with an accident rate of only .08 accident per 100,000 miles. Rural carriers Ira E. Byars and Clarence W. Coffin of this office contributed to this outstanding safety record, Gaylor said.

More than 1800 fleets operating in excess of 229,000 vehicles and traveling 4,867,000 miles, competed in the silver anniversary contest, largest of its kind in the world. The combined average frequency rate of 1.58 accidents per 100,000 vehicle miles was one of

VOA Works Overtime To Report The Freedom Story

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Men and machinery of the Voice of America are working overtime these days.

"When something like this Polish-Hungarian situation breaks, we know that thousands will be listening for information," explains a Voice spokesman. "We do not want to let them down."

Objective of the Voice is to get the facts—and just the facts—to those under Red rule, from Poznan to Peiping.

It's a job both gigantic and delicate because, says a Voice official, "We are not trying to stir up a revolution. We don't want to be responsible for any bloodshed. We are sticking to the facts and we are not speculating."

This means that the Voice is

broadcasting news of events in Poland and Hungary, reaction of leaders in the U.S. and editorial comment from American newspapers.

Activity is at a peak in the modern studios of the Voice located in the huge Health, Education and Welfare Building just a step from the Capitol. Writers, editors, engineers and technicians have been working around the clock.

Each day more than 40 hours of direct shortwave broadcasts are being directed behind the Curtains in 20 languages. And an additional 70 hours is scheduled to counter Soviet jamming.

The programs are transmitted by 48 overseas stations in vital locations outside the Communist orbit. Three of these transmitters, in Germany, the Philippines and Okinawa, have million-watt output power.

Broadcasts are also relayed into Red territory by a floating station, the U.S. Coast Guard cutter, "Courier," anchored off the Island of Rhodes in the Mediterranean.

News of the Polish move towards independence from Moscow hit Washington at the start of the weekend when many Voice workers were preparing to relax for a couple of days at home. As usual, a number of features and religious programs had been prepared in advance.

"We threw the clock away and went to work," says one expert. "The weekend went out the window."

Pre-recorded programs were junked and a flow of news from Poland began to be beamed from here to Russia, the Eastern European satellites, Red China, North Korea and North Vietnam.

Key men and women in the effort were foreign speaking commentators like Joseph Gidynski, Chief of the Polish desk at the Voice. A judge in Poznan in 1939, he became a U.S. citizen in 1946.

G.O.P., Demos Both Want Negro Vote

WASHINGTON (UP)—James A. Farley was easy in his mind during political campaigns if he could figure that he had the Negro vote going for his candidate.

Farley was chief engineer of the New Deal political machine created by Franklin D. Roosevelt. He estimated the Negro vote was the balance of power between the major parties in 17 substantially industrial states outside the South.

Political managers in this presidential campaign go along with Farley's estimate of the strategic importance of Negro voters. A shift of Negro voters from the party of Abraham Lincoln to the party of Franklin D. Roosevelt was basic in FDR's 1936 reelection triumph in which he won 46 states and 523 electoral votes. Alf M. Landon of Kansas, the Republican presidential nominee, got Maine and Vermont along with their eight electoral votes.

Farley called that one before election day, naming the two states Landon would carry. Campaign managers have been trying to match that for 24 years.

The farm vote gets more attention than any other in a U.S. election campaign. But the Negroes now have political recognition which would have seemed impossible at the turn of the century.

The Negro population of the United States was more than 15 million in the 1950 census. It is strategically concentrated in large states which cast substantial electoral votes. The National Association

for the Advancement of Colored People checked the 1952 Negro vote in 50 cities. The survey indicated that 75 per cent of Negro voters had voted for Adlai E. Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee.

Not Decisive In '52
The Negro vote, therefore, was cast for the 1952 loser and was not decisive in that election. President Eisenhower's 1952 lead in popular votes was too great in the North for the outcome to be changed even by the concentration of massive minority support for the opposition candidate.

Republicans are making an unusually anxious pitch this year for the Negro vote. That is because of indications of a close popular vote between Mr. Eisenhower and Gov. Stevenson. There are large Negro communities in key states such as California, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Missouri, New York, New Jersey, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

These eight states cast 223 electoral votes, just 43 short of the 266 minimum for election of a president of the United States. Their Negro populations range from 442,300 in Michigan to nearly one million in New York state.

Get VIP Treatment
Leaders among Negro citizens get the White House VIP treatment in this campaign year. If a

nationally known or politically significant Negro desires to announce his support of the Eisenhower-Nixon ticket, he or she is welcome to make the White House a sounding board.

Miss Cora M. Brown, a Michigan state senator, called on Mr. Eisenhower last week to report that she had supported Stevenson four years ago but would vote for the President this year.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerly arranged a news conference at the White House for Miss Brown.

Rep. Adam Clayton Powell (D-NY) dropped in some days earlier to tell the President he was for him. Dr. Theodore R. M. Howard of Chicago, a leader in the NAACP

made his announcement from Buffalo, N.Y. He described himself as a long-time Democrat who was for the Republicans now.

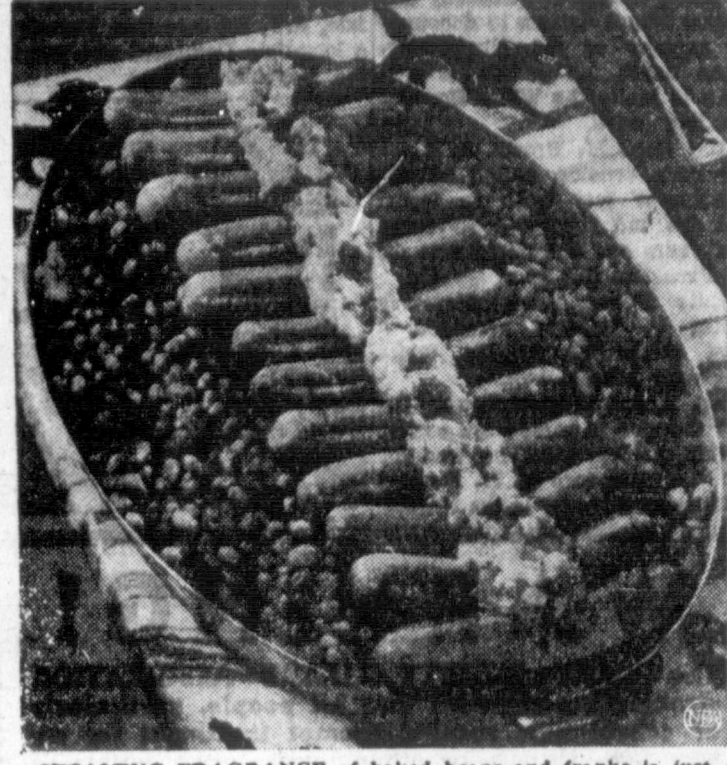

Quick Beans And Franks Make Hit For Halloween

Halloween goblins usually have big appetites.
Mrs. Anthonette Combs of New York, youthful-looking grandmother with 15 grandchildren, fashion expert and resident buyer, gave us her idea of what young people enjoy at a Halloween party. She's an experienced hand at entertaining youngsters.
Her menu is built around harvest-colored foods and streamlined recipes.
QUICK BEANS 'n' FRANKS
(Yield: 12 servings)
One-half cup unsulphured molasses, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 2 tablespoons prepared mustard, 3 cans (1 pound each) baked beans, 2 cans (20 ounces each) kidney beans, 12 frankfurters.
Combine unsulphured molasses, vinegar and prepared mustard; mix well. Empty beans into skillet or casserole; stir in molasses mixture.

Place frankfurters on top of beans. Simmer in skillet on top of range 20 minutes, or cover and bake in skillet or casserole in a hot oven (425 degrees F.) 30 to 40 minutes. Serve with heated pickle relish.
GRANDMA'S HARVEST
PUDDING (Yield: 12 servings)
Two and one-quarter cups sifted all-purpose flour, 3/4 cup sugar, 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup shortening, 1 cup unsulphured molasses, 1 cup cold water, 1 teaspoon soda, 2 cups sliced apples, 2 3-ounce packages cream cheese, 2 tablespoons milk.
Sift together flour, sugar, nutmeg, cinnamon and salt. Add shortening, cut with two knives or pastry blender, to resemble coarse crumbs. Combine unsulphured molasses, water and soda. Turn apples into a greased 8-inch square pan. Alternate crumbs and liquid over apples in pan, beginning and ending with crumbs. Stir crumbs and liquid layer gently 2 or 3 times with a fork. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 1 hour. To serve, blend together cream cheese and milk. Cut cake into squares; place spoonful cream cheese on top of each square. Top each serving with lemon sauce.

Here's A Look At Future Headlines

 around the world look ahead at the news that will make the headlines.
 Who Asked Russia In? Watch for the United States, Britain and France to ask Russia just how its troops got into the fighting in Hungary so quickly. There's some mystery about it. One hour after he became premier, Imre Nagy announced he intended to ask the aid of Soviet troops against the rebels. At that time, it develops, the Russians already had been in action for five hours. Some reports say Erno Gero, later ousted as Communist Party leader, pressured Nagy's predecessor, Andras Hegedus, into making the request. That may not be true. The Mediterranean area may be competing with Hungary for top headlines any day. There could be a blow-up anywhere along its 2,400-mile length. Morocco, Tunisia and Algeria are at the explosion point because of France's seizure of five Algerian rebel leaders en route from Morocco to Tunisia. Arab countries are raging over the

French action. The threat of war between Israel and the Arab countries is so urgent President Eisenhower interrupted his physical checkup Sunday to appeal to Israel against warlike action. He acted when he learned Israel had ordered "partial" mobilization. Allied intelligence agents, still studying reports Russia is firing 3,000-mile-an-hour missiles over the Baltic Sea, have a new one to worry about. They hear the Russians are building a new super-airplane runway east of Berlin. It's said to be four miles long and still a-building. Allied agents suggest: (1) It could be intended for giant atomic missiles which would be launched from special under-carriages. (2) It might be a take-off strip for Russia's planned atomic-powered airplanes. By the way, the strip runs due east and west. The government is quietly planning a sharply expanded program to help friendly countries short of fuel to build big atomic power plants. The present policy of stressing research and development in the United States itself, which has plenty of fuel, would be continued. Officials feel this plan would help answer critics who say this country is lagging in atomic power development.

 West opened the queen of spades, and the defender took two tricks in this suit before South could get started on today's hand. South ruffed the third spade and then had to play the hand in such a way as to lose only one trump trick. It does no good to hope that one opponent has the doubleton king - queen of trumps. You can capture one of these cards with the ace, but then you will have to lose a trick to the queen and a second trump trick to the ten. The winning combination is the doubleton king - ten or queen-ten in the West hand. If this happens to be the situation, you can limit the loss to one trick by proper

play. But if the trumps are divided in some other way, you will lose two or more trump tricks. When the hand was played, South made a low trump decision by leading a low trump from his hand as soon as he gained the lead. West stepped up with the queen of trumps, as good a defense as any. Declarer won the club return in dummy and led the jack of trumps through East. When East played low, South let the jack of trumps ride for a finesse, thus assuring his contract. If East had covered with the king, South would have played the ace and would have drawn the last trump with his nine. West could not gain by playing the ten of hearts instead of the queen on the first round of trumps. Dummy would play the jack to force out East's king. Then South would regain the lead and would lead out the ace of hearts to capture the queen. The nine of hearts would then be good enough to draw the last trump.

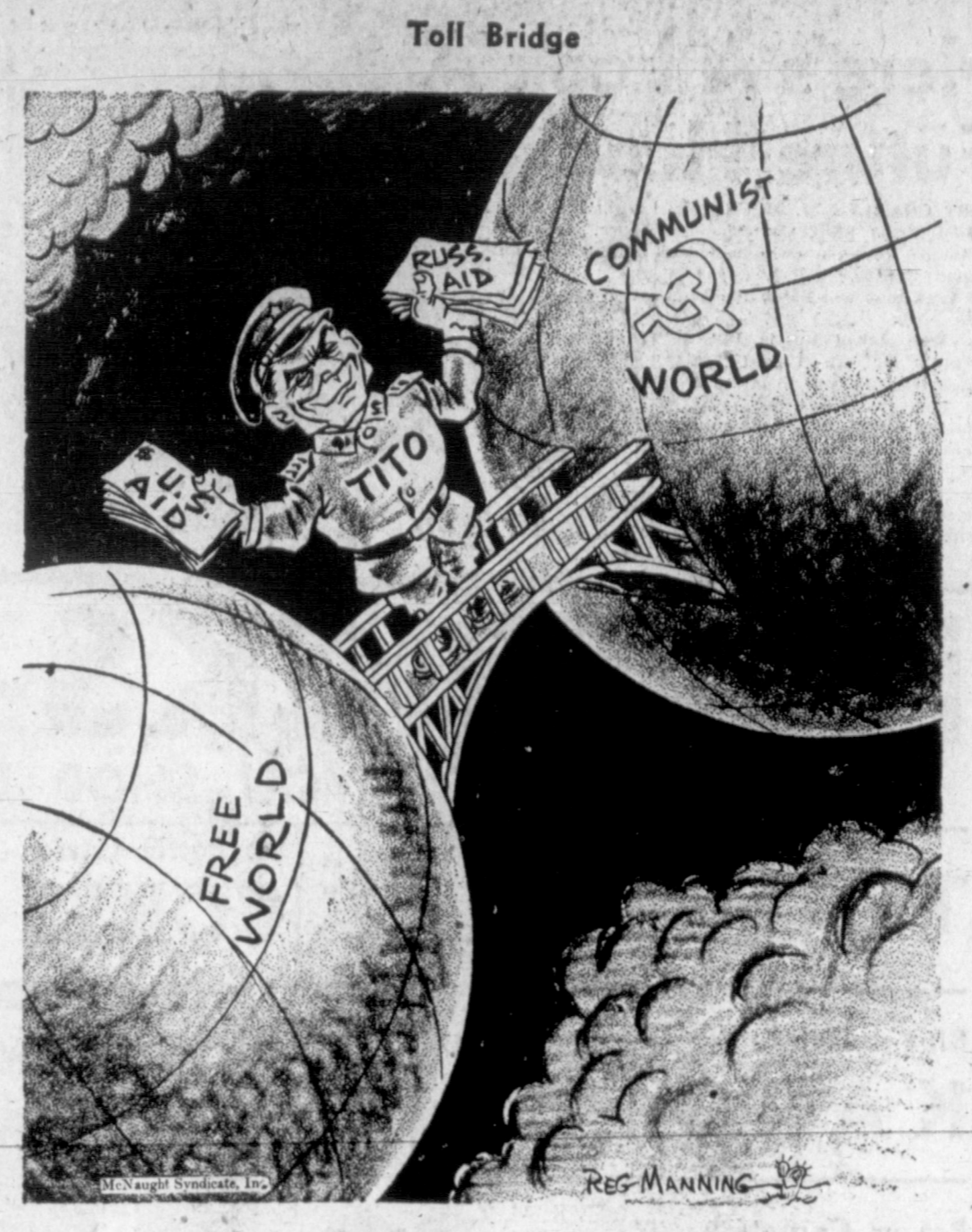
